unexpected. The milk control board has been under fire for months, the first attack coming from retailers who objected to the prices set by the board on milk. Subsequently the strong Portland Cooperative association became engaged in a fight with the board, protesting against the manner in which the board assessed the cost of handling surplus milk.

Harlan Secures Co-op Measure Veto, Recalled
At the legislature the cooperatives introduced a measure stripping the control board of its power to handle surplus milk. E. G. Harlan, board chairman, fought this measure and while it passed both houses, Harlan was successful in obtaining a veto from the governor.

The difficulties between the board and the cooperatives have continued since the legislature. Governor Martin's action yesterday was interpreted as a move to clear the air of hostilities between the old board and the opposing groups and to give three new members opportunity to make the milk control act more effective.

Mr. Engbretsen is a republican, owner of a seed company in Astoria. He formerly had charge of the Astoria experiment station. Mr. Marsh is an apple grower at Hood River, a democrat, and a former president of the Oregon Cooperative council. Mr. Smith, a democrat, has served as treasurer of the state central committee of his party and is a former owner of the Astoria Flouring mills. Later he was vice-president of Kerr-Gifford in Portland and is now affiliated with the Oregon Mutual Life Insurance company.

Captain Edwin C. Musick, veteran Pan American Airways pilot in charge of the flight, as he stepped ashore to receive greetings and congratulatory messages, said:

"This project means the final stretch of overseas pioneering and is a tribute to the remarkable strides made by aviation in the last three decades."

"We had no difficulty on any portion of the trip. We were able to accomplish the scientific experiments assigned to us."

Musick said survey flights of the Hawaiian Islands would be made and that the clipper would fly back to the mainland via Alameda, San Diego, or Los Angeles as possible destinations.

Return Takeoff
Tuesday, Tentative
It was learned later that Tuesday had been tentatively set for the date of the return flight. Musick said it was uncertain how many times the plane would shuttle back and forth in experimental flights before passenger service begins. The crew went to bed within three hours after their arrival today.

\$8800 IN JOBS TO CUT WOOD UNFILLED

Wood cutting jobs which would bring an aggregate of \$8800 in wages are available at the re-employment offices here with D. Dotson, manager of the office on North High street, reporting difficulty in getting men for the work.

A few of the jobs are offered at \$1.50 a cord but most of them call for only \$1.25 a cord for cutting with the wood cutter provided by the employer and transportation to the job. The prevailing wage a year ago was \$1.50 but a reduction in the price paid for wood by the paper company here resulted in a 25-cent cut in prices paid for cutting jobs.

Dotson reported yesterday that a considerable increase in demand for farm jobs is being experienced by the office here as the spring season comes on.

One classification where there is a shortage of registrants to the number of positions open is that of house workers. One Salem woman has been trying for a week to locate a householder helper through the reemployment office, thus far without success. To meet the demand for house workers, some girls listed as stenographers have been given jobs temporarily in Salem homes.

NEW ROAD SOUGHT ON WAY TO FALLS

A petition for a new county road, approximately two miles in length, and connecting the east and west side roads leading from Silverton to Silver Falls, was filed late yesterday in the county clerk's office here.

The road proposed by the petitioners, 66 in number, would run from the Victor Point junction on the road west of Silver creek to the power house on the east Silver creek road, the latter point being about two miles from Silverton.

Proponents of the road say it would shorten the distance between Silverton and the falls and open up some territory not now served by a road.

The petition will come before the county court at its June 7 meeting.

LEAGUE REBUKE STIRS HITLER

Spokesmen Say Rebuttal Puts
End to Hope of Germany's
Joining Peace Pact

prospect was seen here that Germany would participate in future international conferences concerning security.

The Danubian conference to be held at Rome next month and the proposed larger conference growing out of the Italo-Anglo-French meeting at Stresa, officials said, both are now out of the question. Fuehrer "Hitler" said.

When News Told
Reports reaching here said the German fuhrer "hit the roof" when word of the council's action was taken to him.

Seemingly dazed and stunned at the Geneva developments, the more so because Poland, Germany's official friend, joined in voting for the tri-power resolution, the Wilhelmstrasse dumped the whole problem in Hitler's lap. "We can do no more," a foreign office spokesman said. "It is now up to the fuhrer to decide the next step." As to what form the leader's action would take, the foreign office professed ignorance.

GENEVA, April 17.—(P)—Thirteen nations joined today in rebuking Germany for rearming and in effect served notice that international treaties and obligations must be fulfilled.

Denmark's Lone Voice
Raised in Balloting
Only the voice of Denmark was raised in warning that condemnation of Germany's treaty violation would not help to smooth Europe's troubles.

The League of Nations council adopted the Franco-British-Italian resolution, introduced yesterday, censuring Germany for rearming in violation of the Versailles treaty and asking financial and economic sanctions against any power which disregards international obligations in the future.

BRINGING DROUTH VICTIMS HERE EYED

Any definite action that is taken by the federal government relative to moving drouth victims from the middle western states to Oregon, will depend upon congressional disposal of the Bankhead bill, D. O. Hood, state budget director, declared yesterday.

Hood returned this week from Washington where he conferred with federal officials with relation to the proposed colonization program.

The budget director said it might be necessary to call a special legislative session in August or September provided the Bankhead bill received favorable consideration.

Hood said Arkansas and Texas were making a strong bid for the drouth victims.

The budget department is now operating at full capacity, with the property control division an added obligation.

Clifton Mudd, assisted by Arthur Marcus and Marie Shindler are in charge of the property control work while Carl Cover is chief clerk of the budget division.

ity bill was abandoned tonight by advocates of the four outstanding substitutes.

By contrast, the confidence of administration leaders was shown when they made final arrangements to permit direct votes on the most talked-of substitutes. Four substitutes are:

1. The Townsend-McGroarty plan, which would levy a 2 per cent tax on all financial transactions, and gifts or inheritances, and which would set aside 2 per cent of income taxes, for payment of up to \$200 a month to all persons over 60.

2. The Greenway plan, which would levy the same taxes as the Townsend plan, but limit the federal government's pension contribution to \$25 a month on the basis of five federal dollars to each state dollar to persons over 60.

3. The Lundeen plan, under which each aged, unemployed, or helpless person would be paid a minimum of \$10 a week plus \$3 for each dependent.

4. The Roger-Pope plan, which would put a 1 1/2 per cent tax on the incomes of all persons between 21 and 45 years of age, for disbursement in the form of \$30 a month federal pensions to all persons over 55 or those over 21 mentally or physically incapable of self support.

40-Point Objective Set for

The study of plans for a future state capitol group of buildings, to be coordinated with the planning operations of Salem and Marion county agencies, was one of four projects approved by Governor Martin yesterday.

Governor Martin declared that while this was a long-range planning project an effort would be made to complete some of the preliminary studies before the end of the current year.

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SCHOOL BOARD EYES LOW INTEREST RATE

Eying the state's plans to secure low interest rates on its money, Salem's school directors last night decided to attempt to refund the district's note indebtedness on more favorable terms than the 5 per cent being paid now on \$95,000 worth of promissory paper. Clerk W. H. Burghardt was directed to secure necessary legal opinions on a \$100,000 note issue at once.

It is the hope of the board, it was indicated at last night's special session, that the notes may be sold at interest as low as 2 per cent, or even less. Bids will be called for this purpose.
