

45 AGENCIES TO EXPEND RELIEF

Chairmanship of Allotment Board, Key Post, Will Be Named Today

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chiefs for the other two new divisions have yet to be chosen. Procedure Outlined by Roosevelt

As indicated so far by the president's outline of the administrative machinery set up, this is the route for the choosing of projects under the vast plan.

The individual proposals will be formulated by either an agency of the federal, state, municipal or local government, or by a private concern, person or organization.

It will be outlined in an application filed with the national emergency council, headed by Frank C. Walker.

The council will see that certain specified information, such as the length of time it will take to complete the work, the number of jobs it will provide and how close it is to an unemployment center is provided.

This information in hand, the application will be sent to the allotment board for approval or rejection.

The governmental agency charged with carrying out the type of work embodied in the project will be provided with the money and authorized to proceed with the work, or, in the case of work covered by a loan or grant or work done by a state or municipality, the proper government unit would be instructed to supervise the work.

Employment Service to Cooperate

Both the relief administration and the United States employment service will cooperate in getting men and women off relief rolls and into jobs.

Mr. Roosevelt indicated that an early start on actual movement of plans through the channels he had outlined might be expected.

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tion of the group and its concentration on definite projects for immediate relief. The organization of such an association would be in keeping with the governor's charge to the representatives of the various valley counties at a recent meeting in Portland, Senator McKay said.

"More than 30,000 families, which would include more than 100,000 persons could settle on Willamette valley lands, if necessary projects were undertaken," Senator McKay said. "Governor Martin has outlined to us a plan, covering a span of years, which calls for the expenditure of more than \$48,000,000 for Willamette valley projects. It is necessary, however, to sell the idea of the valley projects to the people of the valley in the first instance and concentrate on definite plans of worthwhile needs."

Multnomah Delegates Pledge Support

F. H. Reese, representative of the Portland chamber of commerce, pledged the support of the Multnomah county group in outlining and promoting worthwhile projects in the Willamette valley. "As the Willamette valley grows, so Portland will grow," Reese said. "Our representative in Washington, W. B. D. Dotson, is entirely in accord with the promotion of the Willamette valley and you may be assured that he will do everything in Washington to further these plans."

Reconstruction of Santiam Route Between Niagara and Gates Urged

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ted they expected to get only a portion of the work they asked. Spokesmen were asked to designate the order of importance of the improvements suggested.

The hearing brought forth the regular proponents for short routes from Portland to the sea. Only a 17-mile gap between Sunset camp and Elsie stands in the way of travel over the short Wolf creek route to Seaside and other beaches in that area, it was stated.

It was estimated the 17-mile grading, surfacing and oiling would cost \$1,800,000.

The Wilson river route which follows the Wolf creek route westward through Forest Grove, but branches southwest at Glenwood, would emerge at the Tillamook beach.

Betterments at Oregon City Asked

The widening of the super-highway between Milwaukie and Oregon City was urged by a Clackamas county delegation. The delegation also urged elimination of the "bottle neck" through Oregon City by development of a Water street route.

It is not yet known definitely when the commission will be able to allocate funds. It must take into consideration various state conditions, as well as rather strict federal requirements.

Eastern Oregon speakers called the commission's attention to the controversy in the recent legislative session which resulted in assurance that roads on the original 1917 road system would be sped toward completion.

MACHINE GUNNERS LOOT MAIL TRUCK

WARREN, O., April 24.—(P)—A machine gun robber who wore shell-rimmed glasses, and two accomplices, held up a United States mail truck here today, forced the driver to proceed to a garage on the outskirts of the city, and then escaped with four pouches of mail, one containing \$72,000 in currency.

Although the truck driver, Burl Villers, carried a pistol, not a shot was fired during the holdup, and he was left by the robbers inside the truck, uninjured, when they fled.

Hours later, although all available Warren police and sheriff's deputies searched all highways in this vicinity, no trace of the robbers had been found.

Col. Lynn Black, superintendent of the state highway patrol, expressed belief the robbers were the same as those who last night held up a filling station at Columbus, and this morning raided the State Savings bank at Woodville, near Fremont.

EDWIN TESTIFIES AGAINST SOLINSKY

PORTLAND, Ore., April 24.—(P)—Testimony that E. C. Solinsky, former superintendent of Crater Lake National park, obtained money from checks made out to fictitious persons was given at his defraud trial in federal court here today.

A. R. Edwin, former special disbursing officer at the park, testified that he made out time-cards to fictitious persons, and endorsed and cashed the checks, all under direction of Solinsky to whom the proceeds were given.

Edwin, who pleaded guilty to defraud charges, also testified that Solinsky himself endorsed some of the checks made out to fictitious persons in August, 1932.

Federal Judge James Alger Fee sent the jury from the room while attorneys argued admissibility of evidence which the government declared would show Solinsky paid members of a Medford snowplow company on the park payroll, in spite of the fact that they were not employed there, in order to pay for a snowplow for the park.

TREATIES TO HELP SPEED SEA FLIGHTS

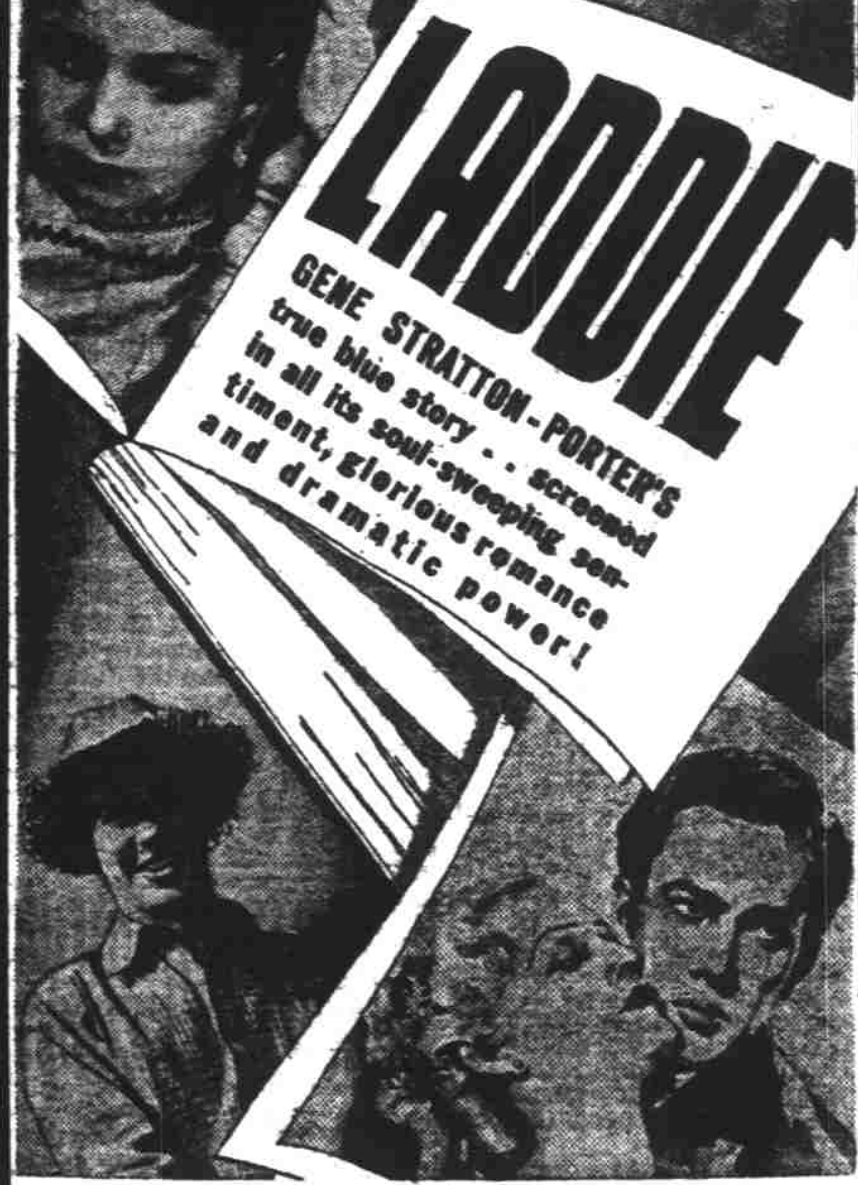
WASHINGTON, April 24.—(P)—By a series of treaties eliminating diplomatic complications, the state department has opened the way for the development of trans-oceanic air service, both American and foreign.

A newly signed agreement with Great Britain snipping off yards of red tape heretofore necessary for flights from one country to another was disclosed today as one of a large and still growing number.

Such agreements are already in effect with Germany, Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Italy, South Africa and most western hemisphere nations. A treaty with the Netherlands awaits approval there. One is to be negotiated soon with Australia.
