

SUMMER PROJECTS LISTED BY HARDING

Harding Asks Program For Stimulating 4-H Club Vacation Activity

With a two-fold purpose to increase membership in livestock and crop 4-H clubs and to promote more 4-H club work during the summer months for boys and girls in town, Wayne D. Harding, county 4-H club leader, is sending out letters to all teachers in the county asking them to point out such projects that are available.

Boys and girls who carry on projects during the summer will have opportunity to compete with other 4-H youths at the Marion county club fair to be held in the fall just prior to the state fair. Four-H work is organized in clubs of five or more members, with some responsible leaders.

The following are some good projects for boys and girls either living in town or in the country: Gardening—Smallest garden 600 square feet, plant 5 varieties. Home beautification—Improve-

ment of the home yard. Rose and flower—Planting and care of roses and flowers.

Rabbit—Care of one or more does together with young rabbits.

Poultry—Care of chickens, turkeys or ducks.

Cooking—Any of 3 different divisions or camp cookery. Clothing—Any of 3 divisions or bachelor sewing for boys.

Handicraft—Making at least 6 articles of wood. Canning—Division 1 canning at least 25 quarts of fruit.

Homemaking—Completion of 10 lessons in homemaking or kitchen.

Room improvement—Doing at least 6 things to improve a bedroom.

A boy or girl on the farm could have one of these projects that have been mentioned and many others:

Corn—1/2 acre or more for seed or silage. Potato—1/2 acre or more. Seed project—1 acre or more of oats, wheat clover or other crop for seed.

Larson is Reported Steadily Improving

POWER DISCUSSES SOCIAL MEDICINE

Dr. F. K. Power discussed "Social Medicine" before the Y. Forum last night, presenting the arguments for and against the system. He explained the practice in foreign countries, especially Germany, where medical service on a cooperative basis is compulsory. In giving his own ideas Dr. Power advanced a suggestion for cooperative medical service for persons in the lower middle income group. He emphasized the wisdom of separating strictly medical care from compensation for loss of work, putting the former in hands of the professional group and the latter in the hands of laymen.

General discussion followed Dr. Power's presentation.

LONG TERM LOANS PERMISSION GIVEN

Permission to make long-term insured mortgage loans under provisions of Title II of the National Housing act was received here yesterday by the Salem Federal Savings and Loan association.

Keith Powell, manager of the association, secured the information by telegram from John R. B. Byers who is director of savings and loan relations for the housing administration.

Powell said the association, under provisions of the housing act, could loan up to 80 per cent on firm values on home properties, providing the appraisals met the requirements of the appraisers of the housing administration. Arrangements have not yet been completed for the establishment of an intermediary corporation which will guarantee mortgages under Title II of the housing program. Powell anticipates that his association will move slowly in making advances under the new authorization.

However, the new association is steadily making commitments on its own type of home mortgages and Powell reports that assets of

the association are increasing satisfactorily.

OREGON ARTILLERY SECOND IN NATION

To the 249th coast artillery of the Oregon national guard went high honors yesterday when the war department informed headquarters here that the regiment had been adjudged the second most efficient in the entire United States. Lieutenant Colonel Clifton M. Irwin of Salem commands the regiment. Units are located in Klamath Falls, Ashland, Cottage Grove, Marshfield, Albany and Salem.

The rating is based on the general efficiency of the regiment during the training year just closed and includes all phases in operation, from target practice with the plant guns at the mouth of the Columbia to army target practice with the .22 rifle.

The Oregon artillery regiment was 14 points below the 198th coast artillery regiment of the Delaware National Guard which had a rating of 98.2 per cent. The rating of the 249th coast artillery was 96.8 per cent as compared with its previous record in 1933 of 95.92 per cent.

CITY'S CHAIN STORE TAX DEEMED LEGAL

Authority exists in any Oregon municipality to tax chain stores without violating any constitutional provision, the state supreme court held yesterday in an opinion by Justice Bean. The decision sustained a lower court opinion given to Portland in a suit brought against it by the Safeway company.

Arguments that legislatures of the state have repeatedly refused to pass chain store taxes were held to have no bearing on the question by the court. "The policy of the state is shown by the constitution and its enacted laws," the court ruled. "The ordinance does not conflict with the purpose or spirit of the substantive laws of the state to correct improper Justice Rossman in an earlier decision affecting Multnomah county upheld the conviction of Thomas F. Black, Malcolm R. Samuelson and James Hanlon, sentenced to serve one year in jail in Multnomah county for assault and battery. The defendants were arrested last June following an assault on special police officers during the longshoremen's strike.

Orthopedic Test Machine Will Be At Salem Store

The only machine in Oregon for testing orthopedic balance, the "Robalin", will be at Acklin's Bootery, 105 North High street, Thursday, Friday and Saturday in connection with the spring showing of Cantilever shoes.

The machine shows whether or not the body weight is properly distributed over the soles of the feet, whether weight falls too much on the outside, inside, the toes or the heels. Such conditions are indicated on the machine when the visitor merely steps onto it in stocking feet.

Acklin's has arranged this three-day showing as an added service to patrons, for with facts revealed by the "Robalin" test, exact shoes to correct improper balance may be fitted.

He issues a general invitation to the public to attend his open house, to see the many changes he has made in what for many years was the Gray Belle, and to enjoy refreshments "on the house." Open house hours will be from 7:30 to 9:30 p. m. tonight; the Quelle will open for business at 6 a. m. Thursday.

A large expenditure has been made by Chatas in remodeling and re-equipping this restaurant. He has installed an air conditioning system on the main floor which will keep the air fresh, warm in winter and cool in summer, and greatly improved ventilation facilities in the basement banquet room, which will continue to be known as the Silver Grille.

Entering the Quelle, the visitor finds a long lunch

and fountain counter with rotating chairs to his right, a row of cushion-seated booths to his left and another row immediately ahead, toward the rear. All woodwork has been painted in cream color with small modernistic designs in red and black. It is pleasingly set off by a darker wall paper of attractive design on the upper walls.

Through serving windows to the extreme rear may be seen the latest types of cafe kitchen equipment: Steam tables to keep hot dishes hot, refrigerated salad tables to keep salads cool, tile floors for sanitation. An auxiliary serving kitchen has been installed in the basement for service to the banquet room.

Chatas says he has developed a type of restaurant service which he finds meets with customer satisfaction. One of its features is that the customer never need look hungrily after a waitress—one always is at hand to hear the customer's wants.
