Mosher, Barnett Lead Northwest, Forensic Work

William Mosher and Garfield Barnett, both Willamette university seniors, have together in four years of forensic activity, built up individual records which are considered the best in the Pacific northwest.

"Bill" Mosher has participated in 74 debates, winning 47. Of the balance 11 were non-decision affairs. In 1934 he won the Pacific slope extempore speaking contest. This tournament includes all of the larger colleges west of the Rocky mountains. This year he won the Linfield extempore speaking contest.

Barnett has engaged in 81 debates winning 50. Ten were non-decision engagements. He won second place in this year's Linfield extempore speaking contest, bested only by his teammate, "Bill" Mosher.

Wallace to Take Fight to Solons If Ruling Adverse

Lew Wallace of Portland, whose eligibility to serve both as a state legislator and member of the state game commission, has been questioned, conferred with state officials here yesterday. Persons who questioned Wallace's status referred to the state constitution which prohibits a person from holding two or more lucrative public offices at the same time.

Wallace said he had been advised by his attorney to hold on to both jobs. He indicated that if the attorney general ruled against him the question would be carried into the legislature to keep his seat in the house.
