

LANDMARK GIVING WAY TO PROGRESS

Old Community Hall Razed for Erection of Fine New Building

LIBERTY, Feb. 28. — The old community hall building around which has centered so much local history is being torn down this week and will be replaced by a new structure on the north side of the schoolhouse.

The building began as a small one-room schoolhouse which so many of the older residents of the Red Hills section and others, since moved, attended. It stood on the spot now occupied by the schoolhouse and itself replaced the first pioneer log schoolhouse. It stood on land on which the first government survey hereabouts was made, November 24, 1854, and consisted of 320 acres belonging to Joseph Patterson.

The southwest corner of this land, five acres of it, is the school property, having been deeded to the school district in 1869 by Charles Swegle, fourth owner of the land, for a consideration of \$25 and the provision that the plot should always be used for a school.

A school district had been organized June 1, 1868, by L. J. Powell, then Marion county school superintendent. The boundaries then included what is now Liberty and a great deal of what are now the districts of Salem Heights, Rosedale, Prospect and Pringle. The boundaries were changed from time to time as the county became settled.

crowded and was enlarged to a two-room building. Again becoming overcrowded it was moved to the southeast corner of the property and the present four-room school was built about 1907 on the same site.

The little building has been used for various community activities since that time to the present. The auditorium was enlarged by moving the stage to the west wall of the structure and a kitchen annex built during the 1931-1932 season by the community club and was equipped for indoor basketball playing.

Some of the lumber from the razed structure is to be utilized in making forms in the erection of the new building.
