

NATION WILLING TO PEG DOLLAR

Devalued Only to Necessary Degree Says Morgenthau in Radio Address

A tempting invitation for the others not to follow, but again to take advantage of our disadvantage.

To arguments that the government should devalue, "that we will not change the present gold content of the dollar," he replied: "So far from engaging in a competitive devaluation race with the other nations, we hold out to them a currency of such steadiness that the normal tendency may very well be for the rest of the world to move gradually toward practical exchange stabilization.

"If that can be achieved, the final step should come easily and of its own accord. Unless somebody rocks the boat that would be the natural course."

Would Restore Silver?

Morgenthau spoke much of gold and foreign trade. Of silver, which the government is directed to buy until world prices reach the coinage value of \$1.29 an ounce or treasury stocks a one-to-three ratio with gold, he had principally this to say:

"We also are endeavoring to restore silver to greater usefulness as a monetary metal. It is the money of a large part of the world's population."

Morgenthau summarized his own analysis of the dollar in these words:

"First, you have an absolutely sound dollar.

"Second, the monetary policy of this administration rescued us from chaos; held the fort during the most trying period of our recovery program; and now is the spearhead as we advance steadily toward our goal.

"Third, of the great trading nations that revalued their currencies, we were the last, until quite recently, when Belgium joined us."

Odd Fellows Lodge Here is Over 82 Years Old; Growth And History Are Recounted

Editor's note—In anticipation of the convention of the Grand Lodge of Odd Fellows in Salem May 19 to 23, inclusive, the following history of Chemeketa lodge No. 1 of Salem has been prepared:

Convention Committee

The Salem Lodge of Odd Fellows was established through the efforts of E. M. Barnum, E. N. Cooke, Samuel E. May, A. W. Ferguson, C. S. Woodward, J. R. Hardin, and Joel Palmer.

Dr. William H. Willson, the original proprietor of the townsite of Salem, was responsible for its name, Chemeketa lodge. Because it was the first lodge in the northwest it received the number: One. Date of institution was December 6, 1852. At the initial ceremony were received the following applications for membership: I. N. Gilbert, C. P. Cooke, Milton Shannon, W. K. Leveridge, A. Zieher and Cyrus A. Reed.

The first home of the lodge in Salem was the garret in the "old Recluse building." The next home was a hall especially fitted out over the old headquarters building, a store owned by our members, George H. Jones and E. N. Cooke, which was located on the present site of the Ladd and Bush bank.

The first cemetery 1854

The first cemetery of the Odd Fellows was acquired in July, 1854. Mortality among the members of that young lodge must have been extra low, as during the first 25 years of its existence the lodge lost only 15 members by death. They were: David C. Raymond, Nathan M. McCarthy, David Daggett, A. J. Riley, John B. Smith, Hez. Coffin, E. T. Wheeler, Daniel Strang, Charles Hoffmeyer, John Zieher, J. Walt Smith, L. S. Scoville, Gustavus Hines, J. A. McCracken, and A. B. Cosper.

Being the first lodge in this district, it became Chemeketa's lot and welcome duty to mother many other lodges into being. Among these are: Samaritan Lodge No. 2 of Portland (April 8, 1853), followed December 31, 1853, by Oregon Lodge No. 3 of Oregon City, and on July 26, 1854, by Albany Lodge No. 4 of Albany.

The first grand lodge convened in May, 1855, in Oregon City, and the first grand master was E. M. Barnum of Salem.

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LOWER SCHOOL LEVY PLANNED

Expenses May Be Increased but Debt Service Will Be Down, Forecast

SERA labor was withdrawn and the district had to dig into the treasury to finish the annexes in time for the opening of school.

Opportunity for modernizing of some and replacement of other of the Salem school buildings, which has often been discussed at board meetings but has never led to definite planning, is heightened by the fact that the district's bonded indebtedness is rapidly approaching the zero point.

At the beginning of the present school year this debt amounted to \$65,000. Today with the new \$15,000 issue added in, it is \$44,000. At the end of the year 1935-36 it will be \$38,500; 1936-37, \$33,000. The year 1937-38 will see redemption of the last of all but the newest issue, on which \$10,500 will remain to be paid off at the rate of \$1500 a year.

If the tentative budget is finished in time for tonight's board session, it is expected a citizens' budget committee will be named at the next meeting, May 28. The administration hopes this year to be able to have final action taken on the budget before the new school year begins in mid-June.

Patman Bill Has Support of VFW

Local members of the Veterans of Foreign Wars organization, in session last night at the chamber of commerce rooms here, voted to send petitions immediately to Senator Charles L. McNary and Representative James W. Mott, urging them to vote to override President Roosevelt's expected veto of the Patman bonus bill.

The members, however, expressed doubt if the Patman measure could be carried over an executive veto. The majority of members at the meeting favored the Patman bill instead of the more conservative Vinson measure.

Commander Ray Betzer of the local veterans' organization will head a drive this morning to secure names of local business men who will endorse telegrams to Senator McNary and Representative Mott, urging their vote to override the veto.

The veterans decided to sponsor a benefit dance next week in the armory. Plans were also made to send a record breaking Salem delegation to the state convention to be held in Newport in June.

Betzer told the membership that plans had been arranged to bring several outstanding speakers to Salem soon to present lectures with a widespread public appeal. The public as well as veterans will be invited to the lectures.

HEALTH WORK HAS WIDE RECOGNITION

Marion County System Gets Praise From Federal Aide, Visitor

"There is scarcely any part of the United States where Marion county, Oregon, isn't known for its health work."

This was the statement of Pearl McIver of Washington, D. C., consultant in public nursing for the United States public health service, who was here yesterday surveying health department activities. She spent the day traveling about the county with members of the health department nursing staff.

Possibility that the federal government might provide additional public health nursing service throughout the county in the near future was seen by Miss McIver in the fact that her department at Washington recently was asked to report on how many nurses would be required to bring each county up to accepted standards.

"We could use five more here," said Dr. Vernon A. Douglas, Marion county's health officer, in his office where Miss McIver was visiting. The department now has five nurses.

Considering as a standard one nurse for every 5000 persons, there should be 7500 more public health nurses in rural sections of the county and 3000 in urban districts, Miss McIver said.

The consultant is being shown about the state by Miss Mary P. Billmeyer, state advisory nurse. Miss McIver was requested to survey Oregon's nursing service by Dr. Frederick D. Stricker, state health officer.
