CLIPPER ARRIVES AT MIDWAY POINT

"I think daddy made the best takeoff I ever saw," young Sullivan exclaimed happily.

Apparently flying slowly, the clipper nevertheless forced a dozen accompanying planes to race to keep up with it as it passed over San Francisco and out the Golden Gate.

There were a few scattered clouds en route, and no adverse winds.

"The fliers will have very good weather for the next 24 to 36 hours," said Major Edward H. Bowie, United States weather forecaster at San Francisco.

France, Britain and Italy Join in Resolution on German Rearming

Dissension among members of the council flared up immediately after introduction of the resolution, which Foreign Minister Pierre Laval of France, Foreign Secretary Sir John Simon of England and Baron Pompeo Aloisi of Italy all supported in speeches.

Tall, erect Joseph Beck, foreign minister of Poland, pointed out that the Warsaw government has taken no part in negotiations leading up to the present situation and said Poles were suspicious of demands for new peace accords with such as were proposed in the resolution.

Strawberry Crop To Be One-Third Of Normal Yield

HOOD RIVER, April 16. -About one-third of a normal strawberry crop was predicted today for the Mid-Columbia river country where the squatty vines already are blooming.

Gordon G. Brown, horticulturist of the Hood River experiment station, said the acreage here has not returned to normal after the freeze of 1933 when sub-zero temperatures prevailed with no protective snow covering.

The first strawberries are expected about May 10 from the new North Dalles tract in southern Klickitat county, Washington. The Hood valley crop will be later.

Wagoner Listed As Speaker for Townsend Meet

RADIO AND SEAMAN WALKOUTS SETTLED

TACOMA, April 16. -Official of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company tonight announced the settlement of a seaman's and one-man radio operator's strike.

The settlement was announced following a conference in Seattle between officials of the timber company, International Seamen's Union and the American Telegraphers' association.

The conference was precipitated when the crew of the timber company's freighter Hanley walked off the ship at Longview Monday. Bruce H. Hiley, Seattle, radio operator of the same ship, walked out last Friday.

The seamen demanded wages as stipulated in the recent west coast agreement between ship operators and seamen. As a result of the agreement of the Weyerhaeuser company to meet their demands, seamen working on the timber company's ships will receive a basic raise of \$5 a month, it was announced. Up to the time of the strike the lumber firm was paying the east coast wage scale, it was pointed out.

ELLE CHOSEN HEAD OF TEACHER GROUP

M. J. Elle, science instructor at Salem high school, was elected president of the Salem Teachers' association at the annual meeting held at the senior high school yesterday afternoon. He succeeds Shannon Hogue, high school debate coach.

The teachers named Myrtle Beaver, mathematics instructor at Parrish junior high school, as vice-president; Marie Westhoff, 5A-5B, Grant school, as secretary, and Earle W. Stewart, 6B-6A, Park school, as treasurer.

The association also heard reports of Elle on the inland Empire association meetings early this month at Spokane, Wash., and of Fred Gahlerod relative to a hospitalization plan.

Whether the teachers desire to be paid on a 12-months' or a 9-months' basis as at present will be determined by tabulation of questionnaires filled out yesterday. They are being checked over by the new president.

COURT CLERK NOT LIABLE IS RULING

Non-Suit in Ruppert Case Against Hoyt is Upheld by Supreme Court

The clerk of a district court is not personally liable for money placed in his custody and paid out pursuant to an order of the court, Justice Rand held in an opinion handed down by the state supreme court yesterday.

The opinion was written in a suit brought by Jacob Ruppert against George W. Hoyt, clerk of the district court for Multnomah county, and held for the defendant.

The plaintiff appealed to the supreme court from a judgment of non-suit given against him on the ground that he had failed to prove a cause sufficient to be submitted to the jury.

Empire Holding company vs. O. P. Coshov, appellant. Appeal from Multnomah county. For collection of promissory note involving approximately \$13,000. Petition for rehearing denied in opinion by Justice Bailey.

August Kessler and Margaret Kessler, appellants, vs. Rose Kowalewski Kerr et al. Appeal from Multnomah county. Suit involving performance of contract. Opinion by Chief Justice Campbell. Judge Jacob Kessler reversed and case remanded.

James Warren Thory, as executor of estate of Frank M. Thorp, deceased, vs. L. R. Rutherford, appellant. Appeal from Columbia county. Suit involving the sale of real estate. Opinion by Chief Justice Campbell. Judge H. K. Zimmerman reversed and case remanded.

Louise B. Kilks, appellant, vs. L. A. Courtemanche. Appeal from Yamhill county. Action for damages. Opinion by Justice Bailey. Judge Arlie G. Walker reversed and case remanded.

STATE OBJECTS TO ESTATE'S ACCOUNT

Formal objection to the final account of F. W. Settlemier as administrator of the estate of the late Helen O'Leary of Woodburn was filed yesterday in probate court here by the state of Oregon.

The residue of the estate escheated to the state. The objections are that the undertaker's charge of \$260 was excessive and should not have exceeded \$150; that \$425 for a tombstone was excessive and should not have exceeded \$100; that \$100 paid as attorney's fees was an excessive expenditure and that \$146 paid in taxes on property of the estate was needless outlay since the property was vested in the state's name and not subject to taxes.

The protest also alleges that the closing up of the estate was handled too slowly, letters of administration having been issued in August, 1933. Funds of the estate were caught in the closing of the Bank of Woodburn in 1933 and loss was incurred which the state contends was due to the slowness of the administrator in terminating his administration.

Cunningham Will Talk With Water Committee Soon

A conference with John W. Cunningham to determine the part he will play in the impending hearings on the city's water system condemnation case has been scheduled tentatively for Thursday night, Alderman Walter Fuhrer, chairman of the city council utilities committee, said last night. The committee will decide what Cunningham's duties shall be in connection with the hearings and probably the amount he will be paid in this connection. The firm of Baar and Cunningham already is owed by the city for part performance of a contract for engineering work done on the proposed mountain water system.

LIQUOR STORE TO BE MOVED MAY 1

Relocation of the state liquor store here in the Van Patten building at 327 Court street was announced yesterday by Eugene Kelly, assistant administrator of the state liquor control commission. The store will be removed from its present location in the Prime building about May 1. Kelly said a two-year lease had been taken on the new location. Alterations began yesterday.

The new store will occupy the rooms formerly used by C. F. Brethaupt, florist, and Vibbert & Todd, electrical contractors and dealers. The latter will occupy the rear portion of the room while the state store will occupy the front portion of the space formerly occupied by the florist and the electrical firms.

Kelly said the change in location was necessitated by the need of space for additional reserve stock in the store.

Oregon Mutual Group to Meet

H. I. Standley and J. D. Foley, agents for the Oregon Mutual Fire Insurance company, will attend the convention of agents to be held April 18 and 19 at McMinnville. Appearing on the program are Governor Martin, Bert E. Haney, Dr. Elam J. Anderson, J. M. Sehon and others. A golf tournament, banquet and dance are planned for the entertainment of those attending. Representatives of the company from five states will attend.

About 70 of the best pictures which have been on display at a large store in Portland will be sent here. The display ended there Saturday and the pictures are expected today or tomorrow.

Four score enthusiastic chamber members are ready last night to conduct a three-day all-city solicitation, designed to add a minimum of 100 new members to the organization's roster before the week closes.

The sendoff for the campaign was a workers' dinner at the chamber headquarters, Howard Hulse, president, in charge. The campaign begins this morning with four chairmen in charge of squads of 25 men each.

Douglas McKay, past president of the chamber, put on an effective demonstration of how new members can be gained. T. A. Windsharpe being the resisting prospect who succumbed to McKay's arguments and Sheriff A. C. Burk being the "non-talking" member of the solicitation team.

Dr. Bruce Baxter of Willamette university characterized the chamber's work as outstanding in the life of the city and said its members were men willing to shoulder their fair share of the community's problems.

Judge L. G. Lowelling here. Averill wrote the court a letter stating that he thought the fees reasonable in view of the work done by Conley. Averill informed the court that he thought Conley had saved the receiver \$15,000 in the manner in which the receivership was handled. A number of claims against the company were approved during the day by the court.

DUST STORM RUINS INGALLS' VENTURE

ALAMOSA, Colo., April 16. -A giant saffron dust cloud, "stupendous, terrific, tragic," forced Laura Ingalls, intrepid diminutive woman flier, to abandon her attempt at a new transcontinental flying record today after she flew blind in four hours.

The storm that the woman flier encountered has hung over southeastern Colorado, western Kansas, Oklahoma and Texas for weeks.

She said she did not know immediately when she may make another attempt to break the women's transcontinental flying record of 17 hours, seven minutes and 30 seconds held by Amelia Earhart.

She left Los Angeles at 5:10 a. m. Pacific Coast time (8:10 p. m. S. T.). Her flying time to Alamosa was 11 hours and 40 minutes. How far she flew she could not determine but Alamosa is approximately due north of Albuquerque, 675 miles by air from Los Angeles.

Murray Speaker For 20-30 Club

City Warrants Call Is Issued
