HEALTH EXHIBIT IS PLACED IN CAPITOL

Deutsches Hygiene Display of Interest; Praised by Official of Hospital

Anticipating new crowds, will be interested in viewing the Deutsches hygiene museum exhibit from Dresden, Germany, the county health department has removed it from the Y. M. C. A. to the first floor corridors of the capitol and expects to leave it there for at least another week. Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, county health officer, reported yesterday. Large numbers of men, women and students viewed this display of charts, pictures and celluloid figures at the Y.

The Germans are showing the way to racial improvement through recognition of the carrying of hereditary defects from one generation to another, according to Dr. Prince W. Byrd, one of the assistant superintendents at the Oregon state hospital. Dr. Byrd gives the following explanation of the Dresden exhibit.

"This exhibit shows what is well known by students of eugenics—that certain characteristics are inherited, that the mental and physical characteristics of a child depend on the fixed characteristics of the parents. Everyone who deals with stock or agriculture follows the laws of heredity. In the human race we refuse to do this.

"The Germans know it is essential to have a good parentage and have adopted a program of encouraging marriages among those mentally and physically sound and refusing to permit marriage among the unfit. They have also adopted the program of sterilization as it applies to groups with hereditary and mental defects. This problem then is attacked at its source so that within a comparatively short time there will be racial improvement and fewer defectives to be cared for at public expense."

Wife Decides Not To Press Charge Against Husband

SILVERTON, Feb. 28.—Two cases were brought before Justice Frank Alfred Thursday afternoon. Pete Helgeson was arrested Thursday morning by S. A. Pitney on a complaint sworn out by Mrs. Helgeson charging her husband with assault and battery. At the time of the trial Mrs. Helgeson changed her mind. Helgeson pleaded not guilty. The case was dismissed with Helgeson paying court charges.

William Veasler sr., who was arrested a week ago on a charge of theft of corn was brought before Alfred today and given six months' jail sentence and paroled to Constable Pitney. Mr. Veasler pleaded guilty to the charge sworn out by M. E. DeGulre.

RUBY SALE BRINGS OUT LARGE CROWD

WALDO HILLS, Feb. 28.—The Ruby sale held today brought out the largest crowd in the history of the neighborhood.

It was estimated that close to The Dorcas society of the Trinity Lutheran church of Silvertown served luncheon and while the members have not as yet estimated their profits they know they sold 57 dozen doughnuts and 12 pounds of coffee. When they began to serve they had 500 sandwiches made which melted before the crowd. They sent to town twice for bread. Many people brought their own lunch.

600 cars lined both sides of the highway from the community house north to the Ted Lord place, and the yards at the Ruby place and the W. J. Haberly farm were filled. Close to 2000 people were in attendance.

Machinery brought good prices as did the horses and the price paid for the cows showed the confidence people have in the continued rise in butterfat. Heifers brought from \$40 to \$50 and cows from \$50 to \$84.

SALEM PICKED FOR PROPERTY SURVEY

Salem will be the only Oregon city in which the 1935 real property survey conducted by the federal housing administration will be carried on, the Salem realty board was informed at its luncheon meeting yesterday noon in a letter from Kirk Reynolds, acting chief underwriter for the FHA.
