The last of the tomato series follows:

Pickled Tomatoes

Choose small red or yellow tomatoes. Prick them with a pin and put in glass or stone jars. Add 1/2 cup of salt and 1/2 cup of vinegar. Cover with cold cider vinegar. They will be ready to use in two weeks and if kept closely covered will keep all winter.

Yellow Tomato Marmalade

Scald and skin half a basket of yellow tomatoes, large or small. Put in kettle and cook 30 minutes. Add equal quantity of grated pineapple and to each pound of fruit allow 1 pound of sugar. Cook slowly 1 hour and put in tumblers or jars.

Tomato-Macaroni Goulash

1 cup macaroni
3 slices bacon, sliced
1/2 lb. round steak, diced
2 onions, sliced
1 pint water
1 pint tomato
1 teaspoon salt
1 tablespoon brown sugar
1/4 teaspoon chili powder
Cover macaroni with boiling salted water and cook until tender. Drain. Fry out bacon, add beef and brown well. Add all other ingredients and pour over macaroni. Bake one hour in a medium oven. Serves six. An excellent luncheon dish with salad and hot rolls.

1 large can tomatoes
1 can peas
1 small can pimientos (may omit)
Salt and pepper
1 cup ripe olives (may omit)
1 pkg. macaroni or spaghetti, cooked
Fry pork with onion, add ground steak and cook, stirring frequently. Add tomatoes and pimientos, salt and pepper. Mix with cooked spaghetti and put in baking dish with peas and olives, added in layers. Bake one hour. Serves 12. May be made in smaller portions.

1 cup grated cheese
1 small onion, chopped
2 tablespoons green pepper, chopped
4 tablespoons butter
4 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
Cook onion, green pepper, salt and tomatoes together for 10 minutes. Strain and thicken the tomato sauce with butter and flour blended together. Remove from the fire and stir in the cheese which has been grated. Serve at once on thin slices of toast or croutons. Serves six.
