Veal Recipes to Receive Prize Awards Saturday

Here are the last of the celery recipes:

Combination Salad
2 small sweet pickles
2 hearts of celery
1 large white lettuce heart
cup grated carrot
1 cup milk
1 pint pepper, cut fine
2 cups shrimp
Dash of cayenne
1 teaspoon salt

Dice the sweet pickles fine. Shred the lettuce and cut the celery hearts in fine pieces. Grate the carrots coarsely. Shred and dice the pineapple. Flake the shrimp. Mix all together and add a rich salad dressing. Chill and serve. Eight portions.

Fried Celery Sticks
2 dozen stalks celery
2 tablespoons flour
1 egg, beaten
1 teaspoon lemon juice
1/2 teaspoon salt
Dash of cayenne

Cut celery in pieces three or four inches in length. Blanch them in cold water to which a little lemon juice or vinegar has been added. Parboil them 10 minutes. Drain, chill and dip in the thick cold white sauce and when they are well covered with the sauce, dip them in fine bread crumbs and fry them in deep fat

Put celery in a saucepan with boiling water and boil 10 minutes or until tender. Melt butter, add onion, salt and pepper and cook slowly 5 minutes. Stir in tomatoes, add celery and cook the entire mixture 10 or 15 minutes longer.

Porch Box Falls On Child; Kills

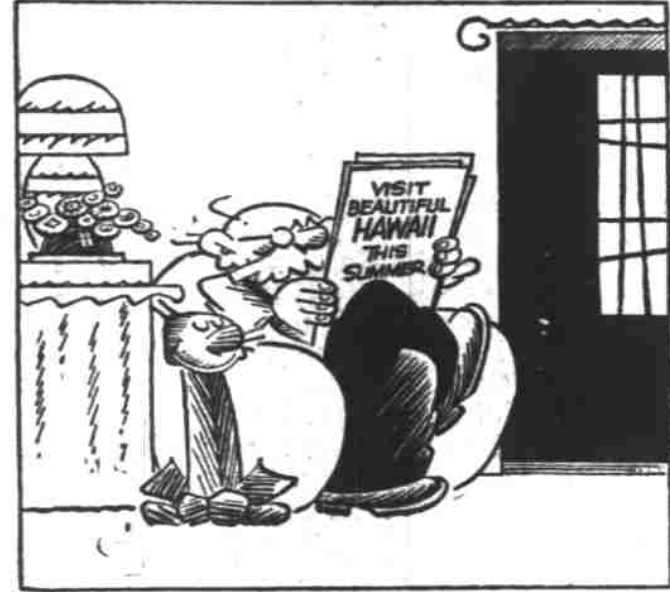

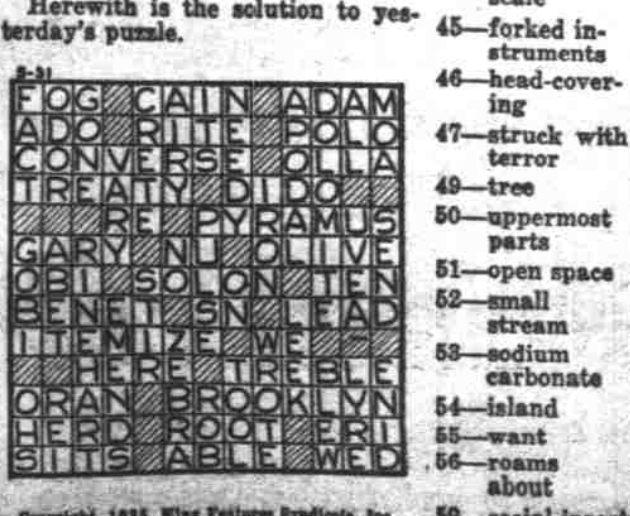


Cross-Word Puzzle

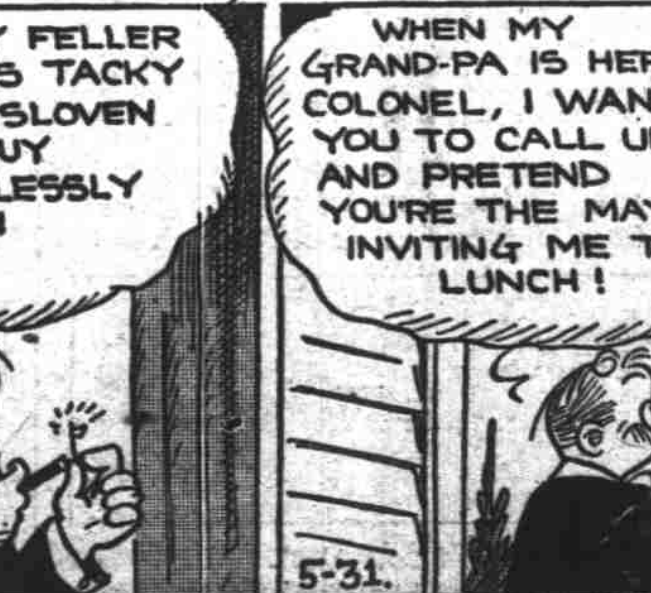
