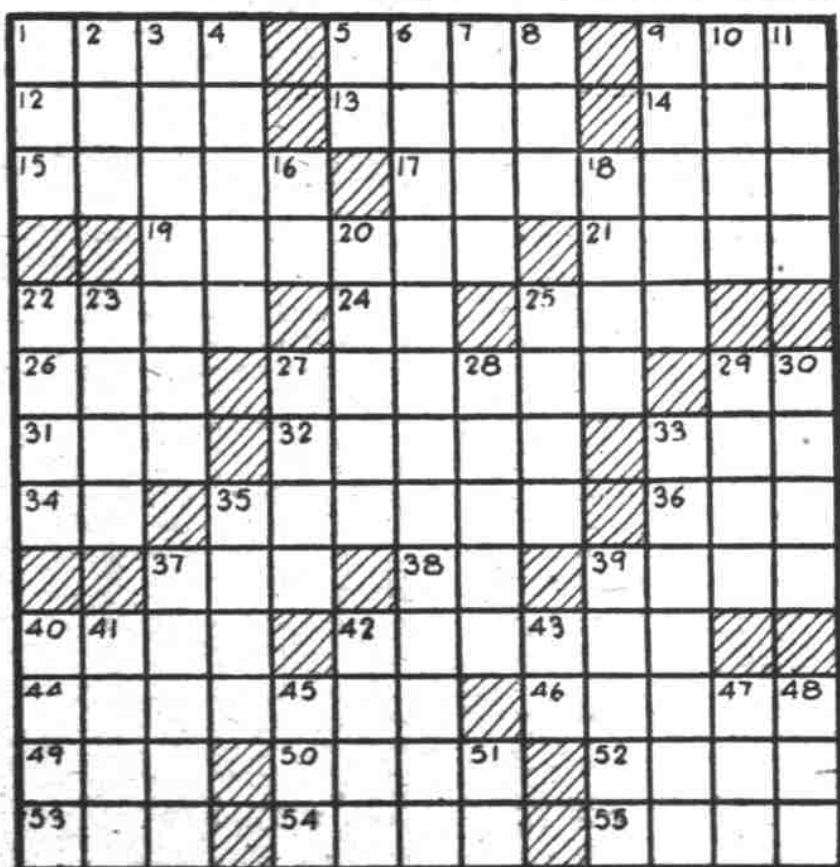

League officers include: President, M. Neifacht; secretary, Michelbrock; executive committee consisting of six representatives from each of the five zones.



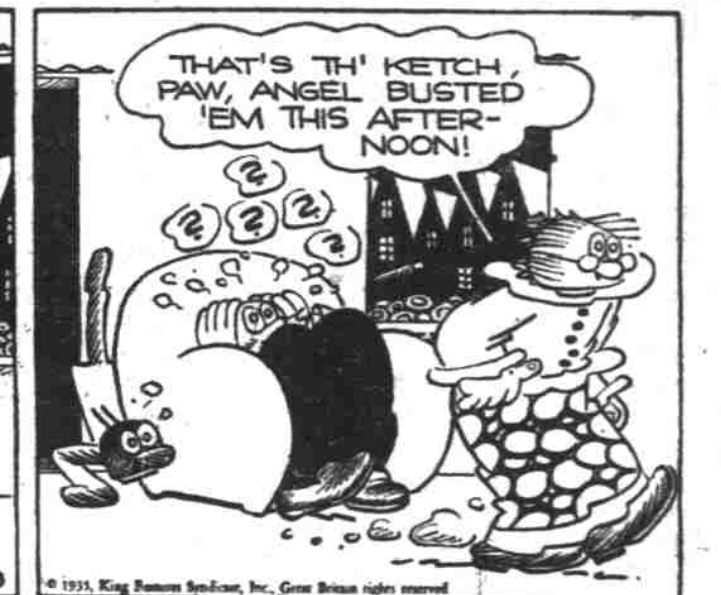

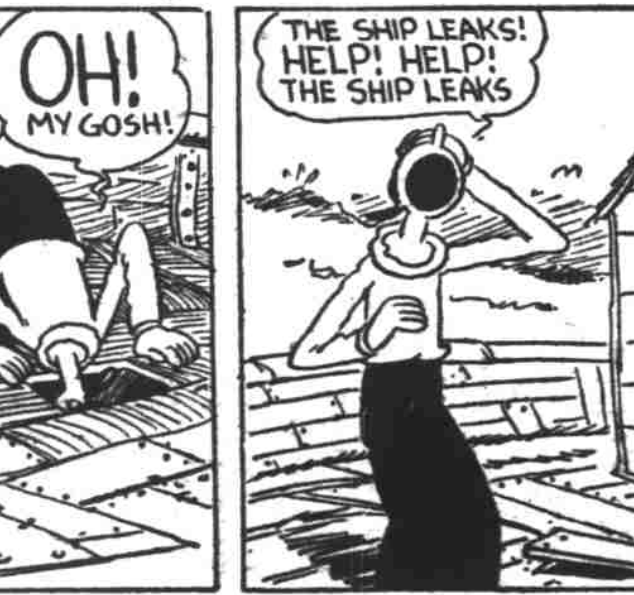

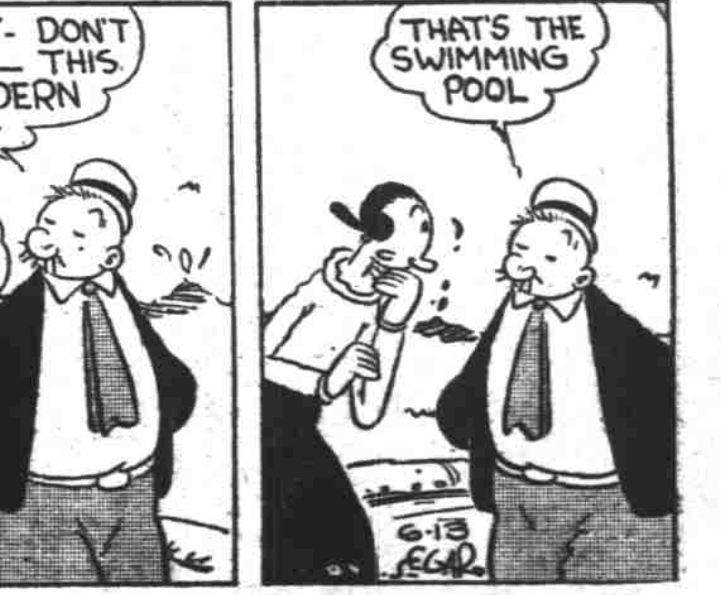
