AAA Wheat Adjustment is Upheld Nearly 6 to 1, Incomplete Count

Marion county wheat growers voted nearly 3 to 1 in favor of continuing the AAA production control program. County Agent Harry L. Riches announced last night. The official ballot count made late yesterday afternoon by the county allotment committee at Riches' office gave 162 votes yes, 59 no.

Voting has been in progress for several weeks with a single ballot box being taken to various district meetings and mailed ballots being deposited in the box by the county agent.

No instructions have as yet been received as to when the final vote on continuance of the cornhog program will be called, Riches said.

TRADE PACT WITH SWEDEN IS SIGNED

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low duty season to include the month of January for the former and the months of December and January for the latter.

Concessions granted to Sweden by the United States include a stipulation that sulphate pulp, both unbleached and bleached, and unbleached sulphite pulp, shall remain on the free list during effectiveness of the agreement.

The reductions applying to raisins and canned fruit were considered by the state department as of "outstanding importance" among western products. Raisins were placed on the free list, a reduction of 15 cents or approximately \$2.29 on the 1935 exchange basis, per 100 kilos while the reduction on canned fruits ranged from 25 to 45 cents. The former duty on all canned fruits was 75 cents per 100 kilos and under the new agreement the duties will be as follows: Peaches 50 cents or \$10.97; apricots \$10.97; pears \$10.97; mixed fruits for salad \$10.97; grapefruit 30 cents for \$6.58.

Dried apricots and peaches, prunes, pears and apples will remain on the free list under terms of the agreement.

Bridal Shower is Given Newlywed; Strawberries Ripen

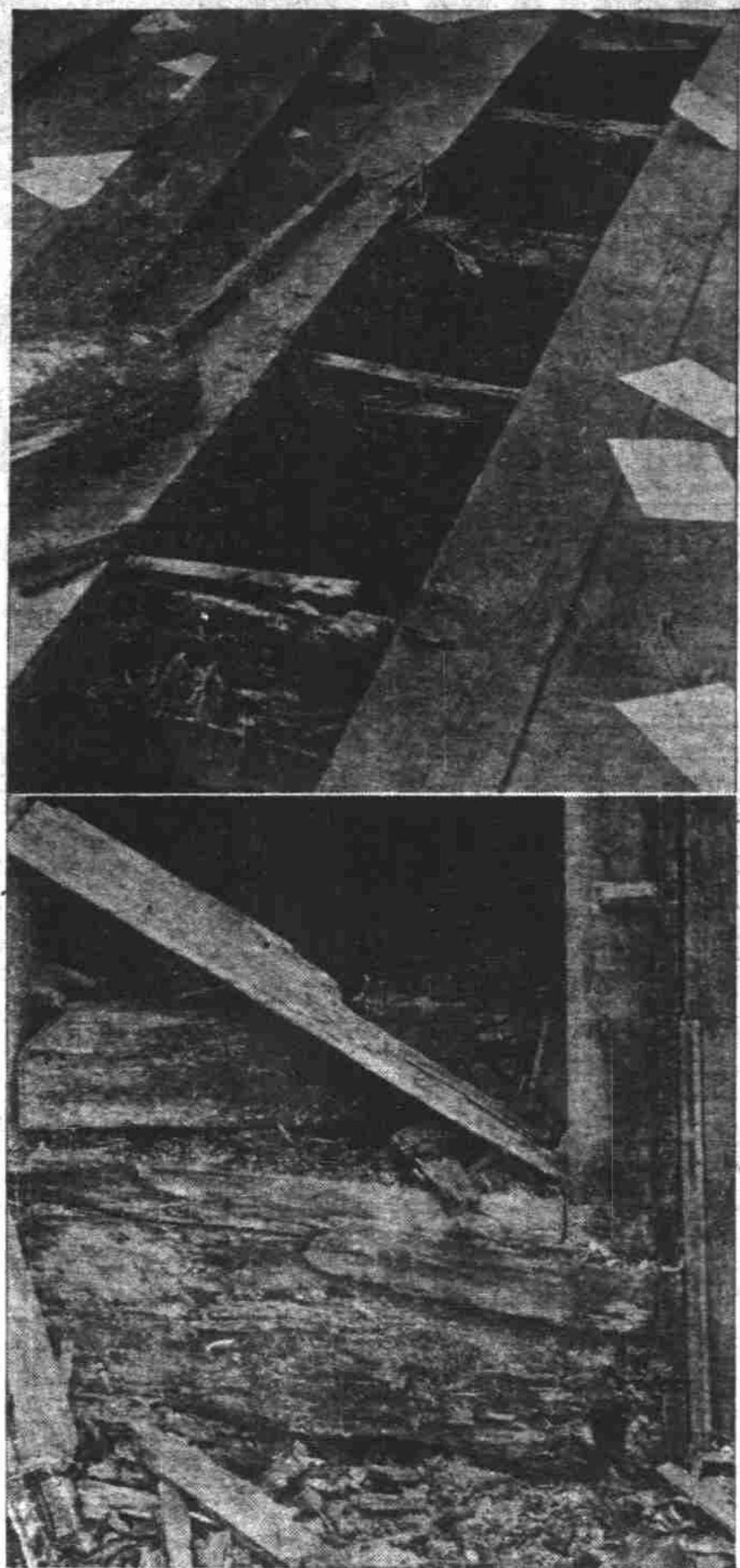

POUND CANDIDATE FOR BOARD AGAIN

Dr. Ben F. Pound, who is concluding his first term as member of the schoolboard, announced last night that he would be a candidate for re-election. Petitions for his candidacy have been prepared and will be circulated starting Monday.

"I have endeavored to meet each problem as it arose, and on its merits," said Dr. Pound. "I have given a great deal of time to the work of the board, and have sought to conserve the funds of the district. The financial affairs of the district are in good order, with the bonded debt nearly wiped out, and the district credit so good that its one-year notes sold on a one and one-half per cent basis recently."

"One project in which I have taken a deep interest is the playground work and work in cooperation with government relief agencies. As a result of this cooperation we not only provided employment to many worthy people, but we obtained for the district and the community tennis courts, swimming pools, a playground program; and some much needed additions to grade schools. The cost to the district was very small; and one needs only to see the way these playfields are used to realize how important they are now in the community life, and how greatly they were needed."

GERMANY DEMANDS RIGHT TO COLONIZE

LONDON, May 25.—(P)—A Nazi demand for recognition of Germany's right to hold colonies was revealed here today as Britain and Germany launched diplomatic exchanges calculated to give substance to peace suggestions.

Hitler made in his Reichstag speech Tuesday.

Official quarters said the call Sir Eric Phillips, British Ambassador to Berlin, made at the foreign office yesterday was the start of conversations designed to secure more specific information concerning points raised in Hitler's speech.

Baron Konstantine von Neurath, the German foreign minister, told Phillips that while Germany could not discuss colonies or mandates just now, she insists that the former allies recognize in some tangible way her right to have them before the Reich returns to the league of nations.

Germany also notified Britain that she could not discuss armaments pacts until she had attained full military equality with Russia.

Woman Believes Her Son Is Also Intended Victim

PASADENA, Calif., May 25.—(P)—Mrs. H. A. Allen, friend of the Weyerhaeuser family, said here today she believed her 8-year-old son Harold was also an intended victim when kidnapers seized George Weyerhaeuser, member of a rich Tacoma lumber family.

Mrs. Allen was here visiting and later in the day left for San Diego.

"Harold and George sat next to each other in school and always walked home together," said Mrs. Allen. "On Thursday, however, when George was kidnapped they happened to separate just three blocks from where the kidnapping took place."

Mrs. Allen said her son had been taken out of school and placed under guard.

Plan Stipulation Over Water Case

Preparation of a stipulation between the attorneys for the City of Salem and for the Oregon-Washington Water Service company is under way and will be completed within the next few days, it was learned here yesterday. This stipulation will cover all legal details not heretofore settled in connection with the acquisition of the water system by the city. When the stipulation is agreed upon, it will be entered in the condemnation proceedings now pending in federal court in Portland and will become a part of that record.

Mrs. Wormdahl Dies, Silverton

SILVERTON, May 25.—Mrs. Anna Wormdahl, 67, died at her home here today. Funeral services will be held from the Larson and Son chapel early in the week.

Mrs. Wormdahl was born in Minnesota and came to Silverton 18 years ago. Survivors are her widower, John Wormdahl; eight step-children; three sisters, and two brothers.

HOOVER STOPS IN PORTLAND ON TRIP

PORTLAND, Ore., May 25.—(P)—Making a leisurely trip to the Midwest, former President Hoover stopped in Portland tonight after a day of renewing contacts with old friends and old fishing haunts in Oregon.

Tomorrow Mr. Hoover and his secretary, Paul Saxon, will drive to Idaho where Mr. Hoover will put in three days with a friend on trout streams there.

Then he goes to Denver, where Friday night the University of Colorado will confer a degree on him. June 3 he will make the commencement address and receive a degree from Drake university at Des Moines.

While here Mr. Hoover smilingly declined to express opinions on current political questions and issues.

"I just can't pop out with off-hand answers," he explained. "When I have anything to say on national problems I give days of thought to what I have in mind, put it on paper in a prepared statement, and release it."

OREGON FAVORABLE TO WHEAT CONTROL

CORVALLIS, Ore., May 25.—(P)—Oregon wheat growers voted more than 6 to 1 in favor of continuing the wheat adjustment program of the agricultural adjustment administration, tabulation of the balloting which closed at 8 o'clock tonight showed.

Charles W. Smith, emergency agricultural supervisor, announced the vote was 4761 for and 782 against continuation, in the 27 counties having wheat production control associations and which were eligible to vote.

The question was: "Are you in favor of a wheat production adjustment program to follow the present one which expires with the 1935 crop year?" Present contract signers voted 4674 yes and 773 No. Non-signers voted 57 yes and 9 no.

Umatilla county, one of the largest wheat counties in the United States, favored continuation of the program about 25 to 1.

Other large eastern Oregon wheat producing areas also voted heavily for it. The margin in western Oregon counties was not so large, but carried in all.

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MUSSOLINI TAKES DEFIANT ATTITUDE

ROME, May 25.—(P)—Benito Mussolini told the cheering chamber of deputies today that Italy in East Africa is "ready to assume all, even the supreme responsibility."

Counseling his people not to cherish too many illusions about conciliation of the Italo-Ethiopian controversy, he declared only enemies of fascist Italy "can pretend to be stupefied or simulate protests for military measures which we have taken or for those which we shall take."

The border clash at Ualual last year he called "the signal bell . . . which imposes on fascist Italy the fulfillment of inescapable duties."

The premier, mapping the course of European events during recent months, said only one problem—Austria—stands between Italy and Germany.

Germany's repudiation of the armaments clauses of the Versailles treaty, even though it "suddenly cut in two" the "normal development of the European situation," he dismissed with this phrase:

"To make recriminations is useless, even as it is useless to speak again of disarmament."

EXTENDED SESSION DEEMED PROBABLE

WASHINGTON, May 25.—(P)—With proposals for federal regulation of industry and agriculture to the fore, congressional pilots today scanned the legislative horizon and decided skillful handling would be necessary if the session's end is to be reached by early July.

Although the bonus shot behind—some say definitely for the session; others insisted only temporarily—the leaders agreed more speed would be needed in view of the vast controversial program remaining for disposition.

Hints were dropped that some of the legislation may be deferred until next year if it appears the session may run far into the summer. In this connection, sections of the omnibus banking bill, centralizing credit control in the federal reserve board, were mentioned.

Administration forces, however, insisted NRA extension, public utility holding company regulation, and the social security bills must be passed, together with the few remaining regular appropriation measures.

New Conference Of Evangelical Church Formed

YAKIMA, May 25.—(Special)—Meeting Thursday afternoon, after each separate conference had transacted its necessary individual business, the former Evangelical church conferences known as the Oregon and Washington conferences were officially merged under the name of the Pacific Northwest conference. The following men were elected as pastor-district superintendents for the conference: C. P. Gates and G. L. Lovell of Portland, E. C. Kreitlow of Seattle, J. H. Soltman of Yakima, and F. H. Brockmuller of Spokane.

There were five districts named on which these men will be stationed before conference adjourns. These districts are as follows: Salem, West Portland, East Portland, Puget Sound and Spokane.

L. H. Willard of Portland was elected as secretary of the merged group.

CONTROL OF WHEAT SHIPMENT DROPPED

LONDON, May 25.—(P)—Efforts to control world wheat shipments were checked temporarily into the discard today and Argentine delegates to the world wheat conference, opened in London, said their country's refusal to restrict exports had been completely vindicated.

Alone among the 21 nations signatory to the 1933 world wheat pact, Argentina battled almost from the first against efforts of the Australian-American-Canadian bloc to enforce quota restrictions provided in the pact.

An official communique released as the shortest wheat conference on record closed today confirmed advance reports that all operative clauses of the pact would be suspended during the one year's extension of the pact, to August 1, 1936.

The statement, however, forecast an increased glut of world stocks and urged revival of restriction measures.

BARRYMORE IS SUE

LOS ANGELES, Calif., May 25.—(P)—While her handsome husband, John Barrymore, of the stage and screen, and New York friends cruised the Atlantic toward Havana in his yacht, Dolores

Costello Barrymore sued him for divorce today. She charged him with physical violence against her, excessive drinking and failure to provide for her and their two children.

Kidnaped Youth's Family Greatest Owner of Timber

TACOMA, Wash., May 25.—(P)—The Weyerhaeuser Timber company has the greatest number of timber holdings and is the largest individual lumber operator in this country and possibly in the whole world, lumbermen here pointed out today.

The company originally amassed great holdings in the northern states of the middle west, in Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota. With their major operations moving westward, they subsequently acquired great holdings in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and other western states.

Possibly 12,000 to 15,000 Weyerhaeuser employees are affected at the present time by the northwest lumber strike.

BOND ISSUE APPROVED

MEDFORD, Ore., May 25.—(P)—A \$250,000 refunding bond issue was carried by a vote of 224 to 24 at an election here yesterday. Continuation of SERA relief in the city was approved by a vote of 197 to 55.

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
