Between 40 and 50 Marion county farmers attended an all-day meeting at the chamber of commerce yesterday afternoon in which irrigation problems were discussed at a session arranged by Harry Riches, county agent.

Art King of the state college extension service said ladino and red clover, all fruits and nuts, both wainuts and filberts, are the Marion county crops best lending themselves to irrigation. Locality with reference to water sources determines largely the type of irrigation system to be installed, he said in outlining the various systems which may be used.

Other speakers included George Kerr, also of the college extension faculty, who explained the overhead sprinkler; William F. Coshow of the state engineer's office who spoke on water rights; Dr. W. L. Powers of the state col-lege, whose topic considered the use of water in connection with planting: and William Newmyer of the Portland General Electric company offices here, who develeped use of electricity in irriga-
