Crusher Started At Battle Creek; Aid Oiling Task

Operation of the Battle Creek rock crusher began yesterday with Otto Hoven in charge of the work for the county court. Material from the crusher will be used in the oiling of the Marion-West Stayton road which is one of the county highways put on the 1935 Oiling program by the county court.

SERA labor is to be used at the crusher which has recently been overhauled preparatory to the beginning of rock crushing operations. The court hopes the crusher will produce 100 yards of rock a day. Approximately 2750 yards will be needed on the Marion-West Stayton job which is five and one-half miles long and the most extensive of the oiling projects the court has put on this year's list of projects.

BEND, Ore., May 17.—(AP)—Victim of an accident to which there were no witnesses, John Dutro, 42, employee of the Sherrin-Hixon Lumber company here, lost his life today in the plant's fuel bin.

Assessment Roll Will Be Started

Writing of the 1935 assessment rolls for Marion county will begin here next Monday, "Tad" Shelton, newly named county assessor, announced yesterday. Work of six of the 12 deputy assessors who have been in the field for several months has been completed. Remaining assessments will be finished within the next few weeks with assessment of some of the isolated sections of the county being held up until late in June.

Writing of the rolls usually takes four months with the extension of taxes beginning late in the fall after the various tax levying groups make their 1935 budgets. Mr. Shelton will handle the work without the employment of another deputy.

NON-HIGH SCHOOL BOARD VOTE SOON

Details for the election of one member of the county educational board were worked out here yesterday at a meeting of the five members who comprise the present board which handles high school affairs for the non-high school districts in the county. The term of Ernest Werner, present chairman of the board, expires. He is elected from zone four and is expected to be a candidate for re-election.

Under a change in election proceedings by the 1935 legislature, representatives on the county board are elected only by voters in the zones they represent. Heretofore all residents of the non-high school area in the county have participated in the election with the law requiring that each zone have one member on the board.

The election date this year is June 17. Only zone four will participate. The last session also ironed out another tangle in the county education board's setup. It enumerated the specific items which a high school could charge in making up its tuition bill for a non-high school district student. Marion county's board had contended that depreciation was not an allowable charge. The legislative revision for tuition now includes depreciation. A lawsuit brought here last fall to determine the matter has been stopped.

Highway Deaths Lower in April

Motor vehicle fatalities in Oregon decreased 50 per cent in April, 1935, when compared with those in April a year ago, Secretary of State Snell reported yesterday.

There were 17 deaths from automobile accidents in April this year as against 33 in April, 1934. Persons injured decreased from 443 in April, 1934, to 433 in April of this year.

Accidents increased from 1718 to 1736.

Repair Project At Fairgrounds Given Approval

A \$15,771 repair project for the state fairgrounds has been approved by the Marion county relief committee with SERA work on the project running to \$8157. The state is to furnish the balance of \$6614 which will go for materials, supervision and accident insurance.

The project includes repair of the entrance to the fairgrounds, razing of the administration building and reconstruction and repair of the agricultural exhibits building. Until the \$5000 emergency appropriation for the work is approved by the secretary of state work cannot be undertaken. The legal status of the appropriation is now being considered by the attorney general's office.

Asks Settlement Of Lease Issues

T. Y. McClellan, in an amended complaint filed yesterday in circuit court, asks that a lease entered into by Fred Browning, defendant, and himself, be terminated and their respective interests in the proceeds of the ten acres of land under the lease, be determined. Plaintiff claims he is entitled to one-third of the proceeds from the sale of products from the property. The products raised on the ten-acre tract went principally to the West Stayton Cooperative Packing company which is named as co-defendant in the suit.

MOLALLA, May 17.—Sawmill men were visited today by 16 representatives of striking lumbermen's unions. Mill workers here have been working steadily and have made no complaints about hours or wages. No pickets have made their appearances yet here and mill owners are uncertain about whether or not they will be able to keep operating.

Salem Ad Club Names Thomas New President

Edwin E. Thomas was elected president of the Salem Ad club yesterday noon, succeeding Oscar D. Olson who served during the past year. E. O. Brown was named vice-president; Ralph Kleizing was named secretary-treasurer. Directors elected were Edwin Cross and Mr. Olson.

Since the inauguration of NRA, business concerns have been more careful in the statements made in their advertising. Robert Mount, manager of the Better Business Bureau in Portland, told the Ad club members. He said his bureau seldom swore out complaints against firms for false advertising. Rather, complaints against improper statements in advertising were taken directly to the heads of the firms who usually corrected overt statements without legal steps being required. Mount attributed many misleading statements in advertising to the enthusiasm of buyers for the part of advertising managers to overstate the quality of merchandise.

County's Payroll \$227,217 in Year

Marion county's payroll for the 12-month period ending April 1, 1935, which was subject to the state industrial accident compensation provisions, totaled \$227,217 according to an audit just completed at the court house. Of this payroll, \$92,410 was furnished from county funds; the balance of \$134,807 was SERA payroll with the Marion county relief committee making the payments. For the SERA work, the county's only costs were for industrial accident compensation, for supervision and for materials.

Stayton Seeks To Get Birds On Farm There

STAYTON, May 17.—C. A. Beauchamp, local sportsman, is enlisting the interest of other sportsmen in the locating of a number of pheasants from the state game farm on the Baysinger-Smith place just east of the Masonic park.

Beauchamp, who has been in touch with members of the state game commission, says that if people here get behind the movement that body will send the birds here sometime in July.

NAZI PLOTTERS TO FACE FIRING SQUAD

KAUNAS, Lithuania, May 17.—(AP)—Only the possibility of presidential clemency stood tonight between four Nazis accused of plotting to return the Memel territory to Germany and death before a firing squad.

The Lithuanian supreme court upheld today the sentences of death and of imprisonment to 87 other German residents of Memel, sentences which created flaming resentment in Germany.

Although the doomed men indicated they did not wish to appeal, their attorneys made hasty preparations to carry the matter to President Antanas Smetona, who has the power to save the men from death. Otherwise they are to go before a firing squad within 24 hours.

The condemned men are Emil Boll, Walter Preiss, Heinrich Wannagat and Emil Lepa. They were convicted of killing an alleged fellow conspirator, George Jessutis, who is said to have confessed to Lithuanian authorities that he had negotiated in Berlin with Nazi officials. His body was thrown into the river Jura.

Last Chance for Renovized House Visits Saturday

Today and tomorrow are the final days for the public to inspect the renovated house on the courthouse lawn. The dwelling will be open today between 9 a. m. and 8:30 p. m. and Sunday between 2 and 6 p. m. On Monday furniture in the house will be removed preparatory to the moving of the house to South Commercial and Wilson streets where it will be placed on a lot belonging to Leroy Grote, purchaser.

More than 12,000 persons have gone through the house in the period it has been opened. Women's clubs of the city have sent representatives to the house to act as hostesses on day.

Six thousand pieces of federal housing administration literature have been distributed.
