

Aden Hero as Bearcats Squeeze Out Win

McCANN STOPS O.N.S. HITTERS

Ninth Inning With Two Out, Outfielder Punches Out Single for Victory

Pounding out a single in the ninth inning when two were out, Dwight Aden, southpaw Bearcat outfielder, batted in the run that gave Willamette a 4 to 3 victory over Oregon Normal on Olinger field yesterday afternoon. Aden's single, added to a single in the seventh and a home run in the fifth, made him the batting hero of the day with three hits in five times at the plate. He batted in three of the four Bearcat runs.

The game was a mound duel. Pete McCann, pitching his first intercollegiate game for Willamette after conversion from a catcher, and Ed Demorest, veteran Normal left hander, scattered hits charily. McCann held the Wolves to eight hits, striking out four and walking only one.

The Wolves tied up the score 3 to 3 in the eighth when Kelsay scored on Bridge's two-bagger.

Willamette scored first in the fourth. In the fifth the Teachers gained a one run lead when Coleman pounded out a two base hit, batting in a run, and scored himself when Kelsay collected a single. Their lead was of brief duration, however, as Aden clouted out his home run in the Bearcat half of the fifth, scoring Harriman ahead of him.

In the last half of the ninth, with another extra inning game looming, Sutton walked and Tweed, pinch-hitting for McCann, singled to put him on second. Aden scored him with a hard single to right which passed through the first baseman.

The Bearcat infield showed the results of intensive infield practice and kept the bobbie list down to one.

Coleman and Bridge led the Normal hitters, each hitting twice in four times at bat. The Bearcats will play the strong University of Portland nine here Wednesday.

Oregon Wins Relay Meet; Marks Slow

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 27. — (P)—University of Oregon won the annual relays from Oregon State college, taking five of the eight events here today in a meet marked by mediocre times and several tumbles.

Every event except the shuttle hurdle was won by a wide margin by one side or the other. In the shuttle hurdle Prahl of Oregon State came within a yard of overtaking Holloway of Oregon who was staked to a 10-yard lead as anchor man.

Falls or other mishaps among the participants marred four of the events.

Oregon State drew first blood by taking the 440-yard relay when one Oregon man fell. Then the Webfoots came back and took the next four events as Oregon State men suffered mishaps in the 880 and shuttle relays.

In the four-mile relay Shepard gave his teammate Gugginsberg a long lead which Wagner of Oregon could not overcome.

Oregon then took the distance medley by nearly as wide a margin when Pittam for Oregon State weakened in the half-mile. In the final event, the mile relay, four of Oregon State's best quarter milers turned in a 3:26.6 performance with Clark finishing a hundred yards ahead of his opponent.

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
