

NRA SHOULD BE KEPT IS ADVICE

"Middle of the Road" Plan for Industry Necessary Says Hugh Johnson

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first intelligent attempt ever made by this government" to check a tendency which rapidly was turning all industry over to big business.

Numerous Changes in Law Recommended

Though he strongly defended NRA, including its dispute price fixing and production control provisions, Johnson recommended a number of changes. He urged a flat prohibition against monopoly in the new law with a definition of what it constitutes. Other recommendations included:

A clear definition of labor policy, forbidding coercion on either side, providing that when a majority in a shop or department chooses a particular union no other union should be recognized, and declaring that membership in a union should not be made a condition to employment.

A definition of unfair methods of competition, with a flat prohibition against them.

A definition of interstate commerce as an act wherever performed "materially affecting commerce among the several states."

Provision for adequate representation on code authorities of all industrial elements.

Creation of an "administrative agency" to see that in the relaxation of the anti-trust laws "the abuses which they sought vainly to eliminate are not allowed."

In his almost blanket endorsement of the old law, Johnson admitted only one major failure, that was in Section 7 (A), the provision designed to protect labor in collective bargaining.

"I think Section 7 (A) had substantially failed of its original purpose," he testified. "Section 7 (A) is so obscured by conflicting interpretations that it does not and cannot be construed as a definite labor policy."

Spinach Ring

3 cups cooked spinach

Tomato and Avocado Salad

3 medium sliced tomatoes
1 avocado
1/2 cup French dressing
head lettuce

1 20-oz. package Roquefort cheese
Wash and stem tomatoes and cut into eighths. Peel avocado, remove seed and slice thinly. Pour the French dressing over tomatoes and avocados and let stand 1/2 hour in refrigerator. Wash lettuce and break into small pieces. Crumble Roquefort cheese with a fork and arrange the lettuce, tomatoes, avocados and cheese in alternate layers in a shallow bowl. Pour French dressing from marinated tomatoes and avocado over all. Serve from bowl. Serves 6.

Peel one large orange and one grapefruit as you would an apple, with all outer membrane removed. With a paring knife remove the segments of fruit, also without any membrane. Cut in cubes and mix orange and grapefruit. Peel the avocado very thin and cut it in cubes, not too small.

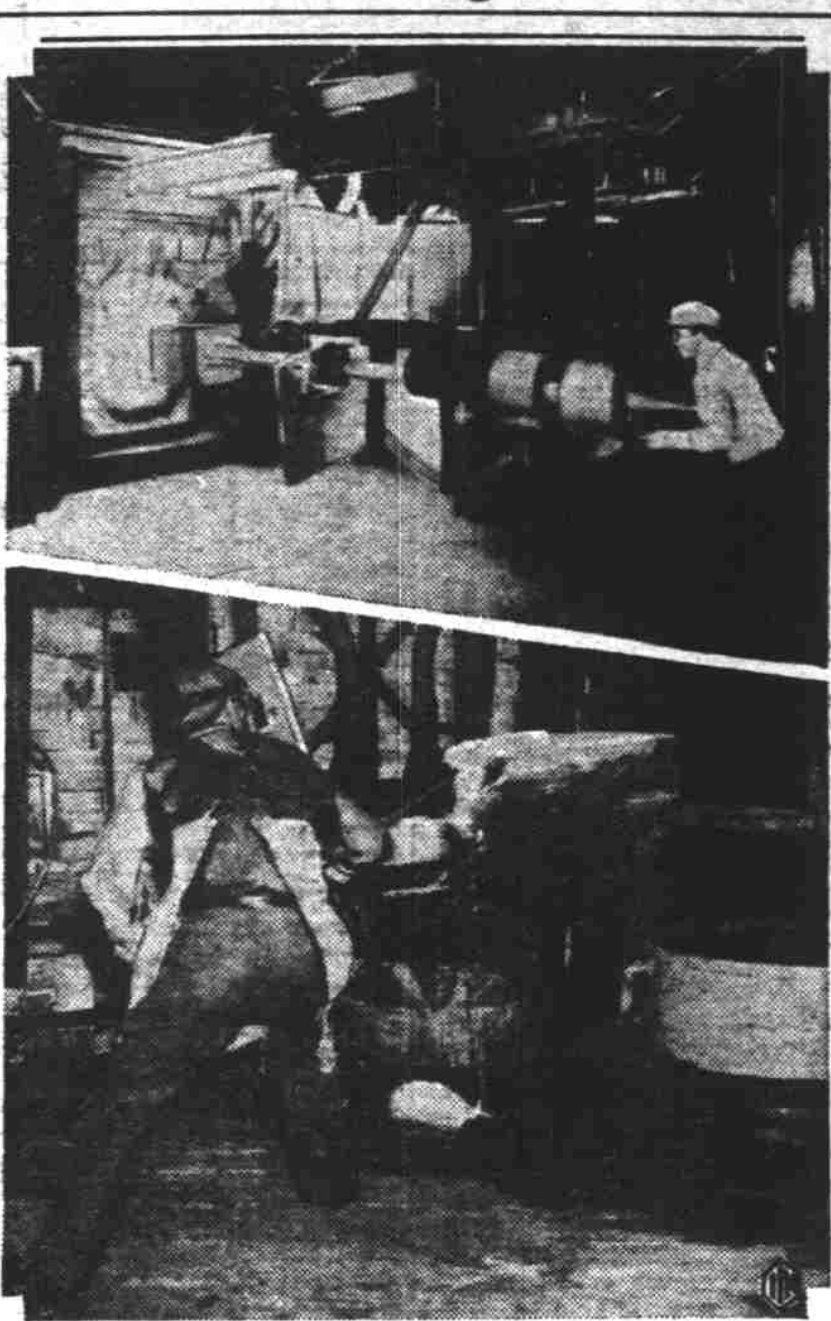

Science Hails "Age of Glass"

Recent inventions in the glass industry promise to introduce an "age of glass" in which this highly important produce will play an increasingly vital part in modern life. A process has been perfected which produces glass which has half the strength of steel and is three times as elastic. Science has also perfected glass which has heat-absorbing powers by virtue of its elimination of the infra-red rays of the sun. Another new type of glass transmits the heat rays but cuts off light, an invaluable aid to medical science. An increasing number of uses have been found for glass in construction and decoration of modern homes and buildings. An example of the commercial possibilities of further use of glass is illustrated by its success when built into a panel of containers used by a large cannery. Sales jumped sharply because customers could inspect the product before purchasing.

NEW DEAL BACKED BY WELSH WIZARD

LONDON, April 18.—(AP)—David Lloyd George laid his "new deal" for Britain before the British government today but observers saw small prospect that his vast public works program, the heart of his scheme, would be adopted.

A special cabinet committee listened for two hours while the white-haired little "Welsh wizard" explained his far-reaching plans to hasten the return of prosperity in the land.

Emerging, he seemed cheerful. He refused to discuss what took place at the meeting.

Today's meeting came about in consequence of an invitation Prime Minister Ramsay MacDonald extended to Lloyd George recently to present details of his plan for the cabinet's consideration.

It was expected the balanced budget handed down this week by Neville Chamberlain, chancellor of the exchequer and Lloyd George's old political enemy, would preclude consideration of the "New Deal's" public works provision.

NEW SNOW COVERS CONTINENT DIVIDE

DENVER, April 18.—(AP)—The deepest snow of the year, swirled by a spring blizzard, covered many of the Rockies tonight and retarded dust storms east of here.

All along the continental divide, from New Mexico to Wyoming, there was a new covering of wet snow that ranged from six inches to two and three feet on the level and four to six feet in drifts.

At Leadville miners on Breccia hill were marooned overnight at the mines and were rescued today by road crews that worked from midnight until early this morning. The snow was seven feet deep in places near Leadville and the miners were unable to drive through the drifts.

From 30 to 40 cars, including a passenger-mail bus, were stalled overnight between Divide and Cripple Creek, Colo., but were dug out early this morning by highway crews. No serious accidents were reported.

pension bills of some of the states, many of which are characterized as "anti-suicide pensions."

"The administration bill is inadequate, impossible of administration, impractical, intentionally designed to deceive the people and is improperly planned financially."

Late in the day, the majority leaders were so discouraged by the display of quick work that they sought to press the bill through passage tonight, but the republicans balked and the attempt was dropped.

The nearest the democratic chiefs came to defeat was on a republican motion to increase from \$15 to \$20 a month the maximum federal contribution toward old-age pensions to persons over 65. And the margin of victory there was far from close.

Representative Treadway (R-Mass.) offered the amendment. On a teller vote, it was rejected 144 to 80.

After Treadway's motion lost, Representative Knutson (R-Minn.) proposed that the federal contribution be increased to \$20 and the age limit be reduced to 60. Obviously convinced that he, too, would be defeated, Knutson told the house:

"This administration bill is just a gesture. It's just a shot in the arm, and it isn't even a good shot in the arm. But what can be done when you (democrats) have got your steam-roller on?"

Representative Monahan (D-Mont.) offered the Townsend amendment, while in the gallery sat Dr. F. E. Townsend, author of the idea. There was no change of expression on the face of the white-haired Californian when the vote was announced—208 against the Townsend plan and 56 for it. Among those for it was Representative Taylor of Colorado, the acting democratic floor leader.

CHINESE PARDONED TO LEAVE COUNTRY

Governor Martin Thursday granted a pardon to Lem Woon, Chinese, with the condition that he be deported to China.

Woon was received at the penitentiary October 7, 1913, under sentence to be hanged for the slaying of another Chinese during a tong war. Governor West commuted the sentence to life imprisonment and Woon later was pardoned for deportation.

After remaining in China for several years Woon returned to Oregon where he was picked up by the immigration officials and re-committed to the penitentiary to serve out his life term.

Immigration officials said he would be deported as soon as the required papers could be completed.

STEINER DEMANDS MODERN DEFENSES

WASHINGTON, April 18.—(AP)—Senator Steiner (R-Ore.) today charged the war department "has made no earnest effort to obtain the necessary appropriation" for defenses on the Columbia river and in Oregon.

The senator's charges were contained in a letter to Secretary Dern in answer to a statement by the secretary that "congress has consistently refused for years to appropriate in the army appropriations bill for such projects."

In a letter to the senator, Dern said that the chief of staff of the army said "that he has very comprehensive plans which would take care in a most generous way of all the suggestions you made."

Steiner and Senator McNary (R-Ore.) had asked for defenses on the Columbia river, railroad artillery along the coast, modernization of Fort Stevens and an army air base in Oregon.

Steiner, answering Dern, said in his judgment there is no reason why money appropriated by the work relief bill should not be used for transportation of guns or other supplies already the property of the United States from one point to another.

Brickwork was laid all around the ends of the untreated beams, without allowing for circulation of air. This affords a favorable environment for the fungus of dry rot to work and has gone on until immediate repair is required.

"I do not see how the buildings have stood up as long as they have under this condition," Bartholomew said yesterday.

BOMBS SET OFF TO HAMPER CEREMONY

ZARAGOZA, Spain, April 18.—(AP)—Bombs set off by terrorists in an asserted effort to hinder tomorrow's holy week procession tonight killed one man and wounded two.

A note issued by the governor of the province said the terrorist plot was engineered by anarcho-syndicalist leaders with the purpose of halting the procession. Nevertheless it will be held, he asserted.

Four bombs exploded in different parts of the city, one behind the church of San Pablo. The biggest bomb went off on Moreria street, killing Dionisio Salvatierra, 37, and gravely injuring Valentin Lopez, 47. A second bomb which exploded near the church injured Jose Meluz, 15.

Headquarters of the radical national labor confederation are here and the governor's note accused the anarcho-syndicalists of plotting in Zaragoza recent terrorist acts in Barcelona.

MURDER CHARGED WHEN BODY FOUND

TACOMA, Wash., April 18.—(AP)—The body of 30-year-old Maude McCune was dug from a rocky grave on a rabbit farm near Puyallup this afternoon and tonight Deputy Prosecutor Stuart W. Elliott said that first degree murder charges would be filed against Elmer J. McCune, the woman's husband.

Elliott said he had obtained a signed statement from Ruth Dunlap, described as McCune's sweetheart, that McCune told her he had killed his wife and where he had buried the body.

This afternoon she led officers to the McCune rabbit farm, five miles south of Puyallup, and pointed out the spot, Elliott said, where the body was later exhumed.

Discovery of the body, which had been buried, Sheriff John C. Bjorkland said, for at least five months, cleared up the mystery of Mrs. McCune's disappearance last November.
