MT. ANGEL, May 6.—National music week was ushered in here with the presentation of a joint musicale and oratory contest by the students of the college and seminary, in the auditorium, Sunday afternoon. A goodly crowd attended.

Rev. Vincent Koppert, rector of the college gave the address of welcome. Winners of first and second place in the high school elocution contest, held at M. A. C. recently, then delivered the prize winning recitations. Peter Kaiser, first prize winner, gave "The Roman Sentinel" and Jack Kaiser, who took second place, the "Defense of Hoffer". Both students are from Portland.

Speakers in the oratorical contest were Alexander Williams of San Francisco who spoke on "Communism"; Anthony Kalberer, Milwaukee, on "Reckless Driving"; Vincent Newlin, Portland, with a denunciation of extreme nationalism; and Ercole Battaglia, Milwaukee, an impassioned plea for the reinstatement of the Golden Rule in affairs national as well as provincial.

The prize winner will be announced at the graduation exercises, June 2, and will be presented with a gold medal. Judges were Rev. Fr. DeRuen of St. Paul; Dr. Leo Meinberg of Portland; and Alton Bassett, Portland attorney.

The orchestra, under the inspired baton of Alexander Scharbach gave excellent renditions of selections of Sullivan's comic operas, down south by Middleton, and Over the Waves. The college quartette composed of Dooley, Newlin, Johnson and Brost sang "The Rosary" by Nevin and "Sylvia" by Schubert and encores.

at Sublimity 12th

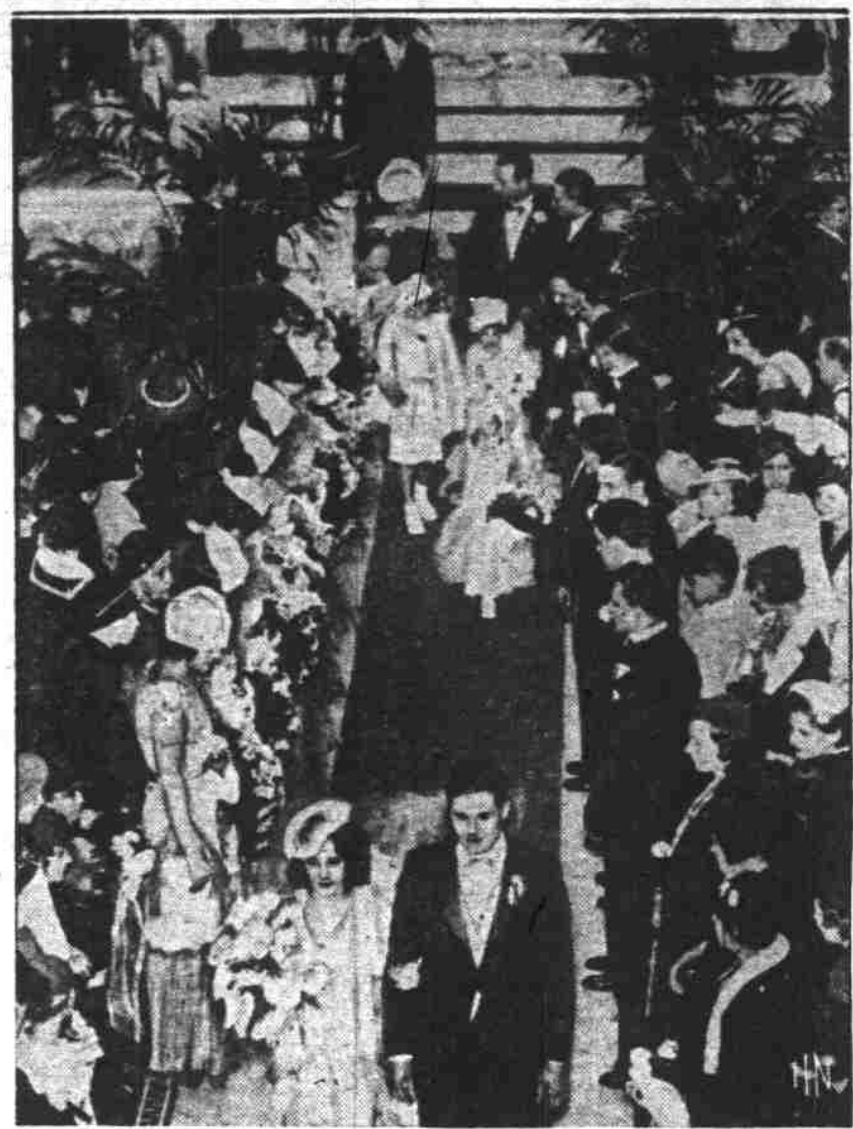
SUBLIMITY, May 6.—Sunday night, May 12, the St. Joseph's parish dramatic club of Salem will give a play here at the C. O. F. hall.

Mrs. Deverick was elected chaplain to serve the remainder of the year, Mrs. Creta Whitlock having resigned.

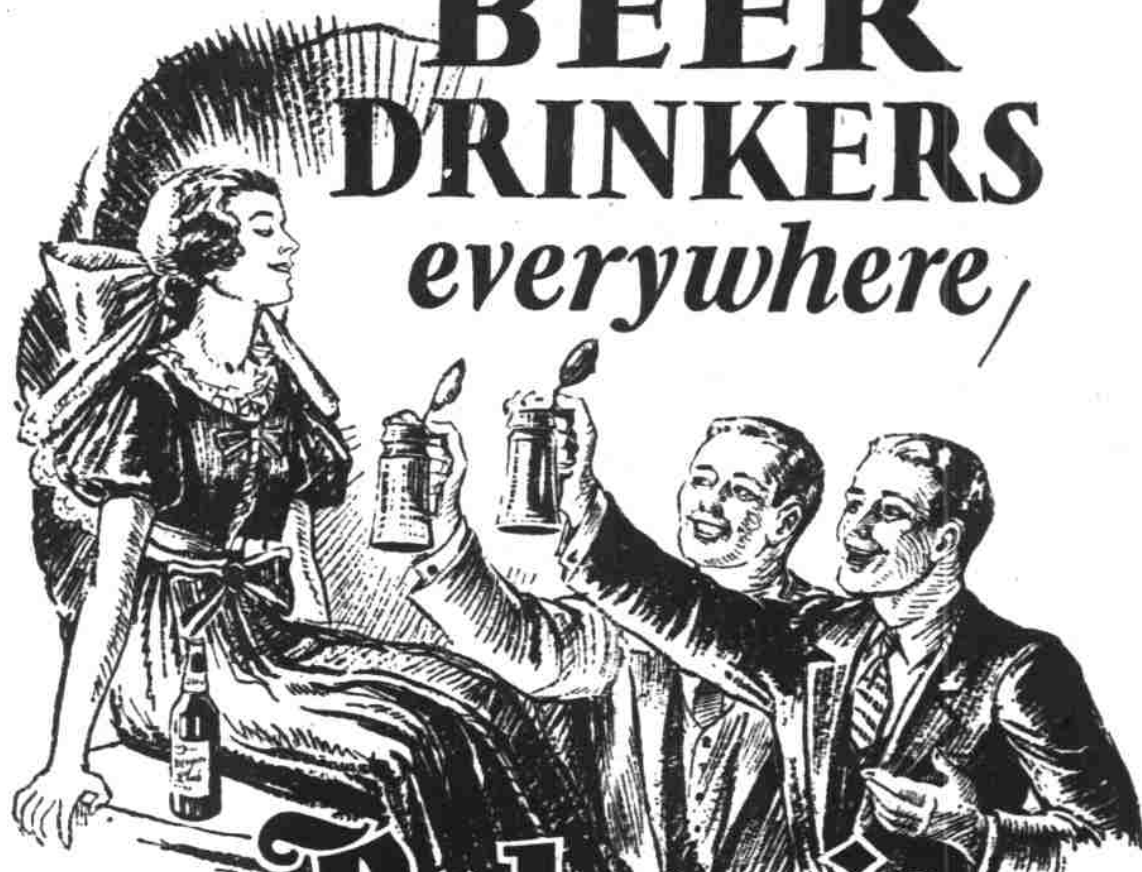
