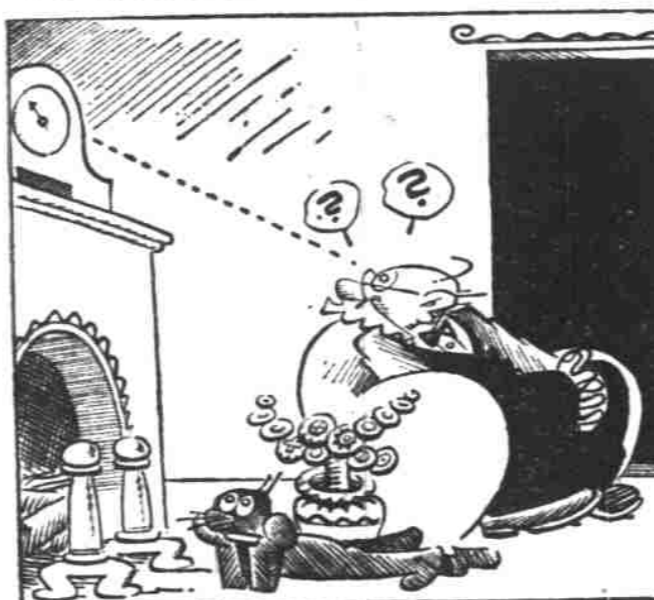

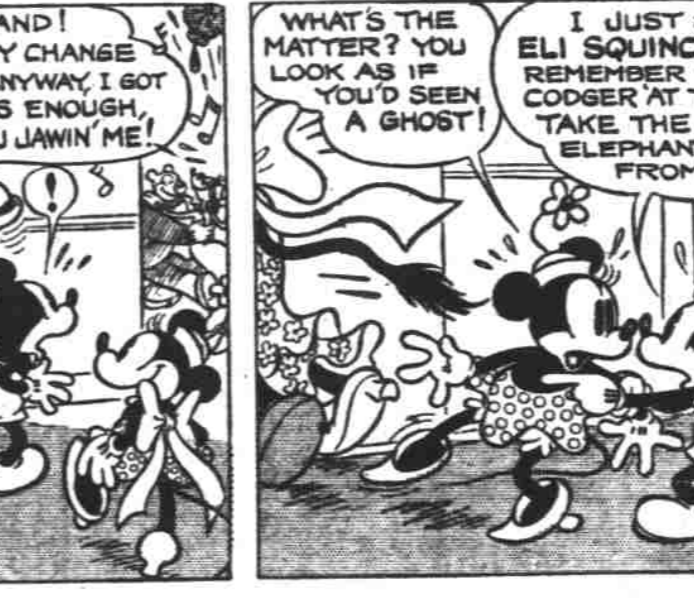
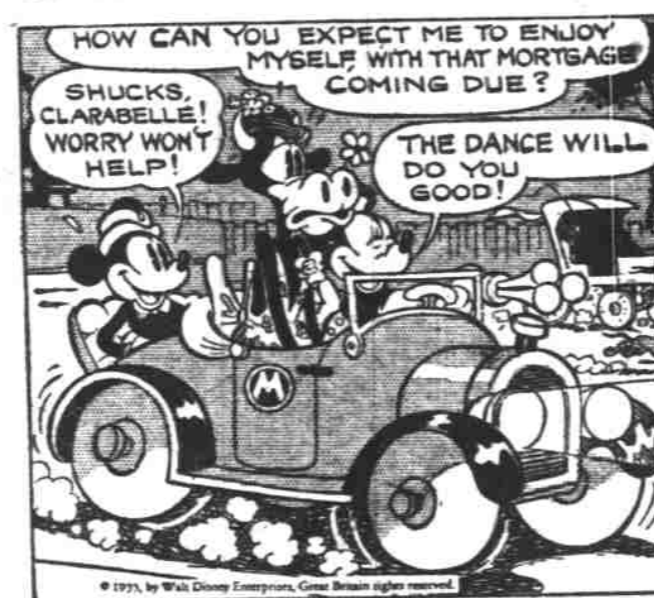
SLATE MUSIC RECITAL

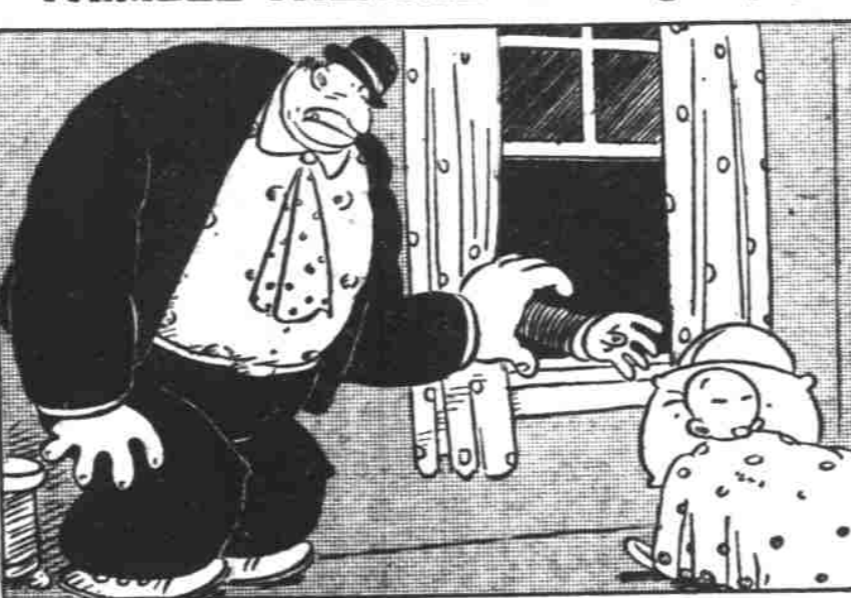

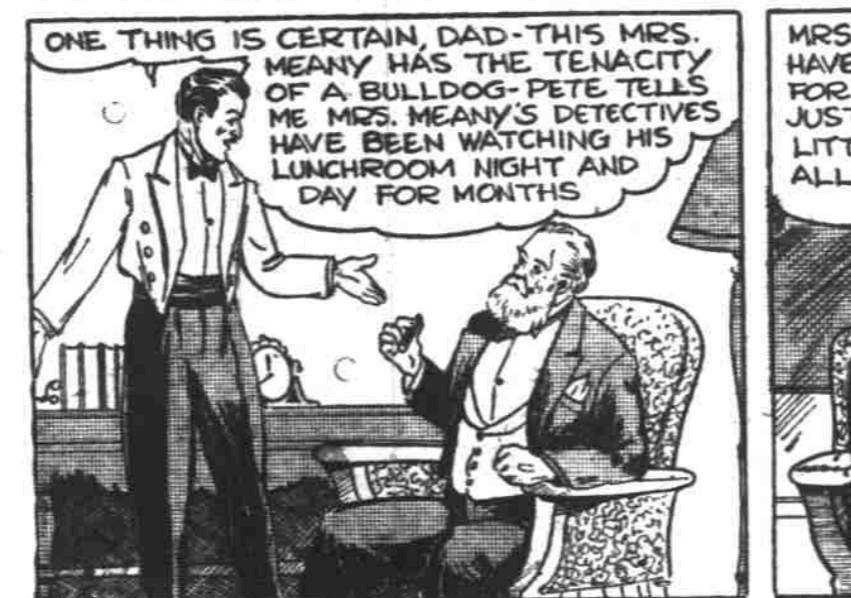

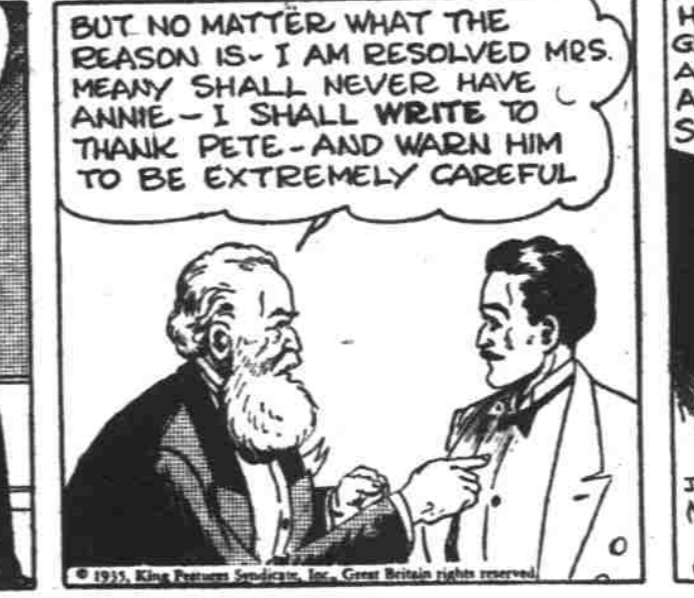
