## Impressive Ceremony Brilliant Event Of Sunday

PROBABLY the most beautiful and impressive of wedding ceremonies held in Salem in recent months will be that witnessed Easter Sunday at 8 p. m. in St. Paul's Episcopal church when Miss Maxine Glover, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Glover, 1714 Court street, and William H. Hammond, son of Mr. and Mrs. William Hammond of Oregon City, will be united in marriage.

Rev. P. K. Hammond of Oregon City, grandfather of the groom, in the soft glow of candlelight assisted by Rev. George H. Swift, will read the solemn vows which will be exchanged before an altar banked with white Easter lilies, white calla lilies and palms. Preceding the ceremony Miss Margaret Simms will sing "Oh, Promise Me," accompanied at the piano by Mrs. Kenneth Dalton, who will also play the wedding marches.

The bride, charmingly attired in a modish gown of white satin made with bodice effect and train, will be given in marriage by her father. Her train, made of real lace, fashioned in polo-bonnet style, will be held in place with a wreath of orange blossoms. She will wear long white mitts and carry an old-fashioned bridal bouquet of lilies-of-the-valley, pink rosebuds and orchids.

The matron of honor, Mrs. Garlen Simpson, will wear a floor-length frock of fluted white tulle net with white tulle sash, polo-bonnet hat to match, white lace mitts and will carry a white filled nosegay of pink lavender sweetpeas and pink rosebuds. The bridesmaids, Miss Dorothy Bell and Miss Wilma Giese will wear similar all-white frocks with matching hats and nosegays.

The ring bearer, little Miss Dwyer, Perry daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Vernon Perry, will be ring-bearer. She will be dressed in a dainty white net dress patterned after the bridal attendants' and will carry the ring on a small white satin pillow.

Mrs. Ralph Glover, mother of the bride, will be gowned in ashes of roses of crepe adorned with corsage of gardenia. White gardenias will also complete the costume of Mrs. William Hammond of Oregon City.

Jack Hammond, brother of the groom, will be best man, and the ushers will be Virgil Enecks, Fred Lynch, George Weber and Fred Gerke of Portland, Ralph Schomp and Tom Stoddard of Eugene.

Following the wedding service a reception will be held at the Glover home on Court street. For her going away costume the bride has selected grey wool crepe with grey accessories, a blue fox fur and a corsage of orchids. Immediately following the reception the bride and groom will motor to California, returning to Salem in a fortnight where they will be "at home" to their friends.

The poppy making has provided employment for needy veterans through the winter and spring months, enabling them to help support themselves and families. Public response on Poppy day will determine how soon and how extensively this work can be re-opened.

In exchange for the poppies the auxiliary women will ask each person to make a contribution for the welfare of the war's living victims, the disabled veterans, the widows and the fatherless children of veterans. This money will be used entirely in the welfare work of the Legion and auxiliary, the bulk of it in the work of the local post and unit.
