lative outburst when he told the grange lobbyists to go home and tend to their farms—the state-house was in safe hands. And with persons like Mrs. Pierce, who has become a liberal of the liberals, also she canvassed the eastern Oregon provinces for her husband, an "overt" act by the Martin administration would put them all on the stump making trouble.

Merits Power Policy
Strenuously Bidded

What irks the malcontents in Oregon's political scene? First, they are highly dissatisfied with Governor Martin's power policy. They think the state should at once provide power lines from Bonneville. Possibilities of federal lines to them are too indefinite. They point to Muscle Shoals which stood idle 15 years because Washington lobbyists blocked its utilization.

Nor do they like the power regulation policy of Oregon's new deal. Charles M. Thomas, as utilities commissioner, may have been dilatory and his accomplishments in lower rates may have been negligible, but he was out openly baiting the utilities and swinging his regulation club. The peace which now hovers over the utilities department in state affairs arouses the suspicions of Oregon's utility hating citizens and there is a vast group of them.

The Zimmerman-Gill-Pierce group thinks the governor contemptuous of poverty and unsympathetic with distress. They are afraid relief needs of Oregon will not be met and that adequate pensions for old age will be opposed by the administration.

Proposal to Reduce
Special Taxes Harsh

And a recent statement by Governor Martin that intangible taxes and probably income taxes should come down in rate was anathema to the "liberal" wing of the democratic and the "independent" groups in the state. For them the income tax is the ideal one—only the rich man has to pay much.

These complaints are not very noisy yet; the left-wing groups in Oregon are letting the general have his political honeymoon. But they are watching and waiting and complaining and some day there may be a coalescence of forces—strong enough to initiate a power line plan which will not require legislative approval or strong enough to place old-age pension planning in Oregon directly in the hands of the people through an initiative-supported measure.

Governor Martin has tried to keep the mavericks corralled. He gave Mrs. Pierce every chance to get off the board of education gracefully. Never a companion Walter Pierce in congressional days, General Martin nevertheless dined to out the wife of his former colleague and incidentally, the wife of the patronage king of Oregon's democracy. It does the party in the state no good to have the eastern Oregon Farley-man action to throw a dagger into the western Oregon governor.

The executive has treated Mr. Zimmerman with the utmost cordiality. He listened long and attentively to Slaughter and Gill at the Bear case hearing. However, by training the governor is a conservative, entirely out of place with the "liberal" group who have quite a following in Oregon's democratic ranks and certainly in the pro-Zimmerman group which made such a race last November. In speeches such as his Medford and Corvallis addresses the governor's contempt for the calibre of his political critics comes to light; then he snaps out crisp statements about "tin horn" politicians and "crack-pots" and Zimmerman and his crew bite their lips and wait—they insist they shall yet be able to make Oregon safe from democracy.

One hundred ninety fewer checks will be distributed to work project employees tomorrow and the value of the payroll will be \$122 less than for the previous week. The payroll completed yesterday amounts to \$7957.60 divided among 899 checks.

Relief officials point to reduced federal allotments as the reason in part for enforced curtailment of relief activities.

When he bitterly assailed American rule and the independence efforts headed by Manuel Quezon, Ramos said, "We know that the American government in the islands is so strong that revolt against it means virtual suicide."

The Sakdalista uprising in the Philippines, he described as "a demonstration not only against the United States, but also against members of the commonwealth party, who are betraying the cause of our people through fear of losing their position in the present government."

If the commonwealth is established, Ramos said, "it means an end to all hopes of real Philippine independence."

FEDERAL LOANS AT LOW RATE OFFERED

Local farmers now have opportunity to obtain Federal Land bank loans at the lowest rate in agricultural history, 4 1/2 per cent, it is announced by F. L. Wilkinson, secretary-treasurer of the Marion-Polk Farm Loan association of Salem.

This reduction is made possible by the land bank's ability to market a new issue of its bonds to the investing public on the most favorable terms in the 18 years this cooperative mortgage institution has been serving northwest farmers.

Land bank loans are made through and endorsed by the Marion-Polk Farm Loan association. Borrowers participate in this cooperative credit system by acquiring voting stock in their local association to the extent of 5 per cent of the amount of their loans.

The association in turn makes a corresponding investment in the capital stock of the regional bank.

Since its organization in 1917 the Marion-Polk Farm Loan association has made 554 loans through the land bank in this manner for a total of \$1,660,000.

Bradwood Dock Worker Drowns

ASTORIA, Ore., May 4. — (AP) Search was made in the Columbia river today for the body of Donald Logan, 35, who drowned last night at Bradwood when knocked from the Quaker line steamer San Vincente by a singload of lumber.

Richard Reed, another crew member, was hit by the same singload but was knocked out of the dock. He escaped with an injured ankle. Logan was a native of Scotland.

ture for use of the state treasurer and state land office.

This will necessitate another lengthy meeting of the board at which the report will be discussed.

Earl Snell, secretary of state, today reiterated his opposition to retaining this part of the old structure unless it will save the state a substantial amount of money.

Governor Martin previously proposed such a recommendation as an economy measure.

The board also will consider early next week a proposal by Senator McNary that the state borrow money from the federal government for construction of a new capitol building and that it be repaid at suitable periods on a rental basis. McNary declared that such a plan would insure a liberal federal grant.

The Willamette Valley association, booster organization, will perfect its permanent organization at a meeting tentatively set for Tuesday night, May 14, in Salem, it was agreed at the second meeting of the association, held at Eugene Friday night, according to William P.
