

GOVERNOR WILL OUST CORNELIA

"Hearing" Will Be Gesture Only With No Counsel for Mrs. Pierce

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which would have been released, at least in part today, was said to have been destroyed in the capitol fire.

Governor Martin some weeks ago asked Mrs. Pierce to turn in her resignation as a member of the board of higher education. When she refused to give it, the governor set May 1 as the date for the formal hearing on charges which under state law, must precede the removal of a member of the board of higher education.

Mrs. Pierce was appointed a member of the board of higher education by former Governor Meier. She took an active part in reorganization plans made by the board four years ago. Has Been Interested In Chancellor Choice

Since her residence in Washington she is known to have been in frequent correspondence with persons interested in higher education in Oregon and to have worked at Washington with several persons who have discussed various candidates for the chancellorship here.

The former state librarian is the first woman ever appointed to the board of higher education. She is the second member to be removed, Governor Meier having dropped C. L. Starr as chairman of the board. Starr gave his resignation when it was requested and did not ask for a hearing.

Governor Martin said yesterday he thought the law should be amended to do away with the preferring of charges and the conduct of a hearing before he could remove a member of the board of education. He pointed out that there was no appeal from his decision and that the law did not specify what charges had to be proved. A better functioning of state government is possible where the executive power is coupled with the power of removal, the governor indicated.

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(AP)—Mrs. Cornelia Marvin Pierce today declared she does not intend "to do anything" about Governor Charles H. Martin's request that she resign from the Oregon state board of higher education.

"I have received numerous letters on the subject from various people, but I have done nothing about it and do not intend to do anything," she said.

While Mrs. Pierce was quoted at length in Oregon regarding statements she purportedly made about the controversy between herself and the governor, she declared today that she had "not discussed the subject with anyone or written anyone regarding the statement that Governor Martin would ask me to resign."

For-Hire Truck Group to Open Service Office

The next meeting will be held at the chamber at 8 o'clock next Tuesday night.

Mails Closed to 409 in Campaign Against Lottery

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(AP)—In the biggest single blow it has ever directed at the sale of lottery tickets in this country, the postoffice department today closed the United States mails against 409 persons in Canada, Cuba and the Irish Free State.

The effect of the grand orders issued against these persons as well as three postoffice boxes in Ottawa, will be to have returned to the sender all mail addressed to them. Nor may money orders be drawn or paid to any of them.

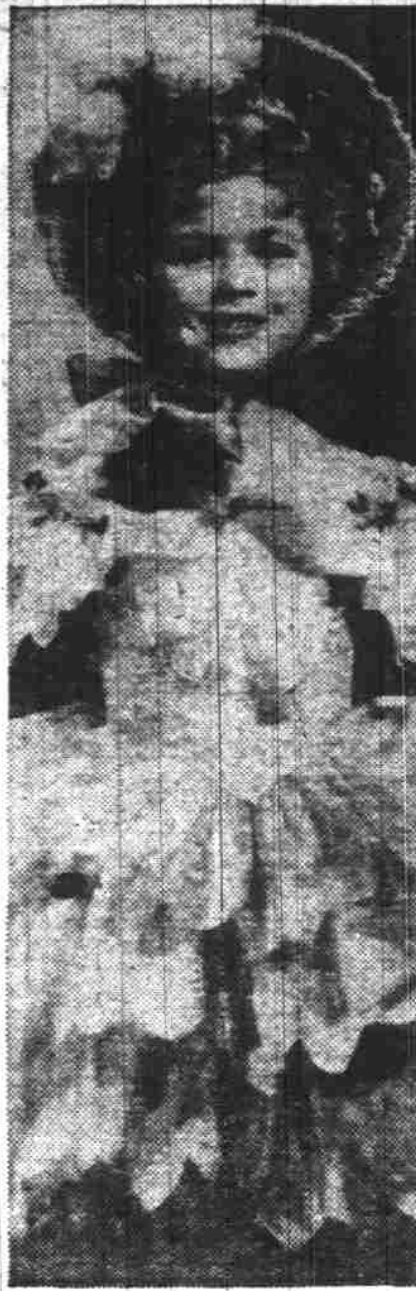
AMBASSADOR RESIGNS

MAY DAY VIOLENCE FEARED IN EUROPE

LONDON, April 30.—Omens of violence appeared in Spain, France and Austria tonight as Europe's police took elaborate precautions on the eve of the annual May day celebrations.

All over the continent the authorities were wary, fearing the day originally designated for peaceful labor festivities, would bring disorders. This was the situation.

MADRID.—A communist demonstration in Madrid yesterday wounded one woman, police at Seville jailed ten communists and Barcelona authorities seized four asserted rogues armed with chloroform and stilettes, who they charged planned to assassinate General Lopez Ochoa who was instrumental in putting down the leftist revolt in October.

PARIS.—With outdoor meetings banned, thousands of troops and police were held ready to prevent disorders in connection with 50 indoor radical meetings in the capital and many more in the provinces.

Chamber of Commerce Head Latest to Declare No Attempt Planned

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ment would remain in Salem. Plans All Presume Retention in Salem

The proposal also was condemned by Earl Snell, secretary of state.

"While the ultimate decision rests with the people I do not believe that any thinking person wants to take the capital away from Salem," Snell said. Such a move would disrupt the present capital setup and prove costly to the citizens of the entire state.

"The board of control has proceeded with its plans to erect a new capital building under the assumption that it would be located in Salem. No other thought has ever entered the mind of any member of the board."

PORTLAND, Ore., April 30.—(AP)—The Portland chamber of commerce and the Portland business group are against Representative Nelson's proposal that the state capitol be moved to Portland. Walter W. R. May, chamber manager, said tonight.

"Nelson did not talk with us and it is not our proposal," declared May.

"I think it is just a fancy. There is no serious agitation for removal of the capitol from Salem to Portland as far as I know."

"That would be the most foolish thing that could be done. I don't think it's the view of the Portland business men. I know it is not."

"In the first place the question was settled years ago by the voters who named Salem as the capital city."

"We would be strongly against any efforts to move the capitol from Salem to Portland. We are trying our best to show upstate groups that we are working for their interests as well as for Portland interests."

May said that when the capitol burned, the chamber as a matter of course offered "any assistance possible" during the present emergency.

FEDERATION NOTES EMPLOYMENT GAIN

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(AP)—Employment gain in both March and April were reported today by William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, but he found them "so slight as to be of little consequence" when compared with the 11,500,000 out of work on April 1.

Preliminary trade union employment figures for April, Green said, showed slight increases. Complete figures for all industry in March showed a gain of 123,000 over February. Both gains were less than those reported for the corresponding months last year.

A. F. of L. leaders from all parts of the country swarmed to the capitol to lobby for enactment of the federation's legislative program, topped by the Wagner labor dispute bill.

TRADE EXPANSION PROGRAM STARTS

WASHINGTON, April 30.—(AP)—The first world-wide tryout of the administration's trade expansion program today boomed new impetus into America's drive for bigger business abroad.

Upon effectiveness at midnight of the reciprocal trade agreement with Belgium, United States shores were opened to imports from 60 other nations on the same favorable terms.

Simultaneous with this step designed to stimulate world trade in general were these other developments:

"Secretary Hull announced this government's intention to negotiate a reciprocal trade agreement with France, the eighteenth to be undertaken by the state department.

Francis B. Sayre, assistant secretary of state in charge of the foreign trade program, emphasized to the United States chamber of commerce that recapture of lost millions in foreign trade was necessary to keep employed more than 10,000,000 Americans depending on that commerce for their livelihood.

MOONEY CLEMENCY RESOLUTION VOTED

SACRAMENTO, Cal., April 30.—(AP)—The assembly of the state legislature today approved its own resolution urging Governor Frank P. Merriam to commute the life sentences of Thomas Mooney and Warren K. Billings, convicted of the 1916 San Francisco Preparedness day parade bombing.

By a vote of 33 to 44, the assembly refused to reconsider its passage of the resolution, after listening to an opponent of the measure describe graphically the bombing which killed 10 persons and injured 40 others.

Governor Frank P. Merriam announced he could not comment until he made a further study of the action. He expressed regret, however, that the resolution was not made a joint measure, so the senate could have expressed its views. It was solely an assembly action.

SHOP SITE CHOSEN ON SILVERTON ROAD

The county court has decided to purchase a five-acre tract on Silverton road adjacent to the Southern Pacific right-of-way, near the Union Oil company supply station, as the site for the new county shops. The property will be purchased from heirs of the George C. Savage estate, the county to pay \$200 down and the remainder when the estate is settled.

To provide access to the road a small triangular plot of land also will be bought from a man named Waller. The main tract has 800 feet paralleling the railroad, by which it will be connected by a long spur from the south.

The shops will include a main shop building, two storage warehouses, a garage and a service station for county use. Building material to start construction has already been hauled to the new site.

The county will wreck the old shops on Center street as soon as the new ones are ready for use.

Grotto Refused Beer License as Church Neighbor
