Office Building, Entryway Being Torn Down; SERA Labor is Provided

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much of the floor is rotten and the top portion of all the joists. The joists appeared in no danger of breaking down, the lower half being reasonably sound, but the floor covering is defective and subject to break-through in places. The worst conditions, and the most dangerous appeared on the balcony level and where the roof beams join the masonry wall.

Balcony Collapse Is Greatest Peril
The balcony runs clear around the large pavilion. The inner support consists of heavy wooden posts which are quite sturdy. The outside wall supports the floor joists at the outer side, and where the joists are fitted in the brick wall they are thoroughly rotten. A wrecking bar may be pushed right through the joist ends. The joists between the joists are likewise badly affected by the dry rot.

The danger in this situation is when the building is crowded with people on the lower floor and on the balcony, if the balcony collapsed on the people below serious loss of life might follow, as occurred recently in Yakima when a cornice gave way.

Similar conditions, though not so bad exist where the large wooden beams supporting the roof are fitted into the wall. The beams are not solid, but laminated, several layers of plank being bolted together. The cross beams join the are beams to which the roof deck is fastened.

Serious decay has occurred at this joint due to the fact that the wooden ends rest in concrete. No air space for ventilation was allowed, and the wooden ends were not treated with creosote, which is universally used now to prevent dry rot. The building is approaching a time where under strain of a storm or wind cross beams might let go. The affected ends will be cut away and new timbers joined, with precaution made against a repetition of the damage from dry rot.

The pavilion and office building are said to be nearly 20 years old.

STOCKHOLM, Sweden, May 24.—(F)—Two hundred thousand cheering Swedes packed Stockholm's streets this afternoon to bid farewell to Crown Princess Frederik of Denmark and Princess Ingrid of Sweden, Frederik's bride today and Denmark's future queen.

Their brilliant wedding in the 13th century church where all kings of Sweden's Bernadotte line have been crowned was attended by such an assembly of crowned heads, royalty and notables as Scandinavia seldom has seen.

NAVAL AIR ARMADA RETURNING TO BASE

To the squadron command and "especially to those directly concerned," Admiral Standley conveyed "deep sympathy for the loss of the officers and men of the 627 who gave up their lives in the line of duty."

"This is another example," said Standley, "of the willingness of the navy personnel to undergo in peace time the risks and hardships always prevalent in order that the training essential for efficient operation may proceed uninterruptedly."

AIR FORCE LIMITS MAY BE ARRANGED

BERLIN, May 24.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler's speech before the German reichstag Tuesday seemed today about ready to bear fruit in the shape of peace parleys with the reich's neighbors.

Informed quarters said two significant developments were likely:
1. A yearly conference to draft an air limitations agreement, proposed in Hitler's address.
2. Face to face talks between the German reichsfuehrer and Pierre Laval, French foreign minister.

Lending substance to the first conjecture was the call Sir Eric Phipps, British ambassador, made at the foreign office to ask clarification of several points in Hitler's speech, and the known fact that nazis were pushing hard to get an air convention.

the provisions of the constitution which forbids Congress from holding two lucrative offices."

Walker Declared Not on Library Board
Senator Walker of Polk county, who had been sent a commission as member of the state library board, is ruled ineligible as legislator because he refused to accept the appointment. The opinion reads:

"It appears that in January, 1935, the governor sent a commission to Mr. Walker appointing him as one of the state library trustees, and it further appears that Mr. Walker did not in any respect qualify for this office, but upon the contrary, wrote a letter to the governor in which he said that:

"During the recent session of the legislature I received a commission as member of the state library board which I am extremely sorry to find I will be unable to accept. I will return the commission and the blank qualifying 'oath' form which was sent with it."

"It is true that Mr. Walker was present at a meeting of the library board, but not as a member of the board or one of its trustees, but only as an observer."

Vote Not Sufficient
Even if Power Held
Because of the ineligibility of Cooter and Semon, who were two of the six persons voting for the appropriation (five being required for a majority) the appropriation was not legally adopted by the emergency board even if it had the power to act at that time.

There is no method provided by law for filling of vacancies in the emergency board, further ruled the attorney general.

After answering the specific questions raised by the secretary of state, Mr. Moody returned to the original question of the right of a legislator to hold a state or federal office and re-emphasized his opinion of May 7 with additional quotations from court decisions, quoting from Maine, Missouri, Texas, Rhode Island and Illinois where courts have ruled against dual political jobs, and that acceptance of one office immediately acts as a vacation of the original office.

CIRCUIT RIDER TO BE BURIED SUNDAY

Rev. Flavius Joseph Johnson, 83, for over 70 years affiliated with the Methodist church and for nearly half a century a circuit rider in Arkansas, died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Ida Garrison, at Woodburn Friday morning.

Funeral services will be held Sunday morning in Woodburn, at the Ringo mortuary, with Rev. G. H. Sees, assistant pastor of Wilbur Centenary church in Portland officiating. Wilbur and Johnson were ordained in the Methodist ministry at the same time. Burial will be in the Pleasant Hill cemetery in Vancouver.

Rev. Johnson was born in Illinois, and last February he and Elizabeth J. Bearden Johnson, celebrated their 65th wedding anniversary.

He was a circuit rider in Arkansas for 40 years, and in 1911 resigned to come west, settling in Vancouver, Wash., from where they came in 1924 to Woodburn. He was a life member of Marshall, Arkansas, Odd Fellow and Masonic orders.

Surviving are the widow, two daughters, Mrs. Garrison and Mrs. Etta Strabel of Portland; 15 grandchildren, 17 great grandchildren; and three great great grandchildren. Six grandsons will act as pallbearers at the funeral.
