(Continued from page 1) them in their artificial houses the same as in living bodies, cut their after-life short. The Lindbergh pump solves this problem, being so mechanically perfect that no infection enters.

The pump, an artificial heart and lungs combined, is not described. At the institute, information about it was refused with the statement that it will be divulged later in the institute's own publications.

However, the announcement reveals that Lindbergh made the first step in 1931, and that he was the author of an unsigned announcement then in Science describing a new apparatus made at the institute's division of experimental surgery.

California Asks Canning Fruits Put Under AAA

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(P)—A determined drive to revise the pending AAA amendments to include canning fruits and vegetables got under way today with the California congressional delegation forming the spearhead of the attack.

Senator Johnson (R-Cal.) personally requested Senator Norris (R-Nebr.) to take action in behalf of California growers before the senate agricultural committee tomorrow, while Representative Stubbs (D-Cal.) asked the chairman of the senate committee to save olive growers from ruin by bringing that industry under the protection of the amendments. Other California congressmen made similar bids.

FIRST AID CAR IS FAVORED BY GROUP

(Continued from page 1) gon as the leading state in the nation with first aid cars and proper oxygen equipment.

Whereas more than 400 modern oxygen resuscitators are available throughout California, and 160 in Washington, Oregon has but five, he pointed out. One of them is owned by Salem General hospital.

Unlike the more common inhalator, these resuscitators not only administer proper proportions of oxygen and carbon dioxide in such cases as gas poisoning and acute pneumonia, but also expand and contract the patient's lungs under the ideal pressure for restoring normal breathing and heart action.

The Portland first aid car, made over from a second hand seven passenger sedan, carries a stretcher, resuscitator, inhalator, gas masks, blankets, heat pads, the common first aid supplies and, in addition, a surgical kit so complete that with it an operation could be performed at the scene of an accident if necessary.

"We work entirely with the medical profession," Captain Roberts declared. "Our men are trained in first aid but go no further without the direction of a doctor. Our car is available for extreme emergencies as an ambulance, but is not used when there is time to call regular ambulance companies."

Captain Roberts left last night for Tillamook and Taft. Next Tuesday he will return to the valley and make stops at Albany,

(Continued from page 1) whites and continue beating until cold. Fold in cream whipped and the crushed raspberries. Pour into refrigerator trays and freeze without stirring for about 3 hours.

Raspberry Whip
1/2 cup water
1/2 cup hot water or raspberry juice
1/2 cup sugar
1 envelope gelatin
1 cup raspberry juice and pulp
1/2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons lemon juice
3 egg whites

Sprinkle gelatin on top of water. Add sugar, salt, hot water or juice and stir. Add lemon juice and a level of raspberries, either fresh or canned. Cool until it begins to thicken. Then beat until frothy. Fold in beaten egg whites and add red coloring if desired. Turn into mold. When firm, unmold and serve with a garnish of whipped cream and a few whole berries. Serves 8.

TAX ON IMPORTED WOOD PULP ASKED

WASHINGTON, June 20.—(P)—A petition demanding a hearing on a bill by Representative Samuel B. Hill (D-Wash) providing a 33 1/2 per cent excise tax on imported chemical wood pulp was filed with the house ways and means committee today by Representative Wallgren (D-Wash).

Hill's bill has been in the committee for several weeks and demands for a hearing increased among members of congress after announcement by the state department that chemical wood pulp was bound to the free list in the proposed reciprocal trade agreement with Sweden.

That action brought protests from all sections of the country where wood pulp is manufactured or where plans were being made for developing the industry. While members of congress were denouncing the action of the state department, former Senator C. C. Dill, of Washington, openly questioned the legality of the department's action, declaring that the reciprocal trade law did not give the president or the department power to bind an item to the free list any more than it gave them the power to place an item on or remove it from the list.

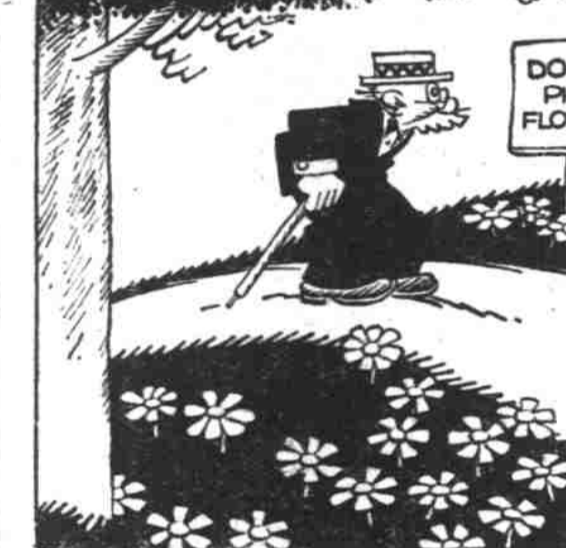

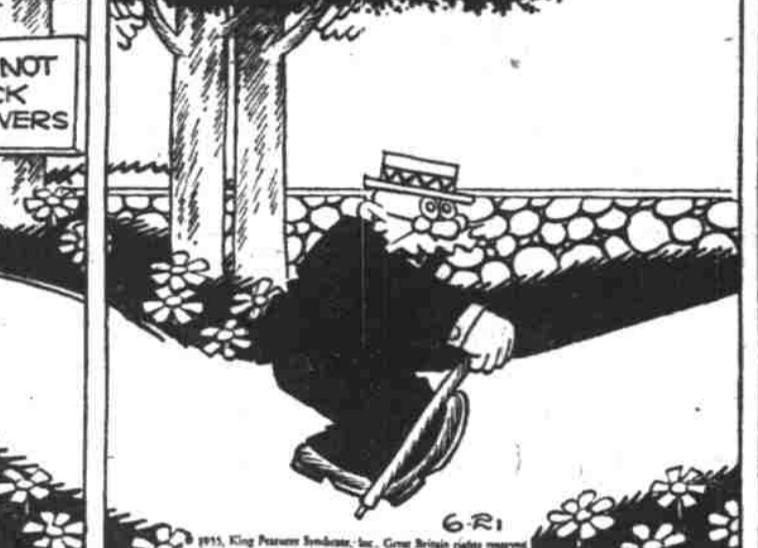
