Protection Promised To Berry Growers
Governor Martin earlier in the day sent a letter to the Lacombe Berry Growers' association in Linn county, promising them protection in the present crisis.

"Employees of manufacturers of berry boxes, crates and barrels who desire to work are entitled to the protection of the sheriff and other authorities," Governor Martin's letter read.

"If it were reported to me that any sheriff or constable were neglecting his duty in this respect, I would not hesitate to institute proceedings to relieve him from office."

The letter from the berry growers' association read:

"We, the growers of strawberries for cold pack processing, having 270 acres in an association organized for cooperative selling, find at the beginning of the harvest season that packers are unable to buy or carry out buying agreements with growers owing to various labor disturbances affecting the production of supplies."

We therefore petition you to take charge of the situation as soon as you can, and assure you of our wholehearted support and cooperation."

Governor Martin's letter to Sheriff Weed was preceded by a conference with Ralph Moody, assistant attorney general. Charles P. Fry, superintendent of state police, conferred with Governor Martin earlier in the day.

ATTRACTIVE HOME IS RECONSTRUCTED

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this is the loveliest spot in all the world," Mr. Dexter declares. "We're both delighted here."

Mr. Dexter laughingly tells how he and Mrs. Dexter, married but a few months ago, were to stop at the farm he had purchased here for but a short time, and then to proceed upon a wedding trip "around the rim." But when they arrived she promptly decided the trip could wait until their home was made as they want it.

But that's digressing from renovation of the buildings. In the colonial house, three rooms which stretched across the front have been converted into two, with a spacious drawing room, realized from tearing out one of the partitions. In this move one of the seven fireplaces by which the house has become best known, was eliminated and another relocated. But still there are six fireplaces, three up and three down. Of course plastering, papering and painting have been done throughout the house.

The original hardwood floors, resanded and as beautiful as new, have been left uncovered in the reception room and the dining room. In the smaller sitting room to the left of the dining room and throughout the upstairs, mulberry broadloom carpets have been laid. In most of the rooms the fireplaces have been refinished; in the main room the fireplace effect is of mahogany, carrying out the colonial idea. In the small sitting room the colonial motif will be carried out in furniture which Mrs. Dexter is having shipped from Manila. Which place, incidentally, has been home for 24 years.

The kitchen has been done entirely over, with built-in galore and other modern fixtures installed, even to a partitioned sink. In the small hall separat-

ing kitchen and dining room, cupboards and built-ins have been added and also a sink installed for such convenient business as handling flowers or what not in order not to conflict with details which might be going forward in the kitchen.

Upstairs, five bedrooms have become four, with the fifth bedroom just to the right of the stairs becoming an airy den or study for the man of the house. This is left open at the front, an archway perfecting its attractiveness. Two lovely bathrooms have been installed upstairs, replacing such facilities as were available in the earlier day when the house was constructed.

Upstairs cupboard space and a linen closet have been gained by cutting into walled-in spaces, one under a stairway leading to the roomy attic or storage room. Clothes closets were gained for two bedrooms without them in space taken from the bedroom which was converted into the study. Additional windows have been cut where needed upstairs.

Of particular beauty in the upstairs furnishings is a bedroom suite of hand-carved narra wood brought by the Dexters from the islands.

Nor has the basement been omitted from the complete overhauling process. Not only have a modern furnace and water-heating system been installed, and provision made for a washroom, but concrete partitions have been made where desired and two rooms constructed and furnished for employees about the house and gardens. Foundation of the house stands as it was when laid 38 years ago—solid stone from rocks taken from this farm place.

Of course the exterior of all the buildings have been redecorated, the houses in white with shutters of green. The ram at the rear of the main residence, from a utility standpoint, may be replaced by a well—only a few days ago a water which roamed over the place to locate the best site for a well. However, well or not, the ram will be utilized to furnish a picturesque waterfall or waterfalls about the grounds.

Other plans have been made for future work—but in a general two months this approximately 70-acre farm has taken on a new life.

A unique garden, planned by Mrs. Dexter, will be a formal salad garden—just as the name implies, a garden where fruits and vegetables which go into the concoction of a good salad, will be grown. This will be designed in formal lines, with the usual formal flower garden sundial giving way to a pedestal for a wooden salad bowl. Sounds intriguing, does it not? A number of espalier trees will form one of the dominant themes in this plan.

So much for a general two months work on this approximately 70-acre farm, and the new life it has taken.

The farm itself, including walnut and prune orchards, is being worked by Mr. Dexter's brother, F. N. Dexter, who with his wife came from a good Dakota background and been on the place since shortly after Mr. Dexter purchased it.

Lowering Grade Of Sewer to Be Started Today

A crew from the city engineer's office will begin today the task of lowering the grade of a lateral sewer in the alley between Commercial and Front streets and just south of Ferry, to provide sewage service for the five-story warehouse being erected at Front and Trade streets for Dan J. Fry. The city council Monday night granted Fry's request for the change in the sewer line.

Hugh Rogers, city engineer, estimated the job would require two weeks' time. The trunk sewer to which the lateral connects at Ferry street is 20 feet deep.

FOURTH TITLE WON BY SILVERTON HIGH

Coomler Does Iron Man and is Within One Strike of No-No Game in First

SILVERTON, May 22.—John Coomler, pitching his last games for Silvertown high school, pitched his team to a double header victory here this afternoon and Silvertown won her fourth consecutive championship in the Willamette Interscholastic baseball league. Silvertown won a 12-to-0 and a 16-to-1 victory over Lebanon on the Silvertown diamond Tuesday.

Guy DeLay, who has coached through Silvertown's four years of victory, gave his boys a chance to play about in the last game of the season and various different places were tried out by the boys. However, Coomler pitched all innings of the two seven-inning games. He allowed but one hit in the first and four in the second game. His teammates got eight hits in the first and 11 hits in the second off of Berries and Mitchell of Lebanon. Coomler had a no-hit, no-run game up to the last inning of the first game with two outs and two strikes on the batter, when Brown got the only hit of the game. Seely of Silvertown was the hitting star of the day with a triple and two home runs to his credit. Nagoun of Lebanon got a three-bagger and two singles. Lebanon played erratic ball throughout the afternoon.

In the first game Silvertown had three errors and Lebanon five; second game, Lebanon had one error and Silvertown five.
