Citrus Fruit Uses Wanted for Round Table Contest

Grated rind of lemon and orange is used more and more as a flavor for desserts, salads and soups. Any recipe calling for a citrus fruit is eligible in the Round Table contest this coming week. Either fresh or canned fruits, such as canned grapefruit in salad or fruit cocktail, may be called for.

Citrus fruits are plentiful and inexpensive now in addition to being safeguards against colds and other winter ailments.

More lamb recipes follow:

Lamb Hints

Roast lamb can be given a delightful flavor by basting every 15 minutes with the following mixture:

- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon onion
- 1/2 teaspoon garlic
- vinegar
- 6 tablespoons salad oil

Before broiling lamb chops, rub a little powdered ginger, salt and a dash of cinnamon into the meat.

Breast of Lamb

- 1 small shoulder and breast of lamb
- 2 sprigs parsley
- 1 carrot
- 2 medium onions
- 1 clove garlic
- 1 bay leaf
- 1/2 can tomatoes
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 1 pint water

Select a nice fresh breast and shoulder of lamb. Have the retailer remove all of the bones. Wipe carefully with a damp cloth. Take 1 cup of bread crumbs which have been wet and squeezed dry. Season well with one chopped onion, clove of garlic, grated parsley, bay leaf and salt to taste. Put in a frying pan with 1 tablespoon of butter and fry about 5 minutes. Place this dressing in the open side of the lamb and roll it up in the meat. Tie securely with twine or fasten with skewers. Slice carrot, onion and a turnip very fine and fry in 1 tablespoon of butter in a deep pan. When brown, add the lamb and let simmer about 15 minutes. Then add the tomatoes and the pint of boiling water which should just cover the meat. Reduce the

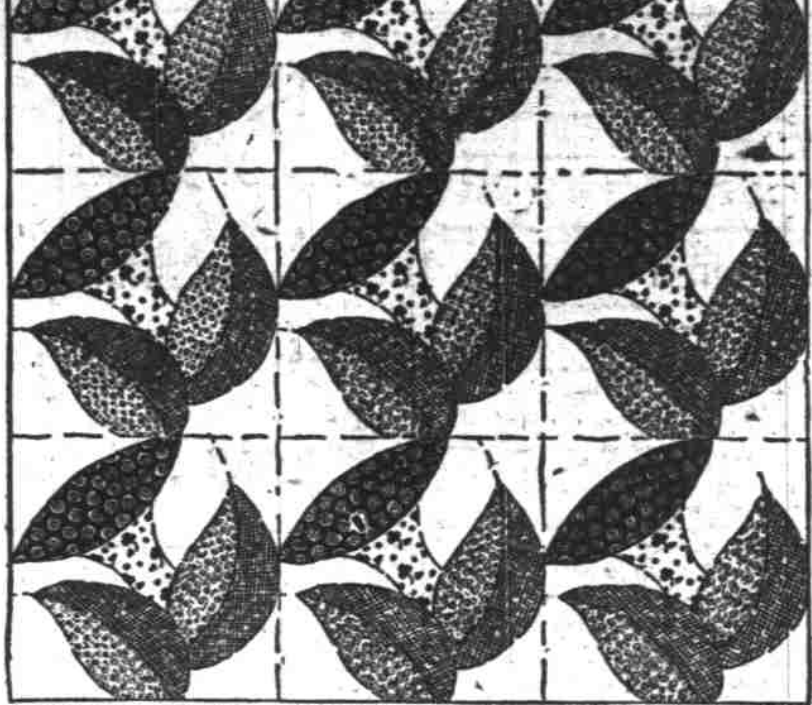
Mrs. Miller Struck and Seriously Hurt
