Community Service Work Done

Planning and launching projects for improvement of conditions in their communities will be the major activity of the American Legion Auxiliary's 8,500 local units during March, according to Mrs. A. H. Wilson, chairman of the community service committee of Capital Unit of the Auxiliary here. Hundreds of different types of projects will be undertaken by Auxiliary Units this year, she predicted.

Aid to public libraries, begun with important results last year, will be the project chosen by many Auxiliary units this year.

The objectives of the Auxiliary's library program, as outlined by Mrs. J. Allison Hardy, of Columbus, Miss., national chairman, are: first, establishing county libraries; second, making existing libraries more efficient by providing more and better books, extending activities to more people, and making better use of equipment already possessed; and third, making the public library minded.

OLIVER'S TEXTBOOK IS HANDED PRAISE

The book Readings for Ideas and Form, edited by Professor Egbert S. Oliver, of Willamette university, and recently published by Doubleday, Doran and company, is being favorably received. It is designed as a book of readings to illustrate various kinds, styles, and forms of writing for use as a text in college composition classes. Professor Oliver has received many letters from various people commenting on the book.

"I consider it a truly excellent book," wrote one English professor. "I think you have gone far to appeal to the student with something he will be interested in." Another wrote, "I was indeed pleased to receive Readings for Ideas and Form, which I found a very interesting collection."

"I think the book is very fine in all respects," wrote a third. "It is a good job of printing and binding, the essays are very well selected, and the questions are very good.
