JEWELERS OBJECT TO COSTLY SILVER

The mounting price of domestic silver, as set by repeated orders of the United States treasury, are meeting with the united disfavor of jewelers, it was learned here yesterday. Local stores have joined with other jewelers in the state to send formal protests to Washington against higher prices on silver.

"While the stores benefit temporarily by the increased value of their inventories, we find that the volume of sales of silver goods is materially cut down by the higher prices we must charge," one jeweler reported. "The small inventory gain we have received does not offset the loss we suffered when silver went down. By no means does this gain equal the loss we will suffer if silver prices are lifted so high people cannot afford goods made from silver."

A steady trade-in market on gold continues locally, stores report. With gold prices jumped from \$20 to \$25 an ounce, a large amount of old jewelry in gold, including watches, rings and jewel mountings, are being sold by their holders in order to realize thereon the high price obtainable for gold.

SERA Crews to Start Today on County Shop Job

Employment of SERA workmen on the new county highway shops just north of Salem will begin today although some concrete work has already been done in preparation for construction of the new shops.

Members of the county court said yesterday the shops could be completed in 60 days had the job been let at contract. A somewhat longer time will be necessary to do the job with different crews handling the work.

Carl Bahlberg has been retained by the county as general foreman of the job. The new shops will be located on a five-acre tract lying west of the Silverton road just beyond the city limits. Most of the property where the new shops are to go up belonged to the Savage estate.

Candid Camera Records Daily Life of Inmates and Officials at Sing Sing



The Candid Camera records some of events in a day's life of the inmates and officials of Sing Sing Prison, the "Big House" on the banks of the Hudson at Ossining, N. Y., in which more than two thousand of New York's law breakers are serving terms of from one year to life. Seventeen others, including a woman, Mrs. Eva Coo, wait in the condemned cells for either commutation or death in the "Hot Seat." Despite drama and tragedy, Sing Sing is a comparatively happy institution. Inmates work in the shops, enjoy radio music in their cells, are well fed, play baseball and basketball and in general enjoy life as much as is possible behind prison walls. Sing Sing's military corps, latest innovation in the "Big House" sponsored by Warden Lawes, drill frequently to inmates' band of sixty-six pieces. Rehabilitation rather than punishment is the objective.

amount of fresh beet tops as one would allow spinach per person and cook the same length of time. Peel raw beets, one or two per person, according to size, and shred these with a coarse grater. Put into a frying pan in which has been melted a tablespoon of butter. Whisk lightly over quick heat for seven or eight minutes. This gives a delicate and most delicious flavor.

Heap the "greens" on a platter, making a nest in the center, in which place the buttered beets. Season all with butter, salt and pepper, a dash of sugar and sprinkling of vinegar. Garnish outer edge with slices of hard-cooked eggs.

Beet Salad Delicious

1 small can of beets
5 sweet pickles
1 green onion
2 stalks of celery
3 hard cooked eggs
Chop the beets, pickles, onions and celery rather fine. Dice the eggs. Mix all together, dress with French dressing made by the recipe given below, and let stand for several hours, then serve with Thousand Island dressing. (If you prefer, you may keep the beets separate from the other ingredients, in order to prevent their color from dyeing everything a deep red.)

French Dressing

1 can tomato soup
1 cup salad oil
1 cup vinegar
1 tablespoon Worcestershire sauce
2 tablespoons sugar
2 teaspoons dry mustard
2 green onions
1 teaspoon paprika
Mix all together in a quart jar or deep bowl and add:
1 small whole onion
2 small whole garlic
Shake well or beat with a rotary beater. This makes about a quart and keeps indefinitely. It is delicious on lettuce or other salad.

Governor Initiates Drive To Secure Rural Electric Funds For Use in Oregon

An immediate drive to secure for Oregon federal funds for rural electrification was begun here this week by Governor Charles H. Martin.

Calling upon his hydro-electric commission, his public utilities commissioner and the state engineer, Governor Martin requested them to join in a detailed survey of the rural electrification possibilities of the state and to report to him at the earliest possible date. Their recommendations for electrification of rural districts will be forwarded at once to the newly appointed federal electrification administration, now being organized.

He also urged the commission, the utilities commissioner and the state engineer to expedite the formation of people's utility districts wherever they are found to be feasible.

Prompt Action Urged
"Prompt action is essential," Governor Martin said, "and I am asking the full cooperation of the citizens of this state. Sections of the state contemplating organization of utility districts should immediately place their preliminary petitions before the hydro-electric commission."

Martin said he was advised that Morris L. Cooke had been selected as administrator of the rural electrification program. "I am informed," Governor Martin continued, "that the general policy of the administration will be that of providing financial assistance for the distribution of power from generating plants and transmission terminal points to farms and farm homes. This will be done, according to preliminary reports, through loans to private utilities, rural cooperative organizations, state and public agencies."

House Wiring Planned
Governor Martin said these loans would be so broad as to include not only the construction of distribution systems but wire farm homes and provide necessary appliances for full utilization of power for home conveniences and mechanical farm operations.

"The cooperation with private utilities would be contingent upon the establishment of low rates by utilities," Governor Martin declared.

MA, Wash., May 16.—(AP)—One of the Pacific northwest's best known lumbermen, J. P. Weyerhaeuser, 76, former president of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company, which controlled thousands of acres of forest lands, died here today of pneumonia. He had been a widower for three years.

He became ill only Monday but his condition grew rapidly worse. His three children, Mrs. F. R. Titcomb, wife of the general manager of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company; J. P. Weyerhaeuser, Jr., vice president, both of Tacoma, and Frederick K. Weyerhaeuser of St. Paul, were to leave tonight for Rock Island, Ill., with the body where burial will be made in the family plot, probably Monday.

GERMANY TO BUILD U-BOATS, ADMITTED

BERLIN, May 17.—(Friday)—(AP)—Rear Admiral Gadow, retired, declared today that "250-ton submarines will be constructed by Germany."

The remarks of Gadow, in the Deutsche Allgemeine Zeitung, of which he is the naval expert, constitute the first even unofficial admission on the part of Germany that there is a submarine building program.

The admiral emphasized Germany's decision "no longer to do without this indispensable unit, which became necessary, since the Baltic countries have at least 50 submarines."

Referring to the large sized British and French submarines, Gadow said:

"Germany's announcement on the construction of u-boats of limited tonnage should not be a hindrance at the London naval conference."
