BUTTER HALF CENT UP ON TOP GRADES

PORTLAND, June 3.—(AP)—Another swing in butter prices on the Produce Exchange occurred today, the price being boosted 1/2c for extras and prime firsts with others unchanged.

There was no change in the egg price openly for the week's start. Receipts were decreasing quite rapidly and show a total of 171,313 cases for the year to date compared with 198,938 cases a year ago.

Seasonable weakness was reflected in the general domestic cheese market situation. Prices locally were practically unchanged for the period but there was gathering weakness and price loss at leading Wisconsin centers.

Carryover of country killed calves was shown by leading receivers for the week with best offerings 10-11c with light and thin offerings 7-9c. Hogs are firm at 15 1/2-16c. Lambs and yearlings steady.

There was a firm tone in the market for asparagus. Sales were being made to retailers around 6c for the best.

Strong tone was showing for apples with extra fancy winesaps \$2.40 and fancy \$2.35 while Newtowns extra fancy were around \$2.01. Only a limited stock of good apples.

Erratic prices were shown for strawberries for the week's opening with quality extremely good and supplies liberal but demand at the start was fairly liberal.

While there was pressure against the price owing to the liberal stock of low priced California field grown local hot-house tomatoes were holding fairly steady.

SILVERTON, June 3.—While the official resignation has not as yet been announced by the Silverton school board, it is quite generally understood that Calvin Storey, who has made such a success of musical events in the Silverton schools for the past year, has submitted his resignation to accept a like position in the schools near Chehalis, Wash., his home town. Much regret is being expressed at Silverton over the loss of Mr. Storey. It is understood that the matter of Mr. Storey's resignation will be taken up at the Wednesday night meeting of the school board.

Fire at Woodburn is Said Incendiary; Ask Investigation

WOODBURN, June 2.—A fire which is believed to have been of incendiary origin, almost destroyed a gas pump at the N. Becker & Son garage early Sunday morning about 2 o'clock. The prompt arrival of firemen with chemicals lessened the amount of damage which might have been done.

Street Ceases to Mourn

GAIN SHARPEST IN MONTH; SALES FEW

NEW YORK, June 3.—(P)—Closing its lamentations for the NRA, the stock market rallied to register the sharpest average gain in nearly a month.

Buyers were hesitant, however, and the rebound represented cessation of selling rather than renewal of large-scale buying. While advances of fractions to 3 points appeared throughout the list, the day's turnover was only 599,030 shares, the smallest for a five-hour session since April 4.

It was the first time the market as a whole had closed higher however, since a week ago, and on that day, the supreme court's NRA decision came in the last few minutes of trading, and the market lacked time to digest it before closing.

Among shares advancing around 2 to 3 points were air reduction at 132, Allied Chemical at 145 1/2, Case at 63, Celanese at 23, International Harvester at 39 1/2, Monsanto at 74 and United Corp., preferred at 34. Shares rising a point or so included Chrysler, Corn Products, North American, Public Service of N. J., Standard Oil of N. J., Bethlehem Steel, Westinghouse Electric, and others. The Associated Press average of 60 shares advanced 7/8 to 41.3.

Domestic Wools Continue Strong

BOSTON, June 3.—(P)—U. S. Dept. Agr.—Quotations on domestic wools were mostly about steady at or near the peak of the recent advances. Sales continued to be made on new wools subject to approval upon arrival. Prices on late transactions were mostly around 30-31 cents in the grease for strictly combing Ohio fleeces of fine to 48s, 50s, 1/4 blood grades, 50 to 75 cents scored fleeces for 12 months Texas wools, and mostly in the range 65-70 cents scored basis for 64s and finer territory wools of short to good French combing staple.
