With Plaintiffs Judge Lewelling's decision indicated clearly that the state board of control, under the restoration act of 1925, had been empowered by the legislature to cret. expend funds provided by the act to restore, replace or rebuild with the plaintiffs that the state legislative functions in razing the capitol-the legislature had already delegated these functions, Judge Lewelling pointed out.

The court further held that though construing the complaint most favorably to the contention of the plaintiffs, this court concludes that they have not alleged facts sufficient to show a special injury to themselves separate and apart from that which would accrue to all citizens of the state of Oregon, and for this reason they have not quently their application for a restraining order must fall."




