Must Pay Fee—Under a new law effective July 1, all claimants for gasoline tax refunds must obtain a permit from the secretary of state at an annual cost of 50 cents. It was announced yesterday when application blanks were sent to 7500 active claimants. Refunds annually average \$750,000.

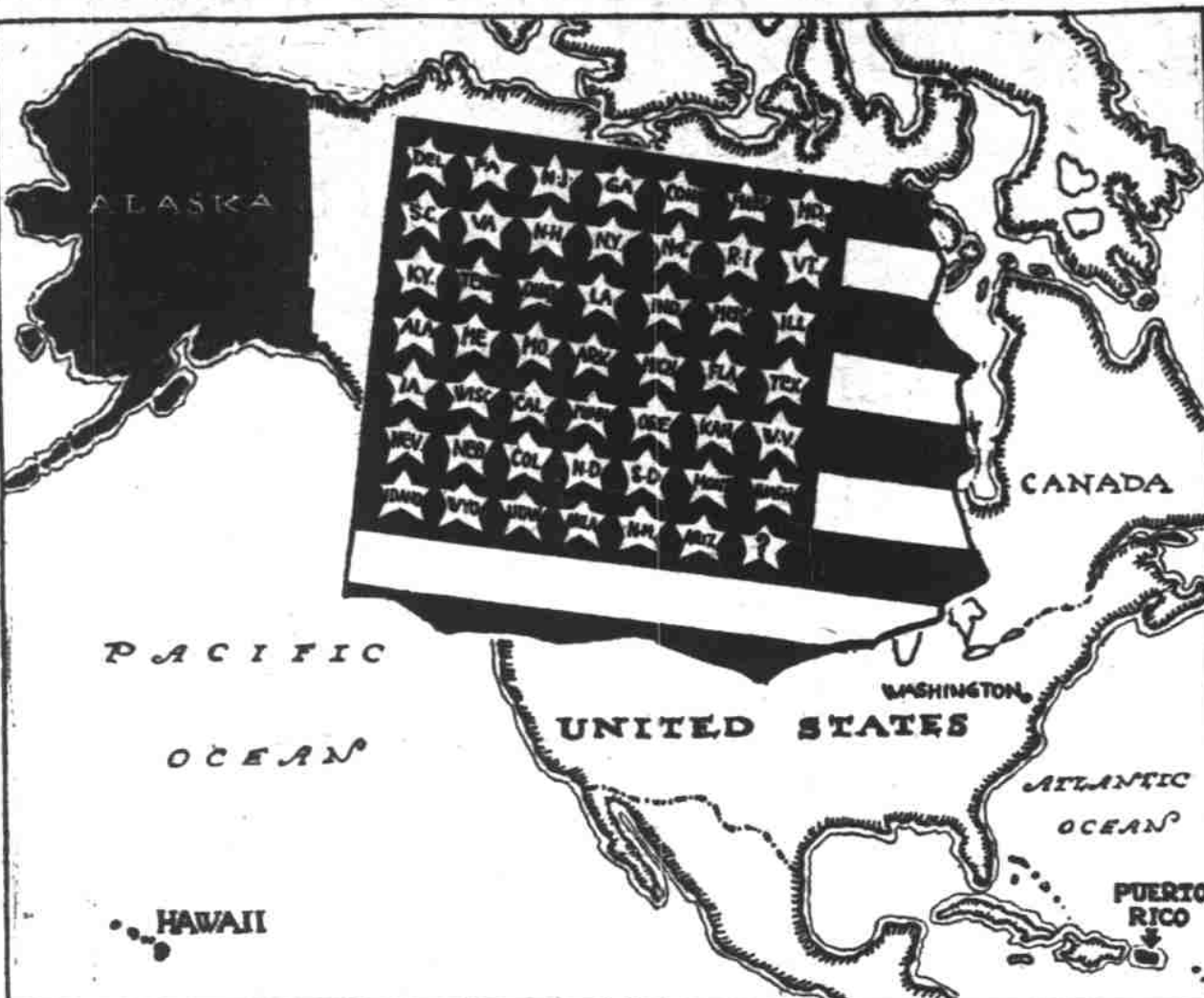
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Three Bids Being Made to Be 49th State

INDIGENT FUND OF COUNTY RUNS LOW

Steadily increasing demands on Marion county's funds for the relief of indigent and unemployed persons will probably exhaust the \$60,000 poor relief fund of the county by the end of July, county officials said yesterday. While that fund is the largest the county's budget ever contained, so great has been the demand for aid county officials have found available monies inadequate to meet the needs.

When the poor funds are exhausted the county will apply for its share of the special funds for unemployed relief budgeted by the last legislature. These funds aggregate \$500,000 annually for the next two years. Marion county's share share annually would be \$40,000.

County officials, however, have decided not to divide the money in advance among the 36 counties but to ask counties to make application for the funds as they are needed. The state relief committee is the body which passes upon the requisitions for the state monies.

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30,000 SCOUTS TO MEET, WASHINGTON

Roosevelt to Address Boys at National Jamboree Next August

When good scouts get together, what a jamboree there'll be! The greatest date in the annals of American boyhood is August 21, 1935. On that day starts the greatest national jamboree of the Boy Scouts of America in Washington, D. C., celebrating the 25th birthday celebration of the famous organization. It will be a veritable national convention of American youth in the nation's capital, the official host being Franklin D. Roosevelt, honorary president of the Boy Scouts of America.

The western railroads of America are preparing to do their full share in the big job of transporting 30,000 Boy Scouts. From every Pacific coast state large contingents of Scouts, selected for outstanding character qualifications and tested experience in outdoor life, will converge on the capital for the roundup which extends from August 21 to August 30, inclusive.

Island Scouts Coming
Boy Scouts from Hawaii and the Philippines also will benefit from the speedy, dependable service and low round-trip excursion rates offered by the western railroads in conjunction with eastern lines.

The new Washington, a wonder city of great historic traditions and of monumental modern progress, will resound to the tread of legions of Americans in the making, during the thrilling days of the jamboree. The Boy Scouts will overlook their nation's capital from the lofty windows of the Washington monument, "tallest piece of masonry ever built by man to the memory of man." They will visit the capitol, where the senate and the house of repre-

sentatives make the laws. They will enter the White House, the home of every president since before the war of 1812, a residence and a shrine doubly interesting to Scouts, because every president who has lived there since the founding of the organization has also served as an honorary president of the Boy Scouts of America.

Many Taken Off SERA Payrolls By Private Jobs

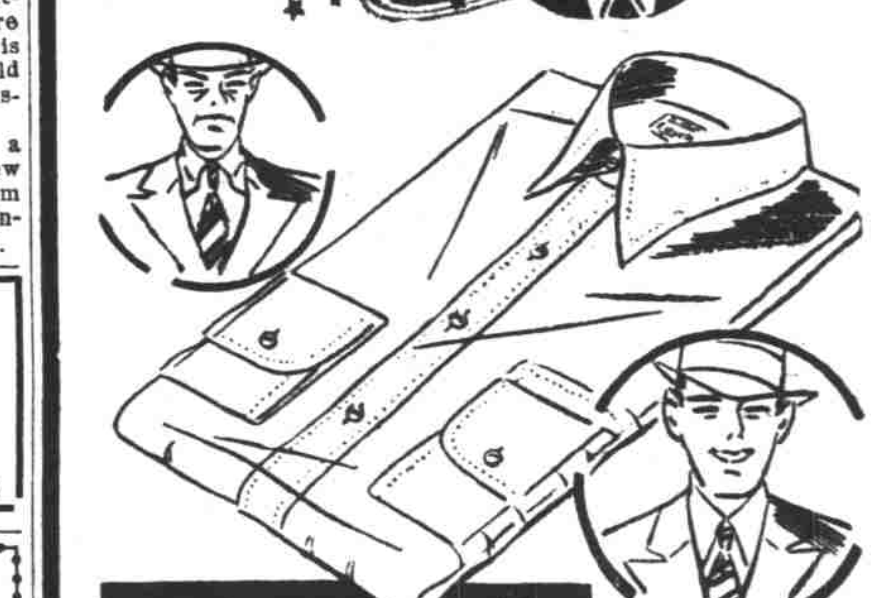
Private employment steadily, if slowly, is drawing men away from Marion county's relief rolls, said R. F. Patton, acting SERA placement officer, yesterday. "Every day we are finding a few who have secured jobs," he stated. "There aren't any great numbers but some daily. Most of them are skilled laborers."

Carpenters, for which there is a demand on the county shops and fairgrounds repair SERA crews, are especially scarce on the relief rolls now.

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
