GINN ADMITS GUILT ON DRIVING CHARGE

\$100 Fine Imposed; Pyett, Also Held for Drunken Motoring, To Plead

Jerry Ginn of Dayton route two, one of two motorists arrested by Salem police early Sunday on charges of driving while under the influence of intoxicating liquor, asked 24 hours in which to plead when arraigned before Municipal Judge Jones Monday morning but returned in the afternoon and pleaded guilty. Bert Stephens, with whom Ginn had been driving, paid the \$100 fine imposed by Judge Jones. Additional penalty assessed consisted of revocation of Ginn's driver's license for a year and a 30-day suspended jail sentence.

Carl E. Pyett of West Salem, the other motorist booked on a drunken driving charge, is to appear in municipal court to plead at 10 a. m. today. Charles Bull of Salem suffered cuts and bruises as the result of a collision in which Pyett was involved.

RUBBISH NUISANCE TO BRING ARRESTS

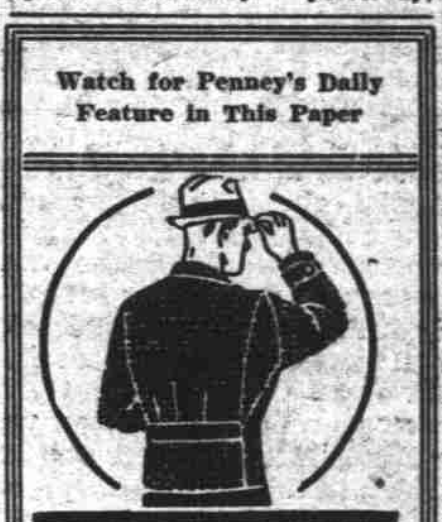
