

LIQUOR BOARD APPOINTS ALLEN

Reasons for Ousting Frank Spencer Not Divulged; Disagreement Hinted

Spencer also was reported to have offended a number of liquor distributors by refusing to see them. The distributors resorted to pleas to the commission members for consideration of their products for the state stores.

Commission members several weeks ago expressed themselves as dissatisfied with Spencer's presentation of liquor administration facts to legislative committees but there was no indication that his resignation would be asked.

The executive offices here said Governor Martin, while a close friend of Spencer, who served as Martin's treasurer in the gubernatorial campaign, would not interfere with his commission, once the latter had asked that Spencer be released.

PENDLETON, Ore., March 27. —(AP)—Oregon's new liquor administrator, Jack E. Allen, has been one of Pendleton's most successful business men and an active civic worker for 19 years.

Allen was born in La Grande and lived in Spokane and Albany before coming here. He owns a sporting goods and automobile accessory business in Pendleton and for six years was owner of a similar business in La Grande. He sold out there a year ago.

Allen, who is chairman of the parks commission and ex-officio member of the Pendleton round-up board, served as mayor of Pendleton in 1933 and 1934.

Running on a democratic ticket last November, he was elected to the four-year term as state senator from the joint Umatilla-Cannon-Morrow district.

He is a former president of the Kiwanis club, active in the Country club which he gave the Jack Allen trophy; is past president of the Hunters and Anglers' club; past exalted ruler of the Elks; past commander of the Knights of Pythias, and now is serving his second term as head of the Eagles' lodge.

TUGWELL HEADS NEW SETUP TO END AAA

WASHINGTON, March 27. —(AP)—A new organization holding future potentialities for replacing the AAA's present method of crop control was established today at the department of agriculture under Rexford G. Tugwell.

The move was a consolidation of federal agencies dealing with soil erosion. Tugwell, undersecretary of agriculture, is expected to direct—through the use of about one billion dollars in public work funds—the administration's land use program.

ELSIE BROWN NOT INSANE, DECIDED

Elsie Brown, accused by the state of giving poison tablets to Harley Davis last Friday at the state hospital, is not insane, Dr. V. E. Hockett, county physician, announced yesterday after giving her a thorough examination.

Mrs. Brown is scheduled to come before Justice Miller Hayden tomorrow morning to make her plea on the charge of attempted manslaughter which the state has placed against her. It was deemed probable yesterday that she would waive her plea and consent to being bound over to the grand jury.

Meanwhile Davis, who took the poison in what he says was a suicide pact, is improving at the state hospital where he is an inmate. Officials said yesterday they expected him to recover.

DIVORCEE FRIEND ASSISTS LAMSON

SAN JOSE, Calif., March 27. —(AP)—David Lamson, frequently mentioned "divorcee friend" came to his defense in a surprise move at his second wife-murder trial here today and struck back at prosecution inferences she was the "other woman" in a tragic marital triangle.

The witness, Mrs. Nell Simonds, who identified herself as the former Mrs. Sara Kelley of Sacramento, denied she and Lamson had an affair shortly before his wife's bathtub death on Memorial day, 1933.

Mrs. Simonds, her face partly hidden by a heavy black hat, denied she was near the Stanford university campus that Memorial day, or the night before.

A prosecution witness had testified that he saw Lamson with his arms around a blonde woman in a parked automobile a few hours before his wife's nude body was discovered in the bathtub of their Stanford campus home.

Pepco Holding Company Issues New Trust Bond

Local holders of debentures of the Pacific Northwest Public Service company are receiving notices that the reorganization plan has been approved by Federal Judge McNary and that debentures or certificates of deposit may be exchanged for the new collateral trust income bonds of the Portland Electric Power company, as the new holding company will be known. The September 1, 1934 coupon may be cashed now. Subsequent coupons may be cashed only when earned income is sufficient in the opinion of the directors to warrant the payment, but the interest accumulates.

The status of the holders of preferred stock in the holding company, whose principal subsidiary is the Portland General Electric company, is not affected by the reorganization.

Auto Company is Sued; \$2850 Asked

Suit for \$2850 was filed here yesterday by Helene Lang against the State Farm Mutual Auto company. Plaintiff asserts that she was a \$2850 judgment last December from the company as a defendant with Albert Given in an auto accident case. Given was unable to meet the judgment and the company refuses to do so, plaintiff asserts.

inforced, kept the throng back from the darkened legation, cries of "Hitler, give it to them in the neck!" "Fuehrer, bring Memel home," and "give us the murderers," filled the air.

A telephone inquiry at the legation late this evening elicited the laconic reply: "All over, no damage done."

KAUNAS, Lithuania, March 27. —(AP)—Lithuania moved forcefully today to forestall any disorders in Memel, former German possession, after yesterday's military court verdict sentencing four Germans to death.

The sentences, imposed for murder alleged to have been committed in the course of an asserted Nazi plot to snatch Memel from Lithuania, stirred widespread resentment both in the district's German population and in Germany itself.

Fearing demonstrations, the Lithuanian army today cancelled all police leaves in Memel and ordered back to duty all Lithuanian border police on leave.

The entire nation, with its population of 2,500,000, was described as ready for an eventuality.

DEPORTATION FACES CHICKEN IMITATOR

PORTLAND, Ore., March 27. —(AP)—Because Stephen Fink, 57, is adept at imitating the calling of a chicken, he faces deportation from the United States.

State police came upon him near Medford. He had hidden in a ditch near a farm, they said, had covered himself with brush, and by amazingly lifelike cackles was enticing the farm chickens within range and popping them into a bag. He was serving 30 days when immigration officers looked in on him.

They reported he came to the United States in 1929, returned to serve in the Austrian army in 1904, came back here in 1907, left for Mexico during the world war, and returned to America in 1919. Roy Norene, immigration inspector, said his entries were illegal.

STATE SCHOOL PAY BOOST IS GRANTED

Marks, Lelf Finseth, C. A. Brand, B. F. Irvine, Herman Oliver and Chancellor W. J. Kerr and the secretary of the board, Charles D. Byrne.

The board's statement said the educational system could not go as far as the law provides for general departments, and hence could make only the flat 10 per cent restoration for salaries below \$101 a month instead of restoring those in full.

The effect of the new scale, which starts with March 1, is to leave the cuts ranging from 4.5 per cent to 27 per cent under the original base instead of 5 to 30 per cent as at present. The board's statement explained that this still leaves a great disparity as many of the institutions and the federal government have fully restored salaries.

Millage Diversion
Changes Worked
The budget problem, the statement set out that budget balancing is now more than ever a task because of the \$75,000 diversion from the millage fund, continued decrease in valuation on which millage income is based, and rising cost of materials and supplies. Some increase in enrollment was forecast making more tax income but also adding some to instruction costs.

Consideration was also given a proposal to locate northwest plant breeding work for erosion control in Oregon in which the federal government would cooperate with the experiment station. Definite action was deferred until more complete information is obtained.

PARDON REQUEST IS DENIED BY MARTIN

Governor Martin yesterday refused the request of Walter E. Baer of Portland, for a pardon, so that he might escape deportation to Germany. Baer's deportation case is now in the federal courts.

The records show that Baer has served two terms in the Oregon state penitentiary for forgery and previously was an inmate of the Idaho prison.

"Crime has reached such heights in the United States as to have become a public scandal," Governor Martin declared in refusing the pardon. "Executives have not upheld the hands of the courts and juries. The president has taken the lead to bring about a restoration of public safety. I have determined that except in unusual cases I will not pardon criminals."

"I feel that criminals have embarked upon a course of their own choosing and that stern and repressive measures are necessary at this juncture. I shall not compromise with crime."

"Furthermore, I cannot interfere with the action of the federal government in matters of deportation of criminals. To do so would be an abuse of power."

Recreation Area Above Detroit to Be Talked Here

An open meeting at the Salem chamber of commerce next Monday night was called yesterday, its purpose being to afford a general discussion of means available for developing a recreational area above Detroit. The district would be used as both a summer and winter playground.

P. A. Thompson of Eugene, supervisor of the Willamette for-

est, will attend the meeting, as will Ray Elliott, Detroit ranger. Thompson has reported to the chamber here that the federal government is anxious to cooperate to the full in developing the area.

Invited to the meeting next Monday are members of the Salem Hunters and Anglers' club, of the Isaac Walton league, of the Salem Ski club and of the Chemeketas.

STUDY OF AURORA ROADS IS ORDERED

A thorough investigation of the way county roads near Aurora are being handled, both in the amount of money expended and the efficiency of the way construction and maintenance jobs are done, was ordered here yesterday by the county court.

The order followed the filing of a petition signed by more than 100 citizens of the north end of the county, asking that a change be made in the road organization there.

The court was told in the petition that roads "are being neglected by persons responsible for their upkeep."

Grant Jones is foreman in the Aurora district. Patrol work is done by Foreman Miller and John Griesebauer.

Members of the court pointed out to the petitioners that road expenditures have been greatly curtailed throughout the county, only a third as much being spent as was expended by the county five years ago on road upkeep. Commissioner Roy Melson said only two other districts in the county had received more money for roads than the Aurora section.

Second Newcomer Meeting Will Be Held Here Today

The second of a series of meetings for newcomers to Marion county, in cooperation with the Salem chamber of commerce, will be held this afternoon at 1:30 o'clock, according to County Agent Harry L. Riches. Dairying and fruit problems will be the subjects for the meeting. Members of the extension staff at Oregon State college will be present, and O. T. McWhorter will discuss "Fruit Problems". Roger W. Morse will discuss "Dairying".

Three prizes arranged for with local merchants will be awarded. All farmers who are newcomers to Marion county are invited to attend this meeting.

Appeal Papers in Cusick Will Case Filed Wednesday

Transcript on appeal in the Cusick will contest was filed yesterday in circuit court here. Maud M. Babcock and a number of the other relatives of Mrs. Cusick are seeking to upset the will. Dr. W. B. More and others are named defendants.

Assets involved in the contest exceed \$50,000.

The transcript of the testimony in probate court here contains 198 closely typed pages. In addition a sheaf of exhibits accompanies the appeal.

The defendants won in probate court, Judge John Sigmund upholding the validity of Mrs. Cusick's will.

HOP SALES SLOW; 11 CENTS IS PAID

Only 30 bales of hops have passed from growers' to dealers' hands in Oregon in the past 10 days, reports H. A. Cornoyer, secretary of the Oregon Hop Growers' association. On this deal, at 11 cents per pound, Linn bought from Frink and Foster of Dallas.

The three coast growing states have about 31,000 bales more of hops on hand today than they had at this date a year ago, with Oregon holding about 35,500 bales as compared to 29,500 in March, 1934.

The older growers and dealers are inclined to hold no immediate optimism for the hop deal, as
