INCENDIARISM CLUE LACKING, DECLARED

While the theory that the state-house fire was incendiary in origin still was talked yesterday, officials who have checked all clues as far as time permitted, said no tangible evidence of any person starting the blaze had been uncovered.

State police have thoroughly questioned all persons known to have been in or near the building after 6 p. m. Thursday night. No clues of incendiaryism have been found.

H. M. Pomeroy of the national board of fire underwriters, was working on a report to the board of control yesterday. Since the basement of the capitol is almost totally in ruins, Pomeroy said it would be very difficult to determine the exact spot where the fire started.

Fearful that other fires may spring up, state officials yesterday had employed special guards for the state hospital, for the flax mills and sheds at the penitentiary and for the state fair plant.

The fire is thought to have started from an overheated kitchen stove.

Improved quarters have been arranged for the residents of the house and lumber was to be sent today to start the reconstruction work. The loss was partly covered by insurance.

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CHAMBER OPPOSES BANKING PROGRAM

WASHINGTON, April 29.—(AP)—An open break between the chamber of commerce of the United States and President Roosevelt on major policies appeared yesterday in the chamber, in annual convention, issued a report condemning the administration's banking legislation.

This report followed closely upon one assailing the anti-holding company bill as undue government intrusion in business and formed what generally is expected to be the keynote of the convention—strenuous opposition to government interference with business.

These reports have yet to be voted on by the convention as a whole, but their introduction indicated a vast change from the cooperative attitude displayed at the chamber's 1934 meeting. In his fireside chat last night President Roosevelt called for enactment by congress of both the banking and holding company measures.

CONTRACTS TO BE GIVEN THURSDAY

Contracts for roads and bridges involving an expenditure of approximately \$100,000 will be awarded at a meeting of the state highway commission to be held in Portland May 2, R. H. Baldock, state highway engineer, announced Monday.

Baldock said no information had been received from Washington as to when the state of Oregon will receive its federal allocation of \$11,000,000 of highway aid funds.
