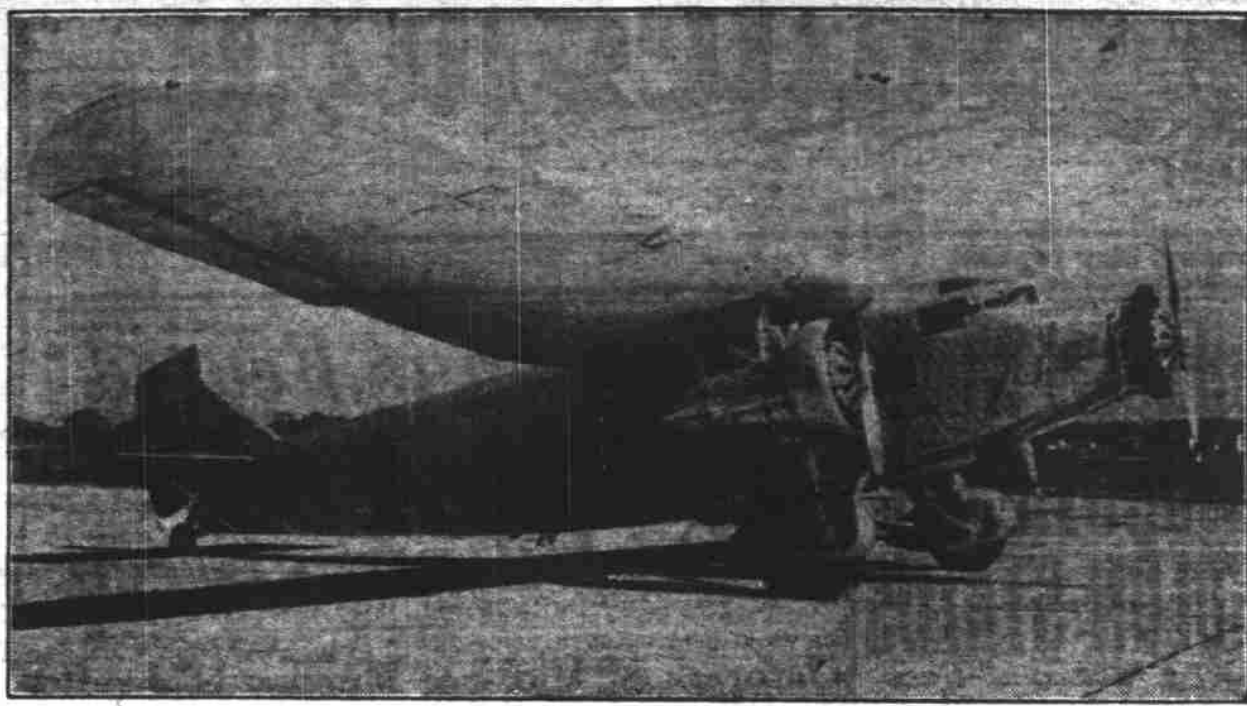

TAXPAYERS AGREE ACTION NECESSARY

The opinion of a large number of architects and engineers that a new statehouse cannot be constructed on the ruins of the old should be taken as "conclusive evidence" that the old walls should be razed, the executive committee of the Salem Taxpayers' league announced yesterday. Commending Governor Martin and the state board of control for their efforts to secure a new, adequate capitol building here, the Salem group said it "severely condemned the action of the Marion County Taxpayers' league in filing suit to prevent razing the old capitol's walls."

DAVY'S LOCKER TO BE OPENED TODAY

Something novel in a place to obtain light lunches and beer is to be opened today in Salem when John L. Stark, proprietor of the Port-Hole, on High and State streets, opens his "Davy Jones' Locker," a restaurant he has had under construction for the past six weeks.

The "Locker," fashioned as an "undersea" room, has a clever counter in the center of the room, fashioned after an old-time sailing vessel. Grottoes complete with mermaids and multi-colored fish are in the end of the room. Varicolored booths made from wood imitative of that used on a vessel are placed on three sides of the basement room, which is directly beneath the Grotto, the new restaurant and the Grotto being under the same management.

German style sandwiches, rattol and spaghetti will be featured foods. Many touches have been added to make the "Locker" realistic in appearance. A large steering wheel forms the ceiling, and wooden floats are used for decorations.

tion—a power vested only in the voters—when it passed a bill giving the county commissioners or courts the duty of filling legislative vacancies. Gleason quoted the constitution as follows:

"When during a recess of the legislative assembly a vacancy shall happen in any office, the appointment to which is vested in the legislative assembly, or when at any time a vacancy shall have occurred in any other state office or in the office of judge of any court, the governor shall fill such vacancy by appointment, which shall expire when a successor shall have been elected and qualified; . . ."

However, later speakers called attention to an amendment the people voted in November, 1930, providing:

"The senators and representatives shall be chosen by the electors of the respective counties or districts into which the state may from time to time be divided by law. If a vacancy in the office of senator or representative from any county or district shall occur, such vacancy shall be filled as may be provided by law."

It was contended the word "law" means a legislative act and not the constitution.

TALK LOWER WATER RATE FOR HOT DAYS

WOODBURN, May 10 — At the regular meeting of the city council held Tuesday night, much discussion was had in regard to lower water rates for the summer months, but no action was taken.

An ordinance was passed designating the First National bank of Portland, Woodburn branch, as depository for all city funds. E. J. Allen, H. M. Austin and Blaine McCord were appointed as a committee to work with other committees in making application for SERRA projects for this vicinity under the new set-up.

It was decided to put a water line under the highway at once to the Ivan Byers residence which is on the east side of the pavement on Young street.

The highway commission has made an offer to give the city a blanket permit for the extension of water pipes under the highway and the recorder was instructed to make the application. It was ordered upon motion that all work done pertaining to the extension of the water service be done under the supervision of the water superintendent and he be told to make the owner to bear the expense and the city to retain ownership and control of the pipe.

Junior Artisans' Band Soon to Be Organized Here

A Junior Artisan band will be organized the first of next month, it was announced yesterday by E. A. Robey, district manager for the Artisan lodge. J. C. Hasselstab will be the band leader.

From 50 to 100 children between the ages of 8 and 12 years will be welcomed to the organization. Non-members of the Junior Artisans may also affiliate with the band. Rehearsals will begin June 3 in the Shrode hall, 12th and Oak streets, and will continue every Monday and Thursday after that at 7 p. m.

but that something must be done. No group can go ahead and say what should be done without letting the people have their say. I believe people would approve remodeling rather than a new courthouse."

P. N. Smith, Mt. Angel: "I came with a closed mind, that the courthouse was good enough. . . . I'm convinced differently now. We need to get the taxpayers to see it is as bad as it really is. I'd be opposed to spending \$160,000 for remodeling the old one; I think we need a new building."

J. E. Smith, Salem, former county commissioner: "The courthouse has been a problem ever since I served on the court. It looks good from the outside but is a shell inside. I think it wrong to ask the taxpayer to put up a new building. I suggest we wait and see whether we can get government money, and in the meantime make repairs as light as possible, and as cheaply, to afford necessary protection of lives; if a vault be built, build so it will be permanent and can be used in the new or remodeled courthouse. Taxpayers won't stand for a new building now."

Seymour Jones, Salem route: "First I think we should find out what it will cost and whether we want to levy a tax or whether the government will help. We need more facts. If the government would pay the biggest part, the people probably won't be opposed. I'm skeptical of incurring a large expense for a new courthouse under present conditions."

S. J. Smith, St. Paul: "St. Paul people realize valuable records need to be taken care of. Sentiment is against increase in taxes. Jim Smith's suggestion is the best."

Fred Schwab, Jr., Mt. Angel: "No one likes increasing taxes, but something has to be done. I wouldn't want it on my conscience if I were on the county court and something should happen while the courthouse is in the present condition."

J. H. Lauterman, Salem: "Something should be done. I express my sympathy to the county court, for they'll be damned if they do and damned if they don't. I'm not in favor of building an entirely new courthouse, I believe this one can be remodeled and be entirely satisfactory for many years to come. I talked to Judge Lewelling this morning and he tells me it would be impossible under the law for the court to build a new courthouse without a vote of the people, and that it is necessary to raise all the money before building is started."

C. M. Smith, Marion: "I wouldn't approve a new building. We should take care of the cells first; provide another watchman; then comply with the fire marshal's recommendations. I approve of the plans made for remodeling."

George Keech, Stayton: "Any building would cost more with government money than without, according to their methods of dealing that I have come in contact with. . . . In Stayton there is a strong sentiment for that old building. . . . the remodeling plans now drawn up look magnificent to me."

J. G. Fontaine, Jefferson: "In my area there is a strong sentiment against a new building at the present time. I would urge the county court to go ahead and make safeguards against fire as outlined by the fire marshal's report. I don't think we could put a new courthouse over it we wanted to."

S. A. Miller, Aurora: "I'm not in favor of a new courthouse. I believe if people would fall in line with remodeling."

C. M. Crittenden, Hubbard: "People around Hubbard would fight the building of a new courthouse. I think plans for recon-

struction of the present one would be approved."

D. E. Hill of Hill City: "I favor a new building. . . . I think we should determine what the majority of this group stands for and then all work together as far as the voters go."
