WOODBURN HAS LEGION GAMES

Business Heads Underwrite State Championship Contests

WOODBURN, July 4.—Woodburn will be host to the 1935 playoff to determine the Oregon state champion Legion Junior baseball club. Arrangements to have the playoff brought here were made by Harold M. Austin, who made the announcement after having interviewed Paul Patterson of Hillsboro, state American Legion baseball chairman. Before the playoff is definitely assured, however, the local committee must sell at least \$200 worth of tickets in advance. About \$100 worth have been sold at present. Local business men have underwritten the affair in the sum of \$250. This amount, plus that from advance ticket sales, would bring available funds up to the amount required which would assure Woodburn's financial responsibility to stage the playoff. The underwriting of the \$250 was undertaken by 25 local men who put up \$10 apiece. If the playoff is a financial success, the \$250 will be refunded to those who underwrote the affair from money received at the gate.

The Woodburn Legion post will get its formal authorization to stage the playoff Sunday, July 7, when the state committee meets at 10 a. m. in Portland. The granting of the playoff to Woodburn is considered a mere technicality to go through, however, as several of the members of the committee have already indicated willingness to give the affair to Woodburn.

The games undoubtedly will be played in the Legion park. Special bleachers and other accommodations for a large crowd will have to be built. It is planned to have the playoff August 10 and 11. Four baseball squads, representing the four sections of the state, will be present. Each squad will consist of 16 boys and a manager. Two games will be played each day.
