

WOMEN'S CLUB HAS WELFARE LUNCHEON

Mrs. Saidie Orr Dunbar Tells of Board Meeting at Nation's Seat

DALLAS, March 7.—The annual March public welfare luncheon of the Dallas woman's club was the occasion of a most spring like affair Tuesday afternoon, when Mrs. Saidie Orr Dunbar of Portland was the guest speaker. She was accompanied to Dallas by Mrs. Clyde Lewis, formerly vice-president of the Washington state federation, Mrs. T. E. Edmunds and Mrs. George G. Root, all of Portland.

Mrs. Dunbar presented in a vivid manner the various speakers who appeared before the members at the recent general federation board meeting in Washington, D. C. Among them were Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins who outlined her plan for national security, unemployment insurance and old age pensions.

Mrs. Root urged the clubwomen to take an active part in the subscription campaign of the Oregon Clubwoman whereby four women from Oregon will have all transportation paid to the Detroit convention where Mrs. Dunbar will be a candidate for first vice-president of the general federation.

Musical numbers were provided by Mrs. Bruce Spaulding who presented Miss Mary Elizabeth Kells of Salem in two vocal numbers and Miss Mary Sargent of Willamette university in two piano solos.

Mrs. Ivan Warner presented a short history of the painter Rembrandt and his picture "The Mill". Miss Mary Saats of the Dallas high school told of the debate team's work this year.

Members voted to sponsor a pre-school and baby clinic some time in April or early May under direction of Miss Margaret Gillis, county nurse. Voluntary contributions for the milk funds were asked. Some 30 children are being provided with milk in the primary grades each day. A contribution was also made by the club towards the ambulance fund.

RE-ELECT TEACHERS AT SAME SALARIES

SILVERTON, March 7. — At the March meeting of the Silverton school board held Wednesday night the present staff of teachers and other employees of the district were reelected for the coming school year at the regular scheduled salaries. The board did not restore any of the two salary cuts made during the past two years.

The opening date for school was set at the third Monday in September. This is one week later than school opened this year. The board also voted to purchase the Tokstad property that lies north of the Smith-Hughes classroom. This property is purchased from funds voted in January 17, 1935, for the purpose of acquiring property. The property was purchased so that the school would have a driveway clear through the block in order to better deliver wood to the school.

Prisoners' Meal Cost Up Because Few Served Now

In submitting bill to the county court for prisoners' board during the month of February, Sheriff A. C. Burk raised the meal ante per prisoner per day from 45 to 55 cents. On the 50-cent rate, the bill is \$163.50 for 327 prisoners days.

Burk stated he does not expect to have to keep the board bill at the 50 cent rate, but that it was necessary during February because of the small number of prisoners on hand and the higher costs for foodstuffs. Peak of prisoners during the month was 22, with seven only for a number of days. The bill had not been audited yesterday.
