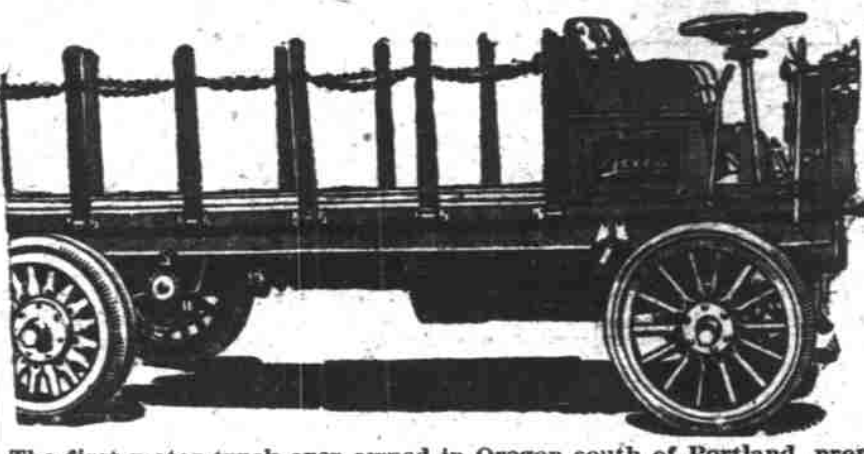
Kirkland will be assisted by Alan Earle of Salem.

The decree declares plaintiffs Alois Bell and Lucy Bell have no further interest in the property as they sold their interest to Bertha and Joe Hendricks; and that Frank Bell, deceased, had only a life estate interest in the property.

First Truck; Came 24 Years Ago



The first motor truck ever owned in Oregon south of Portland, property of J. H. Stanton. It arrived in Salem 24 years ago today.

Advent of First Auto Truck Recalled by Owner, Stanton

Twenty-four years ago today J. H. Stanton drove his brand-new Kelly truck up in front of the Willamette (Marion) hotel and parked it for the admiring populace to inspect. It had just arrived by river boat from Portland and was the first truck in Oregon south of Portland.

A ponderous yet mighty vehicle it was, with solid rubber tires and immense steering wheel that rose almost perpendicular from the floor boards.

Stanton was in a reminiscent mood yesterday as he showed the cut of his first truck and told how in 1911 he and two other families went to the very end of the old road to Tillamook and camped there. Everywhere he parked it, he said, a crowd of men, women and children would immediately gather to discuss in great detail

the novelty of the machine. He sold it several years later.

Salem and the Willamette valley have been Mr. Stanton's home for 45 years. He used to carry San Francisco papers on a horse to Salem home, the news arriving two days late from California. This was in 1892. He piloted a street car in Salem from 1899 to 1902 and in Portland from 1903 to 1905.

Since that time, he has worked in several different fields, but usually at a job that was connected with trucking or stages. He was a guard at the Oregon state penitentiary from 1931 to 1933 and at the present time is manager of the Glenwood apartments.

Stanton has lived in Oregon all his life and knows it from A to Z. He said yesterday he still liked to live here and was not thinking of moving anywhere else.

FRED TOOZE BUYS FIRST BABY BOND

Salem's first citizen to buy one of the new government "baby" bonds was Fred J. Tooze who purchased a bond for his son, Fred J. Tooze, Jr.

Approximately \$3000 have been invested in these bonds to date, according to Postmaster Henry R. Crawford.

These bonds which range in value from \$25 to \$500 maturity value are limited so that the purchaser may not buy more than \$10,000 maturity value in bonds per year.

The federal government will also act as guardian of the bonds if the purchaser so desires. Federal reserve banks will be utilized for their keeping. Postmasters will not, however, act as a safekeeping agent.

These bonds may be purchased by two persons with both names on the bonds, and are payable to either of the co-signers without the signature of the other.

CATTLE FIELD DAY SCHEDULED FRIDAY

A beef cattle field day meeting will be held at the farm of J. J. Doerflinger, one mile west of the Victor Point school in the Waldo Hills district at 10 o'clock Friday forenoon, March 8, announces County Agent Harry L. Riches. This meeting is for the purpose of discussing problems pertaining to beef cattle feeding, and the probable outlook for expansion in beef cattle feeding as a means of utilizing the surplus hay and other feeds here in the Willamette valley.

Harry Lindgren and Ben Rodendahl of the extension service at Oregon State college will be present at this meeting, and will take part in the discussion. Anyone interested in feeding beef cattle is invited to attend this meeting.

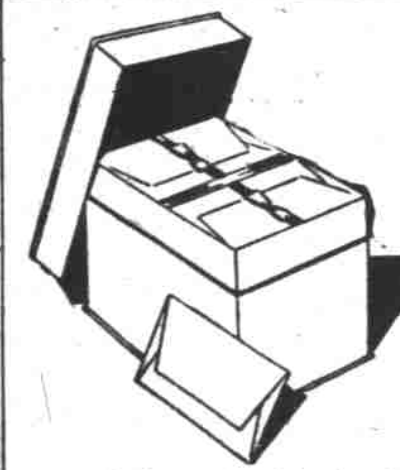
