

# Bearcats Speed Up in Second, Best Coyote Quintet 31-23

## HOLD ON THIRD PLACE SECURED

Nine-Point Spree in Three Minutes; 2d Half Thrills Crowd

Scoring nine points in three minutes the Willamette Bearcats swept ahead of a rapid traveling College of Idaho basketball team to win 31 to 23 last night in the fastest and most exciting court contest Willamette has played this year.

The win gave the Bearcats undisputed possession of third place in the Northwest conference standings, breaking a tie with College of Puget Sound. It was the Coyotes' third loss in three conference starts.

Until the last seven minutes of the game the contest was close with neither team able to maintain a lead. Freeman, big Coyote center, sank the final basket for the Idahoans to give them a 23 to 22 lead.

Frantz, Brandon and Mosher Warm Up

It was then that Eddie Frantz, Don Brandon and Harry Mosher showed what Bearcats can do in a pinch. Eddie presented Willamette with the ever-changing lead again by dropping in the last of the five long shots he garnered during the game. Seconds afterward Brandon got down the floor in a hurry and sank a crumpled follow-up with a gift shot. Harry Mosher then came loose and collected two more points for the Bearcats. Brandon again went into action, rolled in a nice pivot shot and the score stood 31 to 23 for the Bearcats. In three hair-raising minutes the Bearcats had upped their score by nine counts.

Four minutes were left in the game but neither team was able to score. The Coyotes fought desperately to gain and keep possession of the ball but Willamette checked closely and played safely. Coyotes Keep Lead

Most of First Half

The Coyotes led most of the first half after Swan's aggressive guard, opened the scoring with a flat shot from the corner. Eddie Frantz, who was high point man with 13 points and outstanding Bearcat, kept Willamette close behind with beautifully arched shots from the elbow which were high. Five minutes before the close Manning knotted the count with a free throw but Thompson, College of Idaho guard, got a nice set shot to make the score read 13 to 11. Pettys sunk one from under the basket to tie it up again and Lemmon scored with a corner shot to give Willamette a 15 to 13 lead at the half.

Swan's basket as the second half opened tied the score at 15 all. Eddie Frantz opened up with a long-distance basket and George Erickson sank a field goal and a free throw to give the Bearcats a five-point lead. Thompson took their turn at scoring, Thompson plopping in a field goal and a free throw and Whelchel a free throw. Gill's hawt shot put Idaho back in the lead and for the next five minutes it was nip and tuck. Frantz repeated from mid-court to shade Idaho one point but Freeman scored to drop the Bearcats back into the trailing position. Frantz again pulled Willamette ahead and the Bearcats had easy sailing until the end of the game.

Man to Man Style Used By Both S's  
Both teams played a hard-checking man to man defense. Frantz, Brandon and Erickson played outstandingly for Willamette, Whelchel, diminutive Idaho forward, and Thompson shone for the Coyotes.

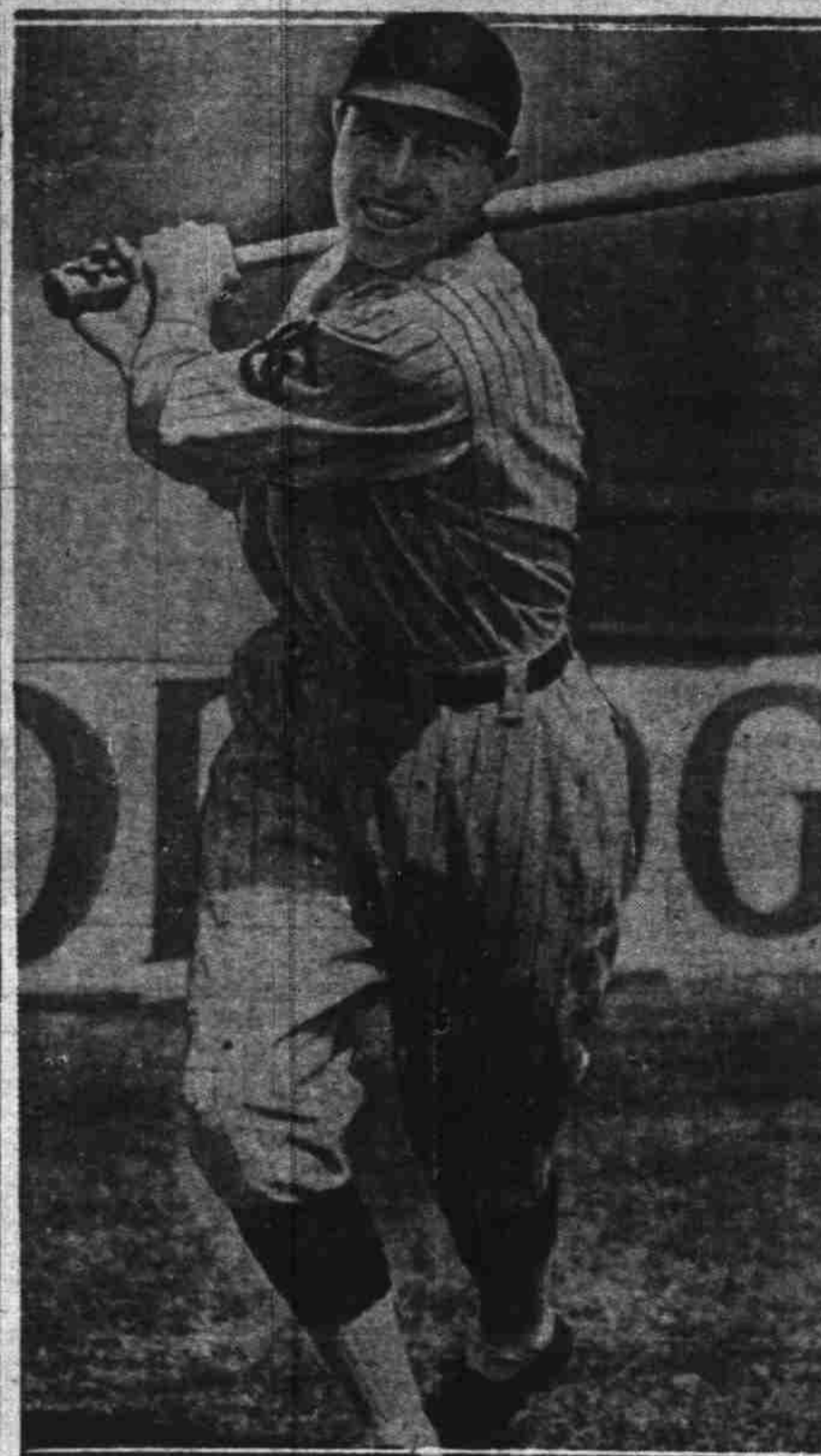

NEW YORK, Feb. 20.—(AP)—A somewhat puzzled and bewildered Babe Ruth came back from a long oriental barnstorming junket today more of a baseball mystery than ever.

He hasn't the faintest idea what he is going to do, and while he still insists he'll not wind up as a part-time player or pinch hitter, he carefully left a door open, just in case he changes his mind. Instead of the violent "No!" with which he has been dismissing all suggestions that he decorate the Yankee bench this season with occasional appearances in the field and at the plate, interviewers today were greeted with a chorus of: "I may change my mind." "It's awfully hard to get out of that suit," and "I don't know what my attitude may be later."

This much is certain. He will see Colonel Jake Ruppert, owner of the Yankees, and if the colonel insists he have another try at outfielding—and the price is right—it is an even bet the great man will reach for a fountain pen with far greater alacrity than has marked this gesture in the past 10 years.

Ruth's ambition is to manage a big league ball club and his friends believe he figures he will have a much better chance to realize this dream—with the Yankees or some other team—by remaining in harness than if he calls it quits and spends a summer or two on the golf links.
