## Talk to Show Habits of Wild Life

EVERYONE interested in wild life, and who isn't, is invited to hear William L. Finley, nationally known photographer, author and lecturer at the First Congregational church Wednesday night when he will give an illustrated talk.

Mr. Finley has some 150 magazine articles and three books to his credit, sharing authorship with Mrs. Finley. Each year he spends part of his time lecturing on wild life in the Eastern states. He was the first to use motion pictures in "showing" wild animals and birds in their natural surroundings.

Although the Finleys reside near Portland, they spend months each year on camping expeditions, studying and photographing wild animals and birds. In a specially built concrete vault at the Jennings Lodge home, Mr. Finley has thousands of negatives of still life and several thousand feet of motion picture film.

Intermingled with the home life of wild folk pictured in the movies to be shown Wednesday are striking scenes of camping and fishing in the forest and packing over high mountain passes.

Through the knack of taming the wildest creatures that run or fly, the Finley's motion picture stories lure both children and grown-ups.

There will be an afternoon illustrated lecture for members of the Woman's club only at the clubhouse on North Cottage, Wednesday, 3 o'clock.
