

Business Stocks and Grains Firm

CHICAGO, March 1.-(AP) - Responding to a late upturn of wheat prices at Winnipeg, grain markets in Chicago rallied just before the close today, and practically overcame earlier setbacks. Reports of enlarged domestic flour trade in the southwest were an aid to wheat rallies here. Unfavorable crop advices from west and southwest sections of the United States winter wheat belt, together with renewed notice of lack of subsoil
