Crop Damage Reports Grow

TOBACCO HEAVINESS KEEPS STREET DOWN

NEW YORK, March 20.—(AP)—The stock market saw-sawed gently today, and a little heaviness in the tobacco shares appeared to be enough to tip it downward toward the close.

Activity continued at restricted levels. Turnover in the stock exchange was only 487,849 shares, a little below that develop in the modest upturn over the previous session. The Associated Press average for 60 stocks declined 2 1/2 points at 55.2.

Coca-Cola, now the highest priced active share on the big board with the exception of Homestake Mining, got under way today to advance 7/8 points to 188. Revising the perennial talk in financial quarters of a possible split-up of shares, in the list of the usual leaders Standard Oil of N. J. turned in about the best performance with a lift of around a point to 37 3/8, leading moderate improvement in most oil shares.

American Smelting was down around a point at 32 1/2 and other issues among the mines were similarly soft. Most trading fractions confined their reaction to fractions, however, including U. S. Steel at 27 7/8, American Telephone at 100 1/4, Bethlehem at 23 1/8, N. Y. Central at 12 1/2 and Santa Fe at 39.
