RUTSCH WILL TAKE PULPIT IN CANADA

Rev. G. W. Rutsch, pastor of the German Baptist church here for the past eight years, has resigned to accept the call to become pastor of the German Baptist church of Glory Hill, Alberta, Canada. Although the congregation here voted against accepting his resignation, Rev. Rutsch has announced he will take the northern post, and will conclude his pastorate here June 9.

Rev. Rutsch was pastor of a church in Saskatchewan 10 years ago, and student pastor for three summers there. The charge to which he will go early next month is about 20 miles from Edmonton and includes two churches within a few miles of each other. There are no other churches in the area.

Within a year after Rev. Rutsch came to Salem, the congregation had built and dedicated a \$18,000 church edifice. The membership now numbers 150.
