

10 MILLION ALIENS PROBLEM FOR U.S.

Half Here Illegally, Many Holding Jobs Citizens Need Says Speaker

The United States is harboring 10,000,000 aliens who have no right here. One-third of them are on relief. One-third are holding jobs which should be in the hands of good American citizens. The department of justice of the federal government, which admits that nearly one-half of these aliens are in the United States illegally, should take the lead in sending them back to the countries from which they came, W. J. Chamberlain, state commander of the American Legion, told the Salem chamber of commerce Monday noon.

"Suppose you were to go to France or Germany or any other European country and attempt to get work. Not only would you fail to find employment, but you would be placed immediately under arrest, taken to the American consul and immediately sent home," Chamberlain pointed out. Explaining that the Legion was attempting to cure the abuses in the admission and continuance of aliens in this country, Chamberlain said that the average American citizen, because he did not have time to take any part in remedying the alien situation was "forcing some of the best blood in America to turn away from the established form of government."

Commander Chamberlain, whose address was keyed to the observance of Memorial day here Thursday, said it was incumbent upon the Legion to take up the work formerly done by the Grand Army of the Republic.

Stresses Americanism
"The Legion has not advertised its activities but in a quiet way it seeks to carry out the principles set forth in the preamble to its constitution," Commander Chamberlain said. These were listed by the speaker as opposition to all laws which would weaken the federal constitution, education of children along patriotic lines, conduct of schools for aliens who can thus

become American citizens, combatting of communism and all other "isms," adequate national defense and passage of a universal service plan in time of war. "Americanism was designated as the premier work in the American Legion for 1935," the speaker explained. "Included in this objective are awards for schools, Boy Scout cooperation, junior baseball activities, 4-H club work, promotion of Citizen Military Training camps, public health work and combatting of subversive elements in the nation."

Commander Chamberlain was introduced by Dr. V. E. Hockett, commander of Capital Post No. 9.

OLD BANK SUED BY LOAN ASSOCIATION

Checks Paid on Lease Held Unauthorized; Guardian Building Involved

The State Savings and Loan association, which has been liquidating its assets for the last two years, filed suit here Monday against the First National bank of Salem, asking for the payment of \$30,330 with interest. The bank has been in liquidation since the holiday of 1933.

The savings and loan association claims that \$30,330 was checked from its account with the bank to pay the bank on a lease of the B. L. Steeves building here, the checks being made at the direction of officers of the mortgage investment company. The plaintiff asserts that its officers never authorized the execution of the checks, that the bank knew the payments were not proper and that the sums thus received by the defendant should be returned.

The lawsuit is an outgrowth of a lease which the First National bank in Salem acquired when it was merged with the Salem Bank of Commerce which stockholders of the former institution acquired. Plaintiff asserts that the mortgage investment company agreed to purchase this lease for \$62,000 and simultaneously made a deal through the First National bank in Salem for control of the reserve fund stock of the State Savings and Loan association.

Mortgage Company Took Over Lease
The purchaser of the savings and loan stock, the Mortgage Investment company, agreed to buy the lease with the expectation of making it one of the assets of the savings and loan concern. The lease, capitalized at \$62,000, was greatly in excess of the legal limit of 10 per cent of the assets of a savings and loan association, plaintiff asserts and could not have been legally owned by the savings concern.

The plaintiff asserts that at no time did B. L. Steeves, lessor, agree to the transfer of the lease from the First National bank in Salem to the State Savings and Loan association or to the Mortgage Investment company. Bond which the latter would have been forced to put up to secure the payment of rentals, before the lease was transferred, was never advanced, the plaintiff sets out in its complaint.

Provided in Lease
The lease involved in the suit calls for the payment of \$550 a month to B. L. Steeves and his successors in interest, for a 25-year period beginning in 1926. This payment was to be exclusive of taxes, upkeep, building operation and alterations. The lease, the First National Bank in Salem, found the lease unprofitable and planned the deal with the Mortgage Investment company with the view of disposing of the lease obligation.

The structure covered by the lease is now known as the Guardian building. The plaintiff in the suit declares it never received the lease or any benefit from it. Officers of the State Savings and Loan association contend the moneys paid on the lease, from the association, should be returned by the bank to the loan concern and thus made available for larger liquidating dividends.

LOCKER SYSTEM IS PLAN AT SILVERTON

SILVERTON, May 27.—Plans for a refrigerator locker system for the farmers here, similar to the one in operation at Mt. Angel, were discussed enthusiastically at a meeting of a chamber of commerce meeting here tonight. Oscar Lee was chairman. A committee to investigate possibilities and

report back to a later meeting, was appointed, consisting of Mr. Lee, George Hubbs and Earl Adams representing the businessmen and Elmer Lorence and Oscar Johnson of the farmers. Utilization of the Garver and Graham ice plant was suggested. William Graham of that firm was present at the meeting. Either a private or cooperative enterprise was considered feasible, with considerable demand for the lockers apparent.

WALNUT GROWERS COMING SATURDAY

Fully 200 walnut growers of the Salem area are expected to attend a meeting of the Associated Walnut Growers of Oregon at the chamber of commerce here Saturday afternoon, starting at 2 o'clock. Frank Rowell, Scholls, president of the recently organized Associated Growers, will speak.

This group was formed recently in an effort to divorce the Oregon growers from California in the code administration, and at the meeting here Saturday the why of this move will be explained, as well as effort made to establish a local organization to that end.

The Oregon group seeking release from California in the code administration claim that Oregon has no surplus and so should not be made to dump 30 per cent of its crop, as necessary under the present set-up.

Meetings similar to the one slated here are being held in Forest Grove, Newberg, McMinnville, Roseburg and Eugene.

Local growers sponsoring the Salem meeting are Herbert Noble of Skyline orchards, the largest nut grower in the state, Paul Wallace, M. P. Adams of the co-operative nut plant here, A. Wolf, and Louis Lachmund.

Moore Estate Valued \$79,629 Appraisal Says

The late A. N. Moore's left an estate valued at \$79,629 according to an appraisal filed Monday in probate court here. Most of the estate is in real property, that item constituting \$69,100 of the appraisal. One property in Portland appraised at \$45,000 and one at \$22,500 make up the bulk of the realty holdings in the estate. Cora L. Moore and Ralph D. Moore are executrix and executor of the estate, respectively.

CHAIN LETTER FOR CAPITOL APPROVED

Men and women who have turned a deaf ear to the "get rich quick" chain letters recently flooding the country have expressed considerable interest in the "chain letter with a heart" plan proposed by Fred W. Jobelman for raising funds for the state capitol. Jobelman is asking each person receiving one of his state capitol chain letters to forward one dollar to the voluntary building fund being raised at the statehouse.

Jobelman has sent out several hundred letters throughout the state in the last week. A number of Salem townspeople have endorsed the idea.

"This is a commendable undertaking; you can count on me to further it in every possible way," said David O'Hara, councilman, yesterday.

"I think the idea is good and shall do what I can to help it along," was the endorsement received from A. Warren Jones, city recorder.

D. L. Greiner, Salem Navigation company, said: "This is an excellent proposal. It gives every individual in Oregon an opportunity to enjoy a direct, personal interest in a commendable undertaking."

Jobelman said yesterday that a number of letters were already being received at the statehouse with the one dollar enclosure set aside for the state capitol fund. Endorsers for the "chain letter with a heart" included Irl S. McSherry, U. G. Boyer, Elmer A. Dae, O. A. Haryman, W. L. Stanley and A. C. Burk.

Relief Outlays To Be Lowered Goudy Declares

Relief expenditures by the state of Oregon are going to be held at a lower level this summer than have prevailed in the spring and winter months, Elmer Goudy, state relief administrator, said while here yesterday for a brief visit with Governor Charles H. Martin. Reduction in relief costs, Goudy indicated, would be possible due to the increasing amount of seasonal employment at this season of the year.

Goudy said, in answer to questions about the recent report of a special investigating committee on relief, that any changes or improvements suggested by that committee would be thoroughly considered by the state group. When and as changes are made they will come as policies of the relief committee, not as the administrator's own decisions, Goudy pointed out.
