between workers and mill officials failed. Some men strike. Others forced to quit.

The strike also was spreading among the plywood plants on Grays Harbor and at Tacoma. Part of the men involved were forced to quit when mills closed with the striking of the union crew members.

The western pine area was brought into the strike picture with the shutdown today of the Deer Park lumber company mill and logging camp when strike talk was heard among some of the 250 employees.

A shortage of sawdust and other wood fuels became a possibility today, and a shortage of boxes menaced the fish, berry and fruit industries of Washington state.

"These men have simply stopped their jobs at the most prosperous time of the year," lumber executives who did not wish to be quoted said.

The Elliott Bay Lumber company, picketed by strikers, decided to shut down, throwing 300 more out of work.

Some ships were tied up because of the lumber strike. For example longshoremen refused to load lumber on the Beljeune, chartered by the Girdwood Shipping company. Possibility was seen that the Maritime Federation of the Pacific, strongest union on the coast, might become involved, particularly since it has agreed to support the oil tanker strike, but its leaders declined to comment tonight.

Hope that a settlement of the mill workers' strike may be announced at an early date was expressed by P. T. Marsh, government mediator, in a telegram received by Governor Martin yesterday. Marsh makes his headquarters in Seattle.

Marsh said he had conferred with Otto Hartwig, representing employees on the State Industrial Accident commission here, regarding the strike situation.

"An effort is being made to get the contending factions together," Marsh's telegram read.

Hartwig previously served as president of the Oregon State Federation of Labor.

Vail Medals Go to Three Seaside 'Phone Operators

Three Oregon telephone operators, Mrs. Cella Callahan, Mrs. Sarah Raw and Miss Marjorie White, all of Seaside, and a switchman, Jack J. Wilde, of Seattle, Wash., have been awarded bronze Vail medals for self-sacrificing public service, according to word received by H. V. Collins, district manager for The Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company.

The medals commemorate the service ideals pioneered by Theodore N. Vail, early-day president of the American Telephone and Telegraph company, and the four awards were the only ones made on the Pacific coast last year.

Pineapple Chicken

1 young chicken
1 tablespoon of Soy sauce or Worcestershire
1 tablespoon lard
1 can of pineapple
Singe and wash chicken and cut off all flesh. Slice in pieces convenient for serving. Heat the lard in a frying pan, being careful not to burn it, add the chicken which has been seasoned and fry until cooked through and browned, about thirty-five minutes. Add soy and pineapple cut into small pieces and cook slowly fifteen minutes longer. Remove chicken and pineapple to hot platter. Thicken gravy with one teaspoon cornstarch or two teaspoons of flour. Pour over chicken and surround with hot rice. Serves six.

Pineapple Crumb Pudding

1/2 cup butter
3/4 cup confectioner's sugar
3 egg yolks
1 cup chopped pineapple
1/2 teaspoon salt
3 egg whites, beaten
1/2 cup blanched shredded almonds
1/2 lbs. vanilla wafers, rolled
Cream butter and sugar. Add egg yolks and pineapple. Beat two minutes. Add salt and egg whites. Sprinkle layer of crumbs in bottom of buttered dish. Add layer of egg mixture. Fill dish, alternating the layers. The top layer should be crumbs. Chill 12 hours or longer. Unmold carefully and spread with whipped cream. Serve cut in slices. Makes six or eight portions.

Erwin Writes to Ask About Retirement Pay; Snell Raises More Issues

questions that should be settled now so that neither the people of Oregon nor the governor will be left in any doubt.

Erwin asked for the opinion after Attorney-General Van Winkle had held six members of the legislature ineligible to serve because they have accepted other lucrative state or federal appointments.

The question also was raised here today as to the eligibility of lawyer members of the legislature who hold national commissions.

Notarial Commission Question Is Raised

This law reads: "The governor shall appoint in each county of the state one or more notaries public who shall be considered state officers and shall hold their offices for a term of four years."

A search, developing throughout the state yesterday, indicated that a large number, perhaps a majority, of the members of the legislature, hold some other public office. Several are mayors, several hold city offices, and a number have legal jobs with state or federal boards.

With Representative Lew Wallace of Portland declaring he would demand his seat in the house, despite the attorney-general's opinion and Secretary of State Snell's action, either a court test or a bitter controversy when the legislature next meets, was assured last night.

STATE POLICE GET AUTOMATIC RIFLES

Six sleek automatic rifles were added yesterday to the equipment of Oregon's state police—the last word in peace officers' arms.

The rifles will fire 16 bullets as fast as the operator can pull the trigger. Of .30 calibre, firing a 180-grain bullet, the rifle will carry 200 yards at flat range and the bullet will penetrate three-eighths of an inch of steel.

State police officers said yesterday they considered the new automatic rifles much more satisfactory than machine guns, being more accurate and having greater penetration power as well as being easier to operate.

Bullets are in a steel clip which attaches to the gun directly below the bullet chamber.

One of the rifles will be placed in each of six different regional offices of the state police department throughout the state.

The rifles, made by the Peace Officers' Equipment company, are sold only to police and cannot be obtained by private owners.

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BUCK CHAIN LETTER PLAN PROVING FLOP

than five and they waited on stragglers.

One of the scores of notaries who helped certify that the chains were "cheater proof" advanced a bit of inside information when assured of anonymity.

"Quite a lot of people managed, by pushing their letters, to get their investment back," he said.

"Quite a few realized from \$10 to \$15. But thousands were left holding the bag."

A \$5 chain, dubbed "the pot of gold club," and a \$3 chain, advertised as "the cream of the crop," were glorified developments here on the original time plan.

The main point was to get on a list, starting at the bottom, give the money to the person heading it, cross out that name and pass the list along to two others. The theory was that each purchaser's name ultimately climbed to the payoff position. Springfield's variation of this was to authenticate the lists before notaries public and work from person-to-person in the big brackets instead of through the mails.

Guy Harpool, a grocery store manager, said he realized more than \$400. John Matthews, a butcher in his store, got almost as much. But the two men devoted four days, and almost as many sleepless nights working the chains.

"The only way you can get anything out of the chains, is to stay with them," Harpool explained. "When you get into a chain, you have to keep track of the letters your name is on. When someone gets one with your name on it, and can't pass it, you have to get out and help them sell it. Boy, it's a full time job."

Litigation Paid Out of Surplus

Defense of condemnation proceedings on the Salem and Hillsboro water cases totalling \$37,971 was charged to the surplus of the Oregon-Washington Water Service company during 1934, the annual statement of that corporation reveals. This does not include all charges for the litigation, since a large chargeoff was also made in 1933. The company's account-ants do not charge the defense of condemnation proceedings to current expenses but deduct the outlays each year from the company's surplus.

GUARD MANEUVERS TO START JUNE 11

Military maneuvers, involving more than 7000 men and 600 officers of the National Guard from Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, will open at Camp Lewis, near Tacoma, June 11. Major General George A. White announced yesterday.

Oregon will send 2800 officers and men to the encampment. These will include the 32nd brigade, comprising the 162nd and 185th infantry regiments and the 218 field artillery and 167th field hospital company. Movement of the Oregon troops will begin by train and transport June 10.

The training period will include 15 days and will end with combat exercises starting June 20. On Sunday, June 23, the troops will parade with the governors of the four states and Major General Paul B. Malone of San Francisco, corps area commander, in the reviewing stands.

Ninety fast trucks carrying a part of the Oregon troops will leave Portland in three convoys early June 11.

Railway Agents Hold Meet Here

Ormandy, general passenger agent from Portland, addressed them on prospects for business during the summer. Keith Abbott of the advertising department showed pictures of Mexico and of the "four great gateways" which the railroad serves.

PIONEER IS SUICIDE

PENDLETON, Ore., May 9.—(AP)—Following his wife who died two years ago, George R. Roberts, 80, pioneer resident of Umatilla county, shot himself to death late yesterday. He had been in ill health. The body was found in a vacant house he owned.

BONNEVILLE POWER PARLEY SCHEDULED

Rates and construction of transmission lines, involved in the Bonneville power development, will be discussed by Senator McNary, President Roosevelt and Secretary Ickes, at a conference to be held in Washington soon, McNary advised Governor Martin yesterday.

McNary telegraphed that he already had conferred with General Pillsbury, chairman of the federal board of army engineers, regarding the rate situation.

Another conference between McNary and Commissioner McAdams of the federal bureau of reclamation also has been arranged.

The purpose of the latter conference is to obviate competitive rates from government agencies, McNary said.

McNary's telegram indicated that Colonel Robins, federal engineer with headquarters in Portland, would be called to Washington in connection with the rate and transmission line problems.

Four-Way Meet On at Corvallis

The Willamette university track team will participate in a four-way meet at Corvallis today with track and field teams of Oregon State college, Pacific university and Oregon Normal. Both Pacific and Oregon Normal have defeated the Beacrats in dual meets. The Willamette strong points, as usual, will be in the distance and weight events. The Beacrats will meet strong competition in the distance runners of the Oregon State team. However, Coach Grant Swan of the Beavers is also short on dash men.
