Chinock Seeks Place Now Held By Van Winkle

Senator James Chinock, handsome representative of Josephine county in the upper house, admitted here yesterday that he would probably be a candidate for the republican nomination for attorney-general's position next spring. "There is every indication a republican will be elected and it might as well be me," Chinock observed.

Chinock said that if he ran he would incorporate a plank in his platform that all state legal business should be handled by the attorney-general's office.

Earl Bronough of Portland has also been mentioned as a candidate while Attorney-General Van Winkle will probably be a candidate to succeed himself.

Report Gain in Auto Licensing

Motor vehicle registrations in Oregon for the first five months of this year aggregated 268,053, as against 259,827 during the corresponding period in 1934. Secretary of State Snell reported yesterday. The increase in registrations this year was 15,226.

Registration fees this year have increased \$130,504.91 over those for the first five months of 1934. Truck type vehicles comprise only 665 of this year's increase. The peak registration was in 1931 with 282,549 cars in operation.
