division the highest minimum rate in the United States."

"Four-L wage studies are based on the figures showing the actual conditions in the industry. Employees working under these standards consider that when all the facts are examined, the 4L has and will continue to make equitable adjustments in the interests of higher standards."

"This organization is not doing anything to minimize the work of other organizations or groups to bring general wage standards in non-4L mills to those maintained in 4L mills."

He said in the southern pine belt more than half the workers are paid at the minimum rates, averaging 24 cents an hour, while the Western Pine and West Coast divisions pay the minimum rate of 42 1/2 cents an hour with only 25 per cent of the employees receiving as low as the minimum.

PATMAN BILL STAND HELD NOT OFFICIAL

Opposition to the Patman bill, so-called inflation bonus measure, as telegraphed to Washington D. C., recently by the Willamette university faculty was neither official nor sanctioned by the university. Coach Roy S. Keene told Capital Post No. 3, American Legion last night that he had been requested to announce. He said the telegram was an act of certain faculty members, not of the institution.

"I still insist that we have a debate on the subject," declared Bryan H. Conley, department commander of the Veterans of Foreign Wars, in reply to Keene's announcement. Conley challenged the Willamette faculty to a debate on the Patman bill after the news of the professors' vote was published.

The scheduled bonus discussion at the meeting ended when by a close vote the question of supporting the Patman bill was laid on the table.

City Warrants Will Be Called For Redemption

City Treasurer C. O. Rice today will call between \$15,000 and \$20,000 worth of city warrants for redemption. He announced yesterday upon the receipt of a \$43,333.89 tax turnover from the county treasurer. The remainder of the tax money will be kept for meeting bond maturities. Payment of principal and interest amounting to \$28,250 on bridge and \$2051.25 on sewer bonds will be due May 1.

Virtually all of the city's outstanding unpaid warrants will be redeemed if a proposed issue of warrant refunding bonds is voted by the people at a special election June 20. With city of Salem bonds now selling at around 2 per cent interest, half of the 6 per cent interest charge drawn by the warrants would be saved.

LOCATION OF CCC CAMPS IS SETTLED

WASHINGTON, April 15.—(AP)—Oregon will have 65 CCC camps during the coming summer, Senator Steiwer (R-Ore.) announced today in making known a list of 26 additional camps.

Eight of the camps will be re-established as follows:

Camp Sherman, Jefferson county; Cascade Locks, Hood River county; Elk Creek and Rush, Jackson county; Port Orford, Curry county; Mapleton, Lane county; Roseburg, Douglas county; Detroit, Marion county.

New camps will be established:

Elk lake, Deschutes county; Silver lake and Paisley, Lake county; Burns, Harney county; Medford (land grant), Jackson county; Yachats and Triangle lake, Lane county; Drain (land grant), Douglas county; Hilyard (private), Union county; Falls City, Polk county; Tillamook, Tillamook county; Lacombe (private), Linn county.

Biological survey camps:

Burns and French Glen, Harney county.

State parks:

Long Tom, Lane county; Battle Mountain, Umatilla county; Shelton, Wheeler county; Prescott Memorial, Jackson county.

Investigating charges against Hutton. Nor has the special committee authority to obtain any of the evidence the fire and water committee has compiled since January 1, it was stated.

The fire and water committee said that its resolution against Hutton was drawn only after thorough investigation on its part. Members of the committee said they were charged by Mayor V. E. Kuhn at the beginning of his term, to look into the condition of the fire department and to make recommendations. The charges preferred against Hutton were made from the oral and written testimony brought the committee during its investigation.

Civil Service Board May Consider Case

Should the city council, at its next meeting, adopt the resolution calling for an investigation of charges against Hutton, the next step would be the thorough-going hearing by the civil service commission which would then report its findings and recommendations to the aldermen. Only the council can oust the fire chief, who in turn has a right, under the civil service ordinance, to appeal to the circuit court.

Members of the commission are A. H. Moore, chairman, whose fairness was attacked by Alderman Vandervort, and Paul Johnson and A. A. Gueffroy.

Until Monday noon the fire and water committee of the council was prepared to ask the council to oust Hutton last night. Yielding to criticism that such a procedure would mean dismissal of the fire chief without any chance for him to defend himself, the committee amended its resolution. In the form for which approval was sought last night from the council, Hutton was not removed; in the hands of the civil service commission was placed the responsibility for investigating Hutton's conduct and removal could only be made by the council adopting the recommendations of the commission, should these recommendations call for his ouster.

who are unable to work, were to make up all or part of the wages the S.E.R.A. employees were unable to earn last week because projects were closed down. In some cases the workers will receive part of their lost wages in requisitions and the remainder through job assignments this month.

Miss Gordon's estimate of the total amount of the orders, which may be turned in for groceries at approved stores, was based on a \$2.40 daily wage, on the basis of an average of three days' work lost by each worker.

A development of yesterday's requisition distribution, in which Willamette university sociology students assisted, was the tentative planning of a course in relief case work which may be offered the volunteers. Miss Gordon Wednesday will speak to the university sociology classes concerning the use to which training in this subject may be put. If there is sufficient interest, she will organize the relief work course.

MINTURN HEAD OF RADIO AMATEURS

Howard Minturn of Salem was elected president of the Oregon Amateur Radio association at the fourth annual state convention which ended Sunday night at Corvallis after a two-days' conference. The meeting for 1935 will be held in Salem with the local Amateur Radio society serving as host.

The convention was given over to technical discussions, inspection of the equipment in the physics and engineering departments of the state school, and to a demonstration of the work of KOAC and of Corvallis short wave stations.

The gathering at Corvallis was the best attended of any ever held in the state, 175 amateur radio fans being present.

Tebbets Will Be Returned Today

H. Richardson Tebbets, 28, former Unitarian minister here, was expected to arrive in Salem today under the custody of W. C. Charlton, Salem policeman, who is returning him from San Diego, Cal. Tebbets is under indictment for obtaining money under false pretenses. He was taken into custody in Mexico, brought to the international boundary and turned over to deputy sheriffs from San Diego. He is reported to have told the latter that he had gambled in Mexico, "as a last resort, hoping I could win enough to pay my debts."

Active Sale of Hops Reported; Price Not Told

Sales of 100 bales of Oregon 1934 cluster hops were made last week at prices ranging from 9 1/2 to 12 cents, and yesterday two small lots, in all 27 bales, of 1934 fuggles were sold at figures not released. The cluster market is considered 11 cents, and fuggles 25 cents a pound.

The cluster sales last week reduced the 1934 clusters in growers' hands in Oregon to 15,115 bales. Statistically, this places Oregon in a better position than either California or Washington with respect to the 1934 hops in growers' hands. Washington, with much smaller total crop than this state, has about 14,000 bales of '34s on hand, and California, 16,200 bales of '34s on hand.

The fuggle deals yesterday reduce the fuggles in growers' hands to 239 bales.

TRICHINOSIS CASES ARE BEING PROBED

and Mrs. John Komp of Mt. Angel, three sisters and a brother, Fisher, has been visited by his parents and several brothers and sisters.

Mr. and Mrs. Fisher did not become ill until Friday. He became ill first. Mr. and Mrs. Carl Fessler became ill Saturday and the two younger Fisher boys were apparently all right early this morning. Raymond Fessler attended church Sunday it is said, becoming ill later that day. The Komp cases are also late developments.

An investigation to ascertain the sources of the pork that caused the death of two and the illness of eight other Mt. Angel residents will be requested by Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian, today by Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, Marion county health officer. Dr. Douglas said last night. The quarter of hog from which the fatal sausage was made was not secured through a public market, he explained.

Dr. Douglas visited Mt. Angel Friday to investigate the Fisher cases, then thought to be meningitis, and again yesterday when their actual nature was ascertained.

While trichinosis is not uniformly fatal, it is particularly serious because no specific cure for the affliction is known, the health officer stated. It is a condition caused by the presence of larvae, originating in improperly cured pork, in the human muscular system. "Heat kills the larvae in pork; that is why it is always advisable to be certain this meat is thoroughly cooked," he explained.

Recovery from trichinosis, Dr. Douglas indicated, is slow, running into several weeks or more.

SALEM'S QUOTA 11 AT TRAINING CAMP

Marion county's quota for the tenth annual Citizens' Military Training camp at Vancouver, Wash., has been increased to 11 students, according to word reaching Carle Abrams, enrollment chairman for the county, yesterday.

The allotment more than doubles the original tentative quota and is due to the fact that the camp's quota of 218 students has been raised to 480. The camp, which opens July 5, is to run four weeks. Students live in an orderly, open-air camp, follow a program of work and play with heavy emphasis placed on athletics and recreation. Boys of 17 years or over, whether former students or beginners, are eligible to enroll. Transportation to and from the camp and all expenses while in camp will be met by the government.

Seven Ill From Mushroom Diet; Season is Wrong

Four of the persons were members of the W. Phillips family. Dr. Finley advised against eating mushrooms in their present state of growth.

NEW DEAL RULINGS BY COURT DELAYED

WASHINGTON, April 15.—(AP)—Strong differences among the justices over two new deal measures, the railroad pension act and the Frazier-Lemke mortgage moratorium measure, were indicated today when the supreme court recessed for two weeks without ruling on either.

Both have been argued and decisions were expected today. But apparently either the issue was still in doubt or a conclusion had been reached too late to allow time to write the opinion.

The railroad pension act, which affects over 1,000,000 railroad employees, was held unconstitutional in a lower court, but the mortgage moratorium measure—as brought before the high tribunal—was upheld by a district and a circuit federal court.

The supreme court today, however, agreed to review the constitutionality of NRA, a decision probably will be handed down this time.

In one of the opinions handed down the court also upheld the Maine act of 1933 giving priority to common carriers operating motor vehicles which had continuously been in business over fixed routes since March 1, 1932, when the state utilities commission found congestion made it necessary to reduce the number of such carriers over a particular route.

INSURANCE CHIEF SELECTION LOOMS

Appointment of an insurance commissioner to succeed A. H. Averill, incumbent, is probable this week, according to state word yesterday. A successor to Dan Kellaher as state parole officer is also under consideration and will probably be designated within the next few days. The parole job will go to a young man, capable of traveling throughout the state and checking parole cases, it was understood.

Frank Davey and Fred Toole, employees of the motor division of the state utilities department, were released yesterday by E. A. Landis, state superintendent of transportation. May Cleveland, cashier in that department, was notified that her tenure would end May 1.

While the governor's office is being besieged by position hunters, appointments are being made through the department heads. Applicants for jobs are requested to determine the work for which they are best qualified and to submit their applications and credentials to the head of that department.

Salvation Army Chief to Speak 3 Times Today

Commissioner Benjamin Ormes, head of the Salvation army on the Pacific coast, will arrive in Salem today to address three public meetings. With him will come Colonel Arthur Hopkins of San Francisco and Brigadier Harold Madison of Portland.

At noon the commissioner will speak at a joint meeting of the Lions, Kiwanis and Rotary clubs at the Marion hotel, at 4 p. m. a gathering of Willamette university students at Waller hall, and at 7:30 o'clock a meeting at the Salvation army hall.

BREWERY WORKERS CASE IS COMING UP

The question of jurisdiction of unions over brewery workers is expected to be brought up on the floor at the Salem trades and labor council meeting tonight although a leading council officer said last night he knew nothing of it. Not on the meeting agenda, it may be raised by members of the two unions involved, the Brewery Workers' union and the Teamsters' and Engineers' union.

The issue, three times raised at previous meetings and tabled or rejected, is whether or not the drivers and engineers should be under jurisdiction of their own union or that of the brewery workers. Conservative unionists are said to favor leaving the drivers and engineers under their own union.

Arm Crushed as Auto Overturns

INDEPENDENCE, April 15.—Suspension of the driver's license of King Pleasant of Dallas, driver of an auto which overturned here yesterday, was promised by Judge McIntosh today. The car, after striking a curb, skidded 50 feet before overturning. Pleasant's arm was crushed by the car in the accident. Three boys riding with Pleasant were uninjured. Their names had not been ascertained here today. According to police reports, there was evidence that all members of the party were under the influence of liquor.

Grand Jury Will Reconvene Today

The Marion county grand jury will reconvene here tomorrow and will continue with its investigation of state institutions as is charged by law. The boys' training school, the Fairview home and the girls' industrial school have already been inspected.

The jury has spent a number of days considering complaints against A. C. Burk, sheriff, but no report has as yet been made.

Slot Device Case Is Set Tomorrow

Trial of five cases involving the use of slot machines has been set for tomorrow before Judge L. H. McMahan. All of the cases are on appeal from justice court here. None of the defendants-appellant has requested a jury trial. The report yesterday at the courthouse was that the slot machine operators might change their plea to guilty. They were fined \$100 each in justice court here.

NORTH BEND BRIDGE AHEAD OF SCHEDULE

The Oregon Coast highway bridge at North Bend over Coos Bay is ahead of schedule in its construction according to Earl Barham of Barham Bros., who visited here this weekend. His firm has the contract for a \$25,000 overhead crossing of the Southern Pacific tracks at the south approach of the bridge. Barham said he expected this work to be completed by June 15.

Barham said this crossing would be 45 feet wide with sidewalks added to that width to make the approach correspond in width to the North Bend street which runs to the approach. The bridge itself will have a roadway 24 feet wide. Sixty tons of steel and 850 yards of concrete are going into the job.

Barham Bros. recently completed the erection of a one-story concrete garage and service station for Shreve Bros. at Dallas. The outlook for construction work the next year is good, Barham reported. His brothers, Wayne and J. A. Barham, are with him on the North Bend job.
