

LOGAN BOARD AND CANNERS TO MEET

Price for 1935 Crop to Be Discussed; Difference of Opinion Viewed

The loganberry control board, elected here this week when the code was adopted following formal hearing, will today meet with canners of the state to discuss prices on the 1935 crop. Presumably the code price will be fixed today before the control board disbanded. The meeting is called for 10 a. m. at the chamber of commerce.

Whether or not all packers will meet with the board today remains to be seen, for yesterday there was some indication that every canner is not in accord with some advance talk that growers want at least a 3 cent minimum on their crop.

Some packers have already signed up loganberries on contracts stipulating 2 1/2 cents per pound, about the same figure as prevailed last year. These packers, it is pretty generally indicated, will probably go to bat on a test case if the loganberry control board attempts to enforce the code price, should it be above the 2 1/2 cents contract price.

In such an event, the first move would have to come from the control board, inasmuch as the canners are not a party to the marketing agreement. The matter, which would really bring to a test holding power of all fruit codes, would take its first step, presumably, in an injunction suit brought by the control board to enjoin some grower from delivering his berries to a cannery at less than the code price. Canners, it is held, would likely welcome an attempt at abrogating the present contract.

Health Program Benefits to Be Surveyed Here

A survey of the effectiveness of the Marion county health department's program will start today with the arrival of Miss Caroline R. andolph, assistant to Dr. Frank Walker of the Commonwealth fund, both in New York city. Dr. Walker is expected to reach Salem early next week.

This will be the first appraisal of the health work here since 1931. It will cover department activities, their effect in the control of communicable diseases, trends of birth and death rates, and school health improvement.

WEALTHY CHINESE FLEEING DISTRICT

(Copyright, 1935, by Associated Press) KALGAN, Chahar Province, June 20 — Wealthy Chinese, fearing that Japan's relentless penetration of China soon will engulf all inner Mongolia, today were leaving this outpost on the caravan route across the Gobi desert in numbers.

They carried with them their wealth and belongings to seek further south, places of greater safety from the surge of Japan's advance into continental Asia.

Business men and Chinese officials agreed that Japan ultimately would reduce Kalgan, the picturesque frontier city at China's great wall, the rich province of Chahar and probably all inner Mongolia to the status of Hopei province, which has come under the Japanese army's virtual domination.

In support of that belief, they cited the growing list of Chinese concessions to the Japanese army's demands and increasing evidence here of Japan's military might.

Valley Lure to Many Tourists; Number Gaining

Greenness and fertility of the Willamette valley are attracting large numbers of midwest and eastern motorists here with the aim of locating permanently, reports Mrs. Claudia Benson, manager of the Salem office of the Oregon State Motor association. The number of tourists from these states passing through Salem has increased sharply in the last two weeks.

"Most of the tourists are coming from the south and heading for the parks in the northwest, but many of the visitors registering here when asked how long they plan to be in the state say, 'Indefinitely,'" Mrs. Benson said. "They like this valley."

BLACKBERRY PATCH OPEN HOUSE IS SET

Open house at the E. O. Ziellinski blackberry patch on route seven, box 430, will be held Sunday, June 23, with anyone interested welcome to inspect the patch. Ziellinski has two acres of gen-

uine wild blackberries and two acres of cultivated blackberries. He has experimented more than 10 years with the real wild blackberry, and this year his vines offer finest production he has ever seen. Picking will not start until next week, although by Sunday the first picking will be fully ripe.

The Ziellinski farm is in the Hazel Green area, between the school and church. The easiest route is to take the highway north

to travel to the right from the Ohemawa four corners.

The real wild blackberries produced about two tons to the acre last year, and will bring fully

three tons this year, it is anticipated. Contrary to the situation prevailing most berries this year, the lack of June rains has had no ill effect on the blackberries.

Native of India Speaker Sunday At Church Here

An illustrated lecture will be presented at the American Lutheran church Sunday night at 8 o'clock by Mohan V. Raj, a native of Bombay, India, and editor of "Better Farm and Home" published in that city. Raj will tell of the agricultural methods used in India, the splendid work of the missionaries, of Mahatma Gandhi, of the struggle for independence and of the industrial and political needs of that country.

A display of Indian art goods and textiles will be on exhibit at the church. Raj is a graduate of the University of Oregon and the University of Minnesota. Born in a hindu family, he embraced Christianity. He served as a lieutenant under the British flag during the Egypt and Palestine expeditions led by General Allenby. He speaks six Indian tongues and English fluently.

Traffic Arrests By State Police 635 Last Month

State troopers caused 635 arrests for traffic violations during the month of May with fines of \$107.46. Charles P. Pray, superintendent of state police, reported yesterday. Fifty-eight of the arrests were for reckless driving. There were 221 arrests in the general law enforcement division with fines of \$1349. Seven arrests were for larceny.

The troopers made 112 arrests in the fish and game division. Approximately 390 complaints were investigated of which 98 were cleared.

Estimate Given On Tax Receipts

Second installments of personal income intangibles and corporate excise taxes for 1935 will aggregate approximately \$680,000, the state tax commission announced yesterday. These payments are due October 1.

It originally was estimated that these taxes for 1935 would total \$1,900,000, but more than that amount already has been certified. Officials recently increased their estimate for the year to \$2,500,000. Money derived from these taxes is used as an offset against the property taxes.
