CREDIT POLICY

- 1. We shall avoid practices which may result in the consumer becoming involved beyond his ability to pay, thereby impairing his future purchasing power.
- 2. Before opening an account or extending retail credit, adequate information shall be obtained to determine the responsibility and the current credit status of each individual. This shall be accomplished by clearing, giving, and securing all credit information through a recognized credit reporting bureau.
- 3. It is essential that in extending any retail credit accommodation that the individual shall be advised of the terms thereof, which shall include a definite due date. This date shall be as follows: Monthly accounts are due when rendered and are overdue after the tenth of the month, or other pre-arranged date.
- 4. Every deferred payment account and every monthly charge account shall be opened with an understanding as to definite due date. It is to be understood and accepted as a part of a community credit policy that an account is overdue on the day following the definite due date for
- 5. A carrying or interest charge shall be added to all merchandise sold on the deferred payment plan. Deferred payment merchandise shall be meant to include all sales where title is retained by the vendor.
- 6. All accounts closed for cause shall be promptly reported to the Credit Bureau, and name listed on information sheet going to the members the following week, and no member shall open an account with such parties until such account is paid, or satisfactory arrangements made.
- 7. That each subscriber hereto will place a placard in a conspicuous place in his place of business, which advertises the provisions of this community code.
