to the county by the secretary of state's office. The Marion county court requested the state to handle the audit. Two of the workers are hired by the state; two are men who have formerly worked for the county.

CITY AND DISTRICT SUE SURETY FIRM

Receivers for the National Surety company are asked to pay the city of Glendale \$972 and School District 4 of Douglas county \$14,735 in a claim filed Monday in circuit court here.

The suit grows out of the alleged irregularities in the handling of Douglas county funds by James E. Swayers who retired as treasurer in January, 1933. Glendale and the school district contend that tax funds in the sums claimed were paid into the Douglas county treasury for the benefit of the claimants and were not turned over to the city and the school district. The surety company, now in receivership, is held liable and State Treasurer Holman is held liable for the moneys out of bonds held in trust by him for the benefit of parties having claims against the surety firm.

Failure to file the claims earlier, counsel for the claimants says, was due to the fact that the audit of Douglas county affairs was not completed until 1934, about 18 months after Dr. H. Lenox, incoming treasurer, took office.

GIROD TAKES OVER ROAD OILING TASK

Ralph Girod has assumed his new duties as general foreman for the road oiling work the county expects to do this summer. Girod will select a crew of from 30 to 40 men. Glenn Rowell of the J. C. Compton company has already been retained by Marion county in a supervisory capacity to assist the court and Girod in the selection of proper oiling machinery in the determination of specifications and materials and in giving advice on other details of a road oiling program.

The county court has not yet designated the roads it will oil this summer but expects to do so shortly.

Members of the court yesterday pointed out that the word "oiling" was somewhat of a misnomer; that the county's plan, following state highway specifications, in reality called for the application of a light coat of macadam surface to the roads designated for "oiling."

ADULT EDUCATION WORK WILL CEASE

Orders to discontinue all non-special SERRA adult education classes in Salem by Saturday were received here this week by Superintendent Silas Gaiser from Robert J. Maake, state director of emergency education. Shortage of federal funds, reported from Washington, D. C., was given as the reason for this action.

Special education projects for which exceptions are made are the nurseries at Grant and Park schools, the daytime adult continuation school classes and the playground workers' course, according to T. T. Mackenzie, director of vocational education in Salem. The nursery schools will end May 30.

Inclusion of the playground course in the list of special classes that may be continued was secured by Mackenzie because probably among its participants will be selected the staff for Salem's summer playgrounds.

To Show Exhibit Of Relief Work At Parley Soon

Exhibits of the garments, comforters, furniture and canned goods turned out on Marion county relief projects will be taken to the Oregon conference of social workers to be held May 12 to 14 at the Multnomah hotel, Portland, according to Dorothy Ann Gordon, head of the social workers' division here. She will attend all of the conference and is arranging for her entire staff to be present for at least a part of it.

Marion county has received statewide recognition for its canning project. The sewing and furniture show projects here have resulted in many old garments and pieces of furniture being reconditioned for use by relief families.

BIG DITCH BLOWUP CAUGHT BY CAMERA

More than 1000 feet of ditch was hoisted into the air yesterday afternoon as the eyes of a news reel camera caught the scene, enacted on the last sector of the Hubbard-Woodburn drainage project. The blasting, in which 500 pounds of powder was used, was on the property of Emil Zwicker and Gene Wohlschlag.

Harry Riches, county agent, reported that the demonstration, the last of a series, was entirely successful. Also eyeing the demonstration were J. S. Gordon and A. W. Green, representatives of powder companies, and Art King, irrigation specialist with the extension service at Oregon State college. A crowd of interested farmers and others looked on.

The six-mile ditch comprising the project is nearing completion now, with only some cleaning out and a few stray bits of blasting to do. The project covers parts of land of 32 farms in that area, and has been carried on by the farmers with advisory assistance from the county agent and college and some SERRA funds for cutting brush.

Riches said yesterday he hopes to have made a compilation of costs of the blasting and other work in connection with the drainage area.

WHEAT PRODUCERS VOTE ON PROGRAM

No idea of the way wheat farmers in Marion county are voting on AAA can be obtained until May 25 when all ballots are counted, according to Harry Riches, county agent. Three groups of wheat farmers who have participated in the AAA program have already voted; three remaining groups will ballot by May 25. The vote of the state will be wired to Washington, D. C. from Corvallis where a compilation is being made.

For the first two years of the wheat control program farmers signing under AAA reduced their acreage 20 per cent. This year the reduction will be only 15 per cent on the average acreage planted the three years before the AAA agreement became effective.

Secretary of Agriculture Wallace will use the vote by the wheat control group to determine policies of AAA for the future.

NARCOTIC CHARGES AGAINST 2 DENIED
