Jerome F. Jones, former city councilman of Salem and senior of weights and measures for the state here for 20 years, passed away at the Salem General hospital Sunday. His home was at 400 South 19th street.

Funeral services will be held today at 2 p. m. from the Rigdon chapel, where Rev. W. C. Kanter will deliver the funeral sermon, and burial will be in the City View cemetery with Masonic services in charge of E. L. Welder. R. D. Barton will sing. The Knights Templar will be represented.

Pallbearers will be B. B. Herkle, F. G. Jewett, William Nelmyer, M. B. Hayden, Hugh B. Fisher and Warren F. Powers. Mr. Jones had been a resident of Salem since 1901. He was born March 9, 1859, at Greenville, Tennessee. He was a 32nd degree Mason, a Knight Templar, a member of Al Kader Shrine of Portland, and a granger. In 1910 he was elected to the city council and served two terms.

Berry Pickers' Wage Is Above That for 1934

Although the heavy mid-season rush for strawberry pickers has not yet begun, offered wages are running at least a quarter cent above those paid last year, Manager D. D. Dotson of the national re-employment agency here, reported yesterday. The lowest wage being offered this season is a cent a pound box with a quarter cent bonus.

"We're having more inquiries from pickers than from growers right now but I expect in a short time we'll have a good many calls for workers," Dotson said.

The agency yesterday sent 15 pickers to the field.
